HEADLESS HORSEMAN RIDES

Ghost Goes Forth Nightly in Sleepy Hollow in Search of Head Lost in Battle.

The graveyard of the old Dutch church, Tarrytown, N. Y., is described by Washington Irving at the beginning of the "Legend of Sleepy Hollow." "On the Tappan Zee there lies a small market town or rural port known by the name of Tarrytown. Not far from this village there is a little valley which is one of the quietest spots in the world. A small brook glides through it, with just murmurs enough to lull one to repose."

The enchanted region of Sleepy Hollow is haunted by the apparition of a figure on horseback, who in a mythical battle had lost his head.

"Certain of the more authentic historians," continues the author, "allege that the body of the trooper having been buried in the churchyard, the ghost rides forth to the scene of battle in nightly quest of his head, and that the rushing speed with which he sometimes passes along the Hollow is owing to his being in a hurry to get back to the churchyard before day-break."

Just below the bridge flows the brook, and near the church bridge Ichabod Crane had his terrifying encounter with the headless horseman.—Detroit News.

HEAR MOANS IN MOUNTAINS

Peculiar Sounds Heard in the Chilean Andes—Peak in England Screams.

A deep note to be heard at certain seasons of the year proceeding from the mountain of El Bramador, in the Chilean Andes, is one of the weirdest sounds in the world. In former days the natives listened to it with superstitious fear, while even a white man, hearing it for the first time, is startled at the mountain's "powers." Another curious mountain exists in Nevada, though this one usually gives out a note resembling at first the jingling of bells, and ending with a deep, organ-like swell.

In both cases the sounds are due to a peculiar formation of the earth, which under certain conditions of weather allows the separate particles to rub against each other and so produce uncanny effects.

In England is a mountain which howls in such a way that formerly it was supposed to be the haunt of demons. This is Cross Fell, in Westmoreland, where local conditions produce a gale with several peculiarities, including an awe-inspiring scream that at times can be heard for miles.

A Chagrined Sea Fighter.

Outside the harbor of Charlotte Amalie, on the coast of St. Thomas Island, a huge rock looms out of the sea. Sail Rock it is called, and it bears a startling resemblance to a ship. As I gazed upon it, says Mr. A. Back came the echoing thunder of the cannonade, and the rebounding shot, falling on the frigate's deck, convinced the Frenchman that the privateer was returning his fire.

For hours the battle raged; the French gunners poured broadside after broadside at the massive cliff. Not until day dawned did the deluded commander of the frigate discover his mistake. Then, crestfallen and mortified, he crept away, leaving Sail Rock unscathed and triumphant.—Youth's Companion.

A romantic discovery has just been made by a student of Toulouse university who swam along an underground stream for a mile with an electric torch in his hand, and found some reefs believed to be at least 25,000 years old.

In the south of France and in Spain, and to a less extent elsewhere, drawings on bone, and modeling in clay, and painting on rocks have shown that 25,000 to 30,000 years ago men who lived in caves had the knack of representing, by a rude kind of art, the animals they knew.

They scratched on flat bones the outlines of roan or, bison, mammoths and other animals, and painted them on the dry walls of caves; and it is interesting and important to know what other animals were ranging about Europe then, as it throws a light on the changes which have taken place in the climate.

The student of Toulouse university, Cartvet by name, discovered what might be called the studio of an artist of the cave-dwelling period.

On the walls of the cave were rough drawings of animals, and around these models made in clay, some in the early stage of being shaped and others more fully formed.

Among the animals represented were lions, bears, wolves and horses. This is the first time lions have been found among the animals known to the cave artists who once lived in France.

There is really no one section that has most of all the various fur animals. In Alaska there are some of about all other than skunk, civet cat and opossum; in Nevada, Utah, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and other of the Rocky mountain states, there are more coyotes than elsewhere.

New England and other of the eastern states have most fox; southern states most weasel, mink and muskrat; Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, West Virginia, Indiana and other central states most skunk.

If the inquirer is interested to know what state, or section, has most big game, then parts of Alaska and certain of the Rocky mountain states, but like the fur animals there is no "one locality" that has most of all these animals, including bear, deer, moose, elk and mountain lion.—Sportsman's Digest.

Losing the Soat. There is a possibility that our cultivated flowers are being sent to a very great degree, and if the loss continues to a point where it disappears entirely the species will likewise disappear, for the perpetuation of the plant depends upon the scent to attract insects, whose visits effect the necessary fertilization of the blossoms.

Flowers to away with the scent of a flower by increasing its color and size, and so the energy of the plants is used in making up this extra substance. The cultivated plant finds it does not need to perpetuate itself by attracting insects, as man does not waste time and labor producing perfume not required. That scent is nature's means of fertilization is proved by the fact that flowers that are wind-fertilized, or street insects by their brilliant coloring have no scent.

ATTEMPT TO OUST SENATOR MAYFIELD

(United Press.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Luther Nichols, Dallas, Texas, attorney, said the fight to oust Senator Mayfield of Texas will be started next week. The committee on privileges and elections will be asked to investigate Mayfield's election in a resolution. An open probe is expected to amount to an investigation of the Ku Klux Klan of which it is charged Mayfield is a member. An appeal is expected on the charge that Mayfield spent hundreds of thousands for the primary campaign where the state law holds \$2,000 is the limit. Senator Spencer, Missouri Klansman, is chairman of the privileges and elections committee.
