(Presidential Hot Biscuits Her Specialty)



Mrs. George W. Nichols, president of the Highland Park Woman's Club of Columbia, Tennessee, is famous for her hot beaten biscuits. She has sent a box of these every Thanksgiving to the last three presidents of the United States. This year President Coolidge was favored with the perfect specimens shown in the picture. Mrs. Nichols has consented to give us the recipe for her "presidential" biscuits. Here it is. Try it on your own chief executive.

"Into one and one-half pounds of flour work four full ounces of crisco, three level teaspoons of sugar and one and one-half teaspoons of salt. Mix this into a stiff dough with one cup of water. Work well with the hands, then roll through dough. Break until smooth and white. Roll about one third of an inch thick, cut, and pierce with fork and bake in a moderately hot oven for about 30 minutes, then let the fire reduce and bake for an hour or more. They should be dry throughout. This makes five dozen biscuits one and one-half inches in diameter."
