N. Y. STOCK MARKET

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Conflicting movements took place at the opening of today's stock market, gains and losses being about evenly divided in the initial transactions. United States Steel Iron Pipe advanced 2-3-4 to 71½ and fractional gains were recorded by a number of the oil, copper and Northwestern rails. Davison Chemical dropped one point.

Selling orders continued to increase as trading progressed. Davison Chemical extending its loss to four points and Baldwin dropping 1-3-4. Foreign exchanges opened lower, French francs establishing another new record low for all time at 4.88 cents.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Resumption of heavy sales by traders who had accumulated paper profits in the last two months of 1923, but deferred converting them into cash until after the turn of the year in order to receive the benefit of a possible reduction in the 1924 income tax, experienced considerable short selling during the morning, losses of one to two points being spread over a wide list. Practically all of the speculative industrials were in supply, with the exception of Marland, yielding most generally to selling pressure. Rails were sluggish with Northern Pacific and Reading heavy. Special buying was noted in a few issues, particularly iron products, Consoileum and Cuyamel Fruit. The return flow of funds to New York was reflected in the lower renewal rate for call money, which opened at 5½ per cent.

Consolidated Clear preferred jumped 9½ points and International Harvester five. Material gains were also established in Fisher Body, Cuyamel Fruit, U. S. Steel Iron Pipe, Otis Elevator and Sears Roebuck.

Buying of stock on favorable trade news which included another reduction in crude oil output and higher prices for pig iron and gasoline was counteracted in today's stock market by a resumption of profit taking in stocks purchased last year and short selling of speculative issues, particularly Davison Chemical. Sales approximated 900,000 shares.

The closing was irregular. Renewed selling of Baldwin, the Pan-American issues and Davison Chemical in the late sellings, was counteracted by the strength of Central Leather Preferred, Columbia, Carbon, Stewart-Warner, and Consolidated Gas, all up 2 to 3 points.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—In the absence of any special demand, wheat tended downward in price today during the first part of the board of trade session. Opening prices which varied from the same as yesterday's finish to quarter lower, May 107-3-8 to 107-1-4 and July 106-3-4, were followed by slight declines all around.

Corn and oats were relatively firm. The fact that the receipts were light was the chief sustaining influence. After opening good to quarter higher May 73-3-4 to 73-7-8, corn held near to initial quotations. Oats started unchanged to 1-8 off, May 43¼ to 43-3-8 and later sagged a trifle more.

Provisions were weak as a result of a decline in hog values.

CLEAVER ADMITS WARRANTS ILLEGAL

PORTLAND, Jan. 3.—Bland admissions by G. L. Cleaver, state prohibition commissioner, to the effect that he obtained the majority of search warrants used in liquor raids on anonymous tips and letters, caused a wave of excitement to run through official circles yesterday, and was responsible for no little uneasiness on the part of judicial officers who have been lax in the issuance of search warrants.

That the provisions of the federal and state constitutions are ignored, that the law is treated with contempt, that the majority of search warrants used in liquor raids are not worth the paper on which they are written, was the consensus of opinion of lawyers who discussed the case yesterday.

Public attention has been forcibly drawn to the matter of illegal search warrants by Monday night's raid on the home of A. G. Labbe, 1015 Quimby street, in the course of which a small quantity of liquor was found, and the owner, one of the city's leading citizens, arrested on a charge of violating the prohibition law.

Cleaver, in answer to inquiries, stated that his agents had obtained the search warrant that led to the raid on a mysterious communication, one which the writer had not even signed his or her name. Cleaver went further. He carefully told the inquiring reporters that there was nothing out of the ordinary about the procedure, and that he obtained the majority of his search warrants for raids on private homes on just such tips and letters.

That the officers who swear to such warrants on such evidence are treading close to the line that defines perjury was the opinion expressed yesterday by leading lawyers of the city. And judges, who issue such warrants without examination, without evidence of probable cause, are guilty of a violation of their oaths of office, the lawyers also continued. Such a procedure, it was pointed out, would rob the citizen of the protection afforded him by the section of the federal constitution which guarantees every citizen the security of his home against unlawful invasion and which carries out the ancient Anglo-Saxon principle of law that every man's home is his castle.

KING TUT SHRINE UNEARTHED TODAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LUXOR, Egypt, Jan. 3.—When the doors of the second shrine in Tutankhamen's tomb were opened this morning, a third brilliantly colored and gilded shrine was disclosed. This shrine, which was also opened man and the cow-headed Hathor, hieroglyphics and on the doors are depicted the figures of a horn-headed man and the cow-headed Hathor, Egyptian God of love.

