Vacuum Cleaner "Blows" Organ.
In a church where an ordinary reed
organ with pedal-operated bellows was
used, it was desired to install an elec-
tric blower. As the reeds of such an
organ are sounded by suction, the air
being exhausted from the wind chest by
the bellows, it was found that a com-
mon vacuum sweeper could easily be
made to do the work. A small hole
was cut in the wind chest, and the

heard while running. The result was
entirely satisfactory, the cleaner do-
ing the work just as well as an expe-
