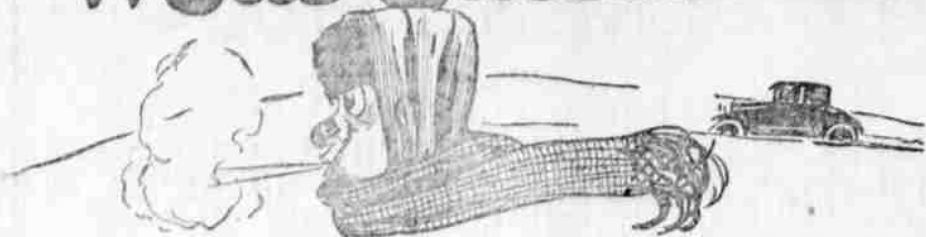

## WARNS AGAINST DIVINE HEALING

Presbyterian Publication Charges That Dr. Price Is a Faker.

HEALINGS ARE FALSE

Investigation Reveals Healers Do Not Perform Miracles as Alleged—Ministers Make Statements.

The News-Review prints, by request the following extract from "Our Hope," a New York Presbyterian publication, regarding Divine Healing: A certain Dr. Charles S. Price, a disciple and follower of Mrs. McPherson the would-be miracle woman, has evidently started out on his own book. He stirred up considerable interest in Victoria and Vancouver, B. C., and we understand he is to appear next in Seattle. We hear that even some of the preachers who know, or at least profess to know the truth, fell for his healing delusion in Vancouver. A company of believers wired us from Vancouver asking for an expression from us by return wire. We did so and the Lord used our message to bring back sanity from this unscriptural "Pentecostal" wild-fire.

What kind of work this man does may be learned from the following paragraph, taken from the Vancouver Sun:

"In the belief that the facts surrounding the death of the late Rev. Reginald Edwards of Kelowna, who was one of those pronounced cured by Mr. Charles S. Price during the recent evangelistic and healing meetings at the Vancouver arena, are of public importance, intimate friends of the family have authorized publication of the following statement of the case:

"The statement was given to the Vancouver Sun by D. J. Welch, principal of Lord Lester school, New Westminster, at whose home Mrs. Edwards, the widow, is staying. It was confirmed in its essential facts by Dr. J. G. McKay of the Hollywood sanatorium, where Mr. Edwards died last Wednesday morning.

"Mr. Edwards has been for many years a man who had to take good care of himself," said Mr. Welch. "He was for some years pastor of Kerrisdale Baptist church, from which he resigned six years ago. After a year in the United States and a year in New Westminster he accepted a call to Kelowna Baptist church, believing that the Okanagan climate would be good for him. He had a d. d. incipient tuberculosis, but the disease was not active, and he was, to all appearances a strong, healthy man. He had to avoid over taxation and he had to rest at frequent intervals. Otherwise, he carried on the work of his pastorate until the Price meetings opened in Vancouver.

"He came to Vancouver as a minister deeply interested in this evangelistic campaign to witness and study the conversions and healing reported to be brought about under Mr. Price's ministry. He was profoundly impressed and went before Mr. Price on the arena platform to be healed of the conditions which impaired his general good health.

"He was anointed by Mr. Price and he collapsed on the platform. He told me afterwards that he did not lose consciousness, but he did not know that he had fallen down. It was apparent to his friends who saw him that he came under some powerful psychic influence.

"In a few moments he came around and he stated that he was healed. He was absolutely sincere and was moved to a high pitch of religious fervor by his experience. Under the impulse of this suggestion he attended all of the Price meetings and took an active part. He was most enthusiastic and was quite carried away.

"As a result he overtaxed his strength and a week ago last Tuesday suffered a complete nervous breakdown. He became delirious and was taken to Dr. McKay's sanatorium, where he died on Wednesday morning.

"Dr. McKay stated that he had no personal experience with Mr. Edwards' previous medical history, but that the statement by Mr. Welch was entirely consistent with his observation of the case.

"Violent over-excitement and over-strain of the nerves was the cause of his death," said Dr. McKay.

"We earnestly caution true Christians to stay away from these men and women with their subtle inventions and professions of scripture. We warn our readers, especially Christian women, not to expose themselves to the influences of these impostors, in which a dangerous hypnotism prevails. We look for a still greater deception on these lines. Remember victims of Pentecostalism and its healing raps are found today in numerous insane asylums and other sad places, and they were healed, till untimely graves.

Yet when Price was in Vancouver, several Presbyterian and Baptist preachers were so completely "hypnotized" by this man that they became Pentecostals and swallowed the whole business.

Christie Dr. Haldeman's pamphlet on "Healing" and we also call attention to another strong exposure by Dr. W. P. White on "McPhersonism."

