STILL OWNER GETS 6 MONTHS AND 1,000

Severe Penalty Meted Out to Young Man Caught With Copper Still in Rear Set of Automobile.

C. L. Lizzett, of Seaside, Oregon, was today fined \$1000 and given six months in jail, when he entered a plea before Justice of the Peace George Jones, of having a still in his possession.

Lizzett was arrested yesterday morning at Glendale by Deputy Sheriff W. H. Branham, and was brought to the city yesterday afternoon by Branham and Deputy Sheriff Frank Hopkins. When arrested he was in company with A. J. Patterson, and the latter was also brought to the city under arrest, but was released from the charge of having possession of the still, when it was found that the copper kettle was the property of Lizzett.

The still is a 10-gallon copper stock kettle. It has a small vent in the top and a short length of copper pipe to lead to the coil.

Lizzett and Patterson drove into Glendale late Tuesday night, and left their car on the street. Deputy Sheriff Branham became suspicious of them and searched their car, finding an still secretly hidden in the back seat of the machine. He immediately arrested the two men and brought them to Roseburg.

Lizzett at first entered a plea of not guilty, and secured the services of O. S. Brown of Glendale to defend him, but today he changed his plea and acknowledged his guilt. Judge Jones inflicted the severe penalty following this change in appeal.

Lizzett and Patterson were together in a Coos County logging camp and got from there to the Columbia river camps. They were on their way to California when arrested.
