Aberdeen girl who eloped and who was reported drowned at Harrisburg, Ore., while en route to California with her husband.

The girl's mother, Mrs. John Dombeck, was never notified of her daughter's reported death. She learned of it from newspaper dispatches and last night presented police with a request for an investigation.

In the meantime reports from Harrisburg, where the drowning supposedly occurred, December 5, are to the effect that residents there question whether the girl was drowned at all.

Mrs. Dombeck claims that her daughter is only 17 years of age, although she gave her age as 18 in obtaining a marriage license, and became Byers' bride without her mother's consent.

Investigation has shown that since the marriage Byers and his young bride, in company with William J. Parks, of Los Angeles, Byers' friend, departed for California by automobile. Their car ran into the Willamette river while Parks was trying to negotiate the ferry landing at Harrisburg, according to the story they told at that little city on the Willamette.

Parks swam ashore saying that he tore his way out through the side curtains of the machine when he sank. Byers who said he was unable to swim, was rescued clinging to some debris in the river. When the car was recovered, the following day, no trace of the girl's body could be found.

Dragging the river for more than a week has revealed no trace. Harrisburg residents did not see the girl and accordingly regard the case with suspicion, inasmuch as the two men departed within 24 hours of the mishap, and have not been heard from.

SAVANT WOULD HIRE WARSHIPS TO DRY UP U. S.

Rented Navy Boats Best Way
to Enforce Prohibition
Says Syracuse Man.

FINES WOULD PAY COST

Theory that "Dry" Law Was
Put Over Is Denounced
as "Propaganda."

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Dec. 13.—Solution of the prohibition enforcement problem in the United States rests in the renting by the internal revenue bureau of ships from the American navy and their assignment to prohibition duty.

So declares Dr. Charles Wesley Flint, chancellor of Syracuse University and one of the foremost educators in the United States.

The Syracuse chancellor believes fines and confiscations by the naval fleet warring upon rum smugglers would pay a large part of the cost of enforcement.

Referring to the changed attitude of Great Britain toward the proposal for a twelve-mile limit, Chancellor Flint said he was glad Great Britain had come to realize that the Union Jack was in a mighty small and questionable business when floating over a cargo of booze on the three-mile limit.

Grills Propaganda

"We must recognize the fact there is a desperate propaganda regarding prohibition and enforcement, for the purpose of bringing about its nullification by condoning or permitting lawlessness."

"Many persons are victims of propaganda when they say prohibition was 'put over' on the American people."

"For more than 72 years of definite agitation by temperance societies and other organizations the question was before the people."

"On no subject ever before the American people was there more discussion pro and con or more literature distributed. On no issue was more money spent by those interested on either side. It was discussed

Popular Move
"Forty-six of the forty-eight states adopted the amendment, with 78.5 of the members of the assemblies voting for it, while 84.6 of the members of the senates voted for it."

Governor Smith and others have objected to one-half of one per cent as the point at which liquor would be decided to be intoxicating, yet that was used as the basis for defining intoxicating liquor long before the prohibition law was adopted.

"We cannot approve the suggestions of the group now calling for change in the law, for the reason Saturday evening."
