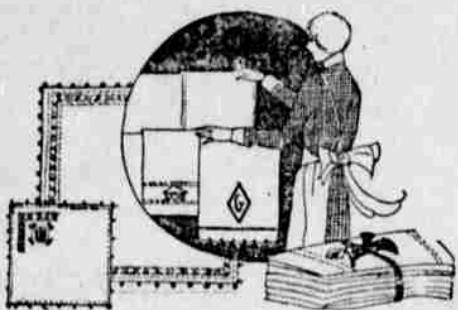

This edition of 40 pages was printed entirely in the newspaper plant owned by the News-Review company, and was handled entirely by the News-Review force. It took over a ton and a half of paper to print this edition. This paper, if unrolled from the huge rolls in which it is run through the press, would form a strip 20 miles in length, or if the strips were laid to cover the pavement of the highway, would extend for a distance of over three miles. The News-Review has made an effort to include in this edition a careful review of the industries and resources of Douglas county, and prepare a comprehensive summary of what this section has to offer.