Truths: The lying which "healers" practice is enough to show the spirit which lurks behind it. They are enthusiastic fanatics, insane on the question of healing and then in their unbalanced condition they say things and do things which are repulsive. The following is taken from the pamphlet by Mr. White on "McPhersonism." As Mr. White is an Oregonian; the incident is entirely trust-worthy:

"Two pastors of Eugene, Oregon, listened to Dr. Price tell of the great miracles wrought by Mrs. McPherson. Then he said: 'You do not have to go to Los Angeles to see a miracle wrought. There is a man who lives five and a half miles north of this place, who, when he came to the platform for healing at Albany, had a frightful cancer. I prayed over him and he was healed. There is now only a little red spot left where the cancer was, and that is fast disappearing. If you want to see for yourself, go and see.' The two pastors took Price at his word and drove out to the man's home. His wife came to the door, and when she heard of their mission said, 'Yes, Hallelujah! My husband is healed!' The husband came from another room, with a bath towel on his shoulder on which the cancer had been discharging. His face was contorted so that you could not only see his teeth, but also his jaw bone. Using one side of his mouth, he cried, 'Yes, Hallelujah! Price prayed for me and I am healed!' The poor man had been so hypnotized that he believed he was healed when he was dying of cancer!"

"The 'Bridal Call,' edited by Mrs. McPherson, April 12, 1923, has a full report of the healing of a woman stated to be blind of one eye for 42 years with ulcerations covering the other eye. A well-known minister in Los Angeles followed up this case and proves the report to be absolutely false!"

"We have before exposed similar deceptions, false reports and untrue statements in connection with the McPherson and Bosworth campaigns. The harm which is being done cannot be estimated. May all sane and spiritual believers stay away from these cuts."

## SEEK FUNDS TO KEEP GERMANS FROM STARVING

Seven Million Face Death If American Aid Isn't Given, Say Backers of Plan.

## TO BE WHEAT OUTLET

Newton Bill Would Provide \$70,000,000 to Sustain Starving Multitude.

International News Service. NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—A bill from its purely humanitarian motives, the project to prevent some 7,000,000 Germans from starving to death this winter seems to be supported by sentiment and even economic reasons. Judging from information supplied by Henry W. C. Black of St. Louis, who was secretary of the organization which handled similar work last year, Germans, black points are, found on "our side" in the Revolutionary war, compared exclusively to George Washington's bodyguard, fought in the War of 1812, sent the federal government machinery and supplies while the Civil War was in progress and contributed more than two hundred thousand troops at German birth to the Union army.

Writes Black: "The object of our organization is to do everything that can be done in behalf of favored, unorganized action on the Newton Bill, providing for an appropriation of \$70,000,000 for the purchase in this country, of food supplies for the famine-stricken people of Germany and Austria, to be distributed by the American Red-Cross with the cooperation of the German and the Austrian Red-Cross. It would certainly benefit our farmers to be relieved of their surplus grain."

"The adoption of the Newton bill would tend to prevent the spread of Russian bolshevism into Germany. This checking its attacks on western civilization. It would also serve to protect American shores from plagues and epidemics. Prolonged under-nourishment of peoples weakens their power of resistance to plagues and

other contagious diseases, and for this reason is bound to create a situation involving a world wide health menace.

Debt of Honor. "No one familiar with the character of the German people can doubt that they would regard the expenditures authorized by the bill as a debt of honor to be repaid by them at the earliest convenience.

"A number of German regiments were raised right at the beginning of the American revolution. Washington's mounted bodyguard was exclusively German. The French troops, under Rochambeau, contained many German soldiers in addition to several regiments entirely German. The names of Steuben, the drill-master and instructor of the American forces; Muelhensberg, the fighting parson; de Kalk the hero of the Camden; Herkimer the hero of Oriskany; and scores of other German revolutionary heroes will never be forgotten.

Aided U. S. "In the War of 1812, the Mexican War and the numerous Indian wars, the Civil War, the Spanish American War and the World War, so far as America had a part in it, there was no campaign, no battle, without its quota of participants of German blood. In the Civil War the number of soldiers from Germany fighting for the Union was never less than 100,000. The names of German ancestry patriots are legion and their names are on the walls of the White House.

In 1922 it was Germany that aided Australia, sending her money and materials of all kinds, including machinery, that paving the way for her speedy reconstruction.

"Now the situation is reversed. An appeal has and has been sent to the German government, and President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in view of the fact that it is the only nation which has a standing army, has the president and Secretary Wallace and Hoover are giving serious consideration to the proposal to have the same friendly cooperation with the people of Germany, Austria and Italy of Europe.
