WEATHER CONDITIONS
AR EMODERATING

PORTLAND, Jan. 3.—Continued snowfall today was forecast by the weather bureau. Between three and four inches of snow was on the ground this morning and fine sleet was falling at daybreak. The minimum at 5 a. m. was 10 above zero. Freeze in Imperial Valley.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3.—The southern California freeze shifted its clutch to the Imperial valley last night with Calexico reporting a minimum of 27 degrees above zero. Los Angeles officially recorded 41 down town while it was from five to ten degrees lower in outlying districts. At California Fruit Growers Exchange headquarters it was announced that it was impossible at this time to make an accurate estimate of complete loss for some weeks. Exchange officials believed the loss was small.

Warmer in Medford
MEDFORD, Jan. 3.—With a minimum temperature this morning of 25 above compared to 18 1/2 yesterday, the local weather bureau predicted the inch and one-half of snow which fell during the night would soon disappear and definitely mark the end of the cold wave in southern Oregon.

Washington Cold
SPOKANE, Jan. 3.—Sub-zero temperatures visited eastern Washington again early today, together with snow in some parts of the section. At 8 o'clock it was five below at Wenatchee and 4 below at Spokane, and the weather forecaster here said he could see no hope of much relief for another 24 hours. Deer Park, in this county, reported 35 below.

James Devine, aged 65, a prospector and homesteader was found frozen to death yesterday in his cabin near Metalline Falls, Wash. The family of Jack Will was forced to flee in their night clothes with the temperature at 8 below zero when their home near Priest River, Idaho, was burned last night. Will was seriously burned when he returned to try to save some of their clothing.

BUILDING BOOM IS ON IN SALEM

SALEM, Jan. 3.—Holding records for the last 10 years, shattered in 1923, when \$1,287,282 worth of building permits were issued by Martin Poulsen, city recorder. During the last 12 months a total of 492 permits were issued, against 328 for 1922, the nearest competitor, when buildings totaling \$1,082,270 were constructed or begun. For three consecutive years the permits fell below the \$100,000 mark, with the low ebb in 1918. Permits issued in 1916 were 38, representing \$81,800; 24 in 1917 for \$81,450 and only 12 during the war, representing a total of \$46,200.
