A Boost for Roseburg

The Motor Shop Garage, owned by Baker and Patzlaf, is among the largest of this city's automobile establishments. In point of continuous management the Motor Shop is the oldest shop in the city, as the present owners founded the business in 1915. The first building at 414 North Jackson street was soon found to be inadequate for their business, so leases were obtained on property across the street and the annex built. In this latter building storage space is quite ample for the cars which are sheltered there. The machine shops and repair departments are located in the basement of the original building, and the first floor is used for sales rooms and storage, the offices occupying the front. The Motor Shop is also agent for the Buick automobiles for this county. The shop is equipped with the latest labor saving machinery, and the job that in 1915 required hours of time to turn out can now be done in a short time.

The average car owner has the idea that when his car goes into a garage for repairs that the is to be "held up" and "shook down," but under the system of the Motor Shop all repairs are done on Buick company schedules. The writer attends the Commercial Club luncheons (in order to get a square meal) and the calamity howlers always have this to say: "We are behind the times and all the towns around us are going ahead full speed and have no brakes. We in Roseburg will soon be but a flagging station on the S. P. and stage lines." Hit me with a prune if you wish, but his old town of ours has them all skinned.