Difficult Work Starts.
LUXOR, Egypt, Jan. 3.—Howard Carter began today one of the most difficult parts of the season's work in dismantling the tomb of Pharaoh Tutankhamen, namely, the ruins of 15 remaining sections of immense outer canopy. Externally there are no signs of pogs or similar devices for holding the parts together but Mr. Carter, who so dexterously removed the three weighty sections of the roof, doubtless by this time has a good idea of how best to tackle this difficult task.

It would be no easy matter to take apart the different sections of the elaborately decorated sides of the canopy even in the unrestricted space of a laboratory, but in the narrow chamber where he is forced to work, some three feet below the level of the ante-chamber, in an atmosphere made oppressive by the constant glare of the lights, the work requires endurance, patience and skill.

Judging by the time taken in dismantling the room of the canopy, this process may require a week or more, after which Mr. Carter will begin to take apart the second shrine.

WOMAN PRISONER GIVEN LIBERTY

Fern Nye, of Days Creek, who was arrested recently charged with possession of liquor, and who was given a fine of \$400 and 60 days in jail, was released from custody yesterday by Justice of the Peace George Jones, acting upon the recommendation of Sheriff Starmer. The only cell in the jail, in which a woman can be placed, is unhealthy and unsafe, and a serious accident was only narrowly averted yesterday, the sheriff stated. A large portion of plaster fell from the ceiling, barely missing the prisoner and covering her bed. Had the accident occurred at night, she might have been badly cut and bruised. The cell has no sanitary conveniences, and can be only partially heated. As this is the only cell upstairs and the lower floor is badly congested by men prisoners, the sheriff advised the court that the county would be required to go to considerable expense if the prisoner should be kept longer. Mrs. Nye agreed to pay the fine as soon as the money can be raised, and was consequently given her liberty. She had served out 18 days of her sentence.

WOMAN AUTHOR IS SIXTY THOUSAND SEEKING DIVORCE LICENSES ISSUED

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Jan. 3.—Judge Chester W. Barrows, of the superior court today entered an order vacating the divorce granted yesterday to Nina Wilcox Putnam Sanderson from Robert J. Sanderson until such time as she shall appear in person and satisfy the court she has been a resident of this state for more than two years prior to October 16, 1923.

Mrs. Sanderson is a well known writer. Judge Barrows also sent a letter to P. Francis Cassidy of Woonsocket, attorney for Mrs. Sanderson, stating that if the court does not hear from his client within a reasonable time it will feel that it is its duty to lay the facts before the attorney-general for suitable action.

Mrs. Sanderson claiming neglect to provide was granted a divorce yesterday, but the decree was recalled when a newspaper informed Judge Barrows that Mrs. Sanderson had not made a legal residence in Providence for two years as required by the state.

Neither Mrs. Sanderson nor her husband appeared in court. The action was conducted on deposition. Mrs. Sanderson asserted in her deposition, that she had lived in Providence a "little more than three years." The newspaper told the court that she had lived here a little more than a year and a half and that she actually had spent only a small part of that time in Providence.

In recalling his decision, Judge Barrows declared that he would not have fraud perpetrated in his court and that he would conduct a full investigation of the claims made in the plaintiff's deposition.

HIRAM IS IN A FIGHTING MOOD

CLEVELAND, Jan. 3.—Senator Hiram Johnson of California arrived here today in a fighting humor and will open his campaign for the republican nomination for president tonight with a discussion of many issues.

"The fight has just begun. It has taken two supreme court decisions to get my name before the people of South Dakota and I have had to fight to put my name before the people of Alabama," he said. "I think I am on the ballot in Alabama, but I am not sure yet."

"Now I hear that a committee has tried to turn this state over to my opponents. Let me tell you that no man or committee can turn the vote of this state, I care not how influential they are, nor how rich they might be. All that I ask is that the people be allowed to select their choice."

SALEM, Jan. 3.—During the year 1923, automobiles operated by Oregon motorists will carry over the state highways and streets approximately 178,125 pounds of license plates. A pair of the plates, which are now being issued by the secretary of the state in large numbers weighs 15 ounces. This year, in the opinion of C. A. Laughridge, chief deputy in the secretary of state's office, there will be about 190,000 cars licensed. These will carry around 2,850,000 ounces of plates alone. AUTO PARK WILL REMAIN OPEN

Roseburg's auto tourist camp grounds will remain open all winter, unless weather conditions become too severe, according to an announcement made this morning by A. J. Young, the owner. There have been only two nights during the past year when the camp grounds were not occupied, and during the month of December there were many nights when seven or eight camps were pitched. Even at present there is an average of four or five tourist camps each night, the cold and wet weather failing to put an end to the movement of the auto tourists.

Although the camp is not a paying proposition during the winter months, it is an accommodation to many tourists, Mr. Young says, and he does not propose to let the word go out that Roseburg is lacking in hospitality. Within two months the early rush will start again, and in the meantime there will be many stragglers, who refuse to be daunted by bad winter conditions, and who will be glad to obtain the accommodations afforded.
