Simplicity is the essential note of the hostess gown, combined with chic and quiet beauty. The hostess in her own salon must be as well groomed as any of her guests but still so unobtrusive.

It must be something between a day and an evening gown. Silks and soft satins, crepes and velvets are used in preference to woolen stuffs. Moire is a popular material this winter, but not the stiff hard tissue—our grandmothers used to wear. The new moire is as soft and supple as other silks and needs little or no trimming. Charlotte Appert is using it for a striking hostess gown. It is in softest mauve color with low neck and no sleeves, together with one of the new butterfly bow trains which give a dignified charm without annoying the matron as she moves about among her guests.

## New York Says—Brushed Alpaca



EVEN THOSE PERSONS who dislike cold weather are reconciled to it when they see the smart, warm clothes that are presented for selection. And when the term "smart" and "warm" are expressed, one instinctively thinks of knitted outer garments, and never have they possessed more chic and chaste than this season.

One of the most attractive knitted garments offered for the cold winter season is the brushed alpaca. Some of these coats are shaggy like others, but they are all most inviting. One of the strongest factors in their favor is their quality of possessing warmth without weight. They are absolutely the most comfortable of coats, and one never has the sensation of being burdened with a heavy coat.

Many of them have large enveloping collars which may be fastened high at the throat, having the appearance of the bolser collars we see on fur coats. The sleeves are often finished with cuffs that turn back, ensuring added warmth at the wrists where it is so necessary. Usually these coats are cut along simple straight lines like a box coat, and they have a fondness for fastening a bit away from the side with novelty or plain buttons.

There are no hard and fast rules concerning the length of these brushed coats, some reaching nearly to the knees, while others in more youthful, swagger manner, just escape the finger-tip in length. One of the striking features of these brushed coats is in the fact that they may be worn beneath the fur coat in the very coldest weather, when it seems as if nothing would keep one warm, and comfort is assured.

Some of these models are as easy as a gay can be, but others choose the wood-browns and greens, with haps collars and cuffs contrasting. An interesting combination that is particularly appropriate for autumn wear is produced in a rich brick red, with smart black collar and cuffs.

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## New Paris Fashions Suit Only Women of Slender Symmetry

PARIS, Dec. 8.—The official winter style openings are now a thing of the past, and it would seem that the new dress lines put all but slim women at a disadvantage; a veritable cult of slimmness has been developed.

While there is the greatest variety in the matter of detail, and one is allowed the circular or the plain, the embroidered and the unembroidered, the fundamental principle of the "straight line" remains supreme.

For street and travel wear the classic tailleur has the call, and so many women have remained faithful to it despite the changing times, that the great textile manufacturers of northern France are now creating fashions designed especially for it.

The kasha, marokellaine and velours de Snyrne, particularly the latter, are the materials used by most of the Parisian dressmakers for tailleur and coats. The velours de Snyrne, coming in plaids and stripes, with a soft velvety surface and all the sturdy qualities of wool, is the most popular fabric among the fashionable frequenters of the Bois de Boulogne and the Champs Elysees, soft dark green being the color most in demand.

Simplicity is the keynote. Button or braid trimmed, or without adornment, these garments for morning and street wear all retain a snug, exact fit which is causing despair among women who admit they are somewhat plump. Slim women, on the other hand, have no fault to find.

As a rule the coats of the 1924 tailleur are longer than of the past, for several seasons, in many cases about three quarters or more. They also make the simple, straight lines, and are often the wrap-around variety.

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
