GRAZING FEES TO REMAIN THE SAME

KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 31.—

There will be no increase of grazing

fees in national forests in 1924.

This fact, important to Klamath

county stockmen, became known yester-

day with receipt by the chamber of

commerce of a telegram from Senator

McNary. The telegram said:

"Glad to advise you that the forest

service informs me it has no intention

of increasing grazing fees in national

forests."

A letter from Senator Stanford

advised the chamber that the Oregon

delegation was doing all within its

power to avert an increase of fees,

while one from Representative Shinn-

ott said he had learned there would be

no increase in 1924 but he was

apprehensive of one in 1925.

"The forest service has gathered

information on grazing on private

lands," said Shinnott, "and expects to

present the figures to various stock

associations to show reason why, in

the face of the figures, fees should

be increased."

According to the foregoing infor-

mation stockmen have escaped an

increase in 1924, but will have the

same fight on their hands the follow-

ing year.

FAKE REMEDIES DEFEAT END OF HEALTH SEEKER

Victims Often Flood System With Poisons in Attempt to Be Cured Quickly.

TAPEWORM REDUCES

Epsom Salts and Vinegar Sell for \$15 a Bottle, Says New York Health Official.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—Americans have no occasion to laugh at the African Voodoo doctor or the Indian's medicine man.

"Every day, in every American city, men and women are using remedies compared to which the concoctions of the tom-tom beaters are scientific," said Dr. S. D. Hubbard, director of New York's city bureau of public health.

A year's laboratory study shows: "The American people want to take a short cut to health."

"They buy patent medicines. I do not wish to give the impression that all such medicines are dangerous. Some are harmless; others contain properties of value. But every person using patent medicine is tinkering with the most valuable asset in the world—health."

Dr. Hubbard told some of his discoveries.

1. Anti-fat remedy. The laboratory test showed it was a coating of gelatin around the head of a tapeworm. The tapeworm grows a new body when the head is intact. Users get thin all right—but at a cost of life itself.

2. Another antifat solution. Plain Epsom salts, Epsom salts, in small doses, do no harm. But taken constantly they destroy the red blood corpuscles, and the patient dies of chemical starvation—pernicious anemia.

3. The rejuvenator compound has come into great favor. Often it is Epsom salts and white vinegar. The ingredients are worth 25 cents. The price is \$15 a bottle.

4. Cancer sufferers are among the most pitiful victims of quack cures. One remedy found by Dr. Hubbard consisted of ashes of snails and clam shells. Another was nothing but yellow clay.

5. Indigestion cures are, in the main, alcohol, a cheap grade of whiskey, more dangerous than the bootleg stuff. A clergyman friend of Dr. Hubbard refused to believe this. He ended in a hospital in the throes of delirium tremens.

6. The soothing syrups and teething cordials are in many cases "baby killers"—water, sweetened and flavored, containing an opiate. "Pay more money for good milk, and soothing syrup will not be necessary for the baby," Dr. Hubbard advised.

7. The electric belt cure—a strip of iron and copper wrapped in red leather. Perspiration from the body causes a pricking sensation. The victim thinks it is magnetic force.

"There is no short cut to health," Dr. Hubbard declares. "The orthodox way to recovery may seem long, but it is better to improve an inch a day than mark time to the tune of false hopes."
