EXTENSION OF SHIPPING ADVISED

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Extension of the coastwise shipping laws to include the Philippines, separation of the emergency fleet corporation from the shipping board and compulsory cooperation between American railroads and shipping, and a survey of the needs for a permanent merchant marine, were recommended to President Coolidge today by Chairman Jones of the senate commerce committee.

GASOLINE RAISE ANNOUNCED TODAY

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—An increase of two cents per gallon in the price of gasoline, effective in ten states in the middle west, is announced for tomorrow by the Standard Oil company of Indiana. Present prices vary from fourteen to seventeen cents. This is the first upward price movement since the gasoline war last fall brought prices to the lowest levels in years.

REVENUE BILL IS GIVEN PUBLICITY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Reversing the previous policy, the House ways and means committee today made public a new revenue bill in the form in which it was sent to the capital by Secretary Mellon. The text contains few changes from the outline of the bill it was publicly announced at the treasury. The fight for publicity for the measure, was conducted in the subcommittee meeting yesterday by Representative Garner of Texas, the ranking democratic member. Normal tax sections of the existing law are undisturbed except that the present four per cent rate is reduced to three per cent, and the present eight per cent rate reduced to six per cent.

America Inferior to Other Powers in Air, Says Gorby

CHICAGO—While the United States is third military air power, it is so far behind in number of personnel and in commercial flying that it is in reality far inferior to the other great powers in the air, it was declared by Capt. John W. Gorby, assistant to the president of the National Transportation Institute, at an air transportation conference here. The nation's inferiority lies in the lack of development of commercial flying, Captain Gorby asserted.

The United States has an air force of 630 first line airplanes and 45 air squadrons against France's 1,552 planes and 174 squadrons, and Great Britain's 408 planes and 34 squadrons, said Captain Gorby.

"But France has an air personnel of 87,730, England has 31,000 and we have a total of about 9,500. There are three commercial airlines in France, England has four and last year Germany had seven. Europe is crossed by a network of air routes connecting every great city.

"Our postal air service has demonstrated the possibility of commercial flying. In the past fiscal year U. S. postal planes flew 1,589,000 miles between New York and San Francisco, with an efficiency of 96.73 per cent. But the United States is absolutely helpless on the subject of commercial flying. We have no great fleet of commercial planes, no great army of experienced commercial flyers back of our military force, and above all, we have no airplane manufacturing facilities to compare with other great powers. In case of emergency we would have to expand our facilities tenfold to equal the peace time manufacturing facilities of France and sevenfold to equal the peace time facilities of England. France is appropriating \$24,000,000 francs to build 3,000 planes, half of them military. England has an aviation appropriation of \$54,000,000. Our war department has asked Congress for \$25,000,000."
