**RECORD WEATHER
CHILLS CHICAGO**

**Mercury Started Dropping
Below Zero at 10 Last
Night to New Record.**

EIGHT BELOW TODAY

**Duluth Has Temperature of
22 Below Zero and Other
Reports Indicate That
Cold Is General.**

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan. 5.—The party frozen body of Charles T. Hay, 68, found lying across railroad tracks, brought the number of dead from cold here today to three.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—A baby was born in a police flivver early today with the temperature far below zero. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cordes started for a hospital to greet the stork, but the car froze in the bitter cold and they called at a police station for assistance. A police flivver was taken. Before the hospital was reached the baby was born.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—Cold weather records of a decade were broken in Chicago today. Beginning at 10 p. m. last night at zero, the mercury dropped steadily until it reached the low record point this morning. Two men were found frozen to death and a woman and another man were partially frozen early today.

George Simizes was taken to a hospital by policemen who found him with a frozen hand and foot, and a woman, struck by an automobile, was frozen when she was left lying in the street for half an hour before found.

Official temperature reading at 8 a. m. read 8 degrees below zero. Low temperatures prevailed throughout the lake district. Duluth thermometers registered 22 below, Green Bay, Wis., saw 16 below and at Escanaba, Mich., it was 14 below, Indiana and Illinois, except along the lakes, had weather a few degrees above zero.

In the northwest the trend of the mercury ranged from zero at Havre, Mont., to 34 below zero at Morhead, Minn. Minnesota, the Dakotas and Nebraska are in the grip of a cold wave that brought markings of from 10 below in Minneapolis to 6 below in North Platte. Salt Lake City temperature is below freezing.

Freezing temperatures or below in many southern states and weather reports indicate a cold wave through the south. In the vicinity of Memphis, thermometers registered in the twenties, Texas points reported reason to below 30 degrees, and threeport, La., last night anticipated ice today.

Along the Gulf of Mexico, cities reported temperatures near the century mark. Tampa thermometers registered 72 degrees and Miami reported 74.

In the eastern states the lowest point was Buffalo, which reported 8 degrees above zero. Below freezing weather was experienced along the Atlantic coast and the east central section as far as North Carolina.

Several Deaths Reported
CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—The severest cold wave in twenty years in the central west, accompanied by several deaths, suffering and interruption of communication today gripped the greater part of the nation. The frigidly swept severely across the northwest and the great central valley region from the Rockies to the Appalachian mountains, holding most of the United States, except the southwest and middle Atlantic districts, in its grasp.

Although the more bitter cold covered Minnesota, the Dakotas, Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois, Kansas, Missouri, Indiana and part of Kentucky, the south and Pacific northwest shivered unusually low temperatures for some of those sections. Montana and Colorado, however, escaped extreme temperatures.

The coldest weather in many years, said reports from Kansas and Nebraska, while Chicago and Illinois suffered with temperatures not equalled since 1912 and exceeded in 1905 and a few earlier years in history of the Chicago district weather bureau.

The temperature ranged from 10 to 25 below over Illinois according to 25 below over Illinois according to weather reports.

**STEAMSHIP DOLLAR
IS REPORTED SAFE**

**Shifting of Deckload of Lumber
Jammed Steering Gear But
Ship Is Now Proceeding
Safely**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, Jan. 5.—The steamship, Empress of Russia should have already reported the Kyoshi Maru which was reported Thursday in a sinking condition with her rudder chains broken in the Pacific ocean 1600 miles off the Washington coast, shipping men were declared today. No word has been received here from the Kyoshi Maru or from the Harold Dollar, which was drifting in the same vicinity with a broken rudder since early yesterday.

Freighter Standing By
SEATTLE, Jan. 5.—The freighter Wheatland Montana sent a message that she was standing by the Harold Dollar, which was bound to Yokohama from Portland with lumber. The message added:

"Shifting deckload jammed Harold Dollar steering gear. Everything now O. K. Harold Dollar proceeding."

A message from the liner President McKinley said that she had reached the Kyoshi Maru, which was Thursday night reported in a sinking condition with broken rudder chains. This message added that the Koshun Maru had arrived and by 8 o'clock last night had relieved the McKinley.

Proceeding Safely
SEATTLE, Jan. 5.—The steamship Harold Dollar was proceeding safely today and aid last night reached the Kyoshi Maru, according to messages received here today by the Admiral Oriental line, an operator of United States shipping board vessels. The Dollar and the Kyoshi had gone adrift with steering trouble in the Pacific ocean about 2500 miles west of here.

**LOSS OF SCHOONER
REPORTED TODAY**

CURLING, N. F., Jan. 5.—The loss of the schooner Donald Silver with her crew of seven men last Thursday in St. George Bay off Heatherton, sixty miles southwest of here was reported today. Five of the bodies have been recovered. The ship was bound from the Bay of Islands to Gloucester, Mass.

Service Disrupted
NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The cold wave in the central west today caused serious interference with telegraph and telephone service, the American Telephone and Telegraph company, which leases a large number of telegraph wires to press association and brokerage houses, reported that service was less than 50 per cent of normal.

Storage Delay Trains
CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—Trains through Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Iowa were from one to four hours late last night and today owing to the high wind and extremely low temperature, according to officials of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Officials of the Chicago and Northwestern and Quincy, said most of the trains on those roads, so far as heard from, were 30 to 60 minutes late. Burlington officials said reports from westbound trains out of Chicago were meagre, owing to interrupted wire service.

The delays of one to four hours seemed general in the Kansas City, Omaha, and Twin Cities territory of the roads.

**SHEEP RAISERS
PLAN BIG MEET**

**One Thousand From All Parts
of U. S. Will Discuss
Problems.**

GRAZING TO BE TOPIC

**Nevada Governor Expected to
Bring Question Before Con-
vention—Several Talks
Are Scheduled.**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 5.—Upward of 1,000 sheep raisers from all parts of the United States are expected to attend the annual convention of the National Wool Growers' association to be held here January 22-24, according to announcement today by Secretary F. K. Marshall.

The question of grazing lands in national forests, as at the Spokane convention last year, is expected to be among the important things discussed. Col. W. B. Greeley, chief of the forest service, has signified that he will be present and tell of the position of the forest service in the matter.

"Three years ago," according to Mr. Marshall, "the forest service announced a new policy of determining grazing charge upon the basis of commercial value. Within recent months the increases to result from this policy have been made known and stock men have objected vigorously to the proposed increases and particularly to the idea of such a change in government policy being established solely by bureau action."

Governor J. C. Crugham of Nevada, is expected to start discussion of the grazing question in behalf of stock men.

Other subjects and the speakers who will introduce them are announced as follows:

Economic conditions of the sheep industry affecting distributing and consumption of meat, Charles J. Brand of the United States department of agriculture.

The relaxation of intermediate credit and joint stock land banks to the wool growers, M. L. Corey, chairman of the federal farm loan board.

The work of the National Livestock and Meat Board, by R. C. Pollock.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Howard M. Gore, also will address the convention, according to Mr. Marshall, but his subject is not known.

LEFT LOS ANGELES LID

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5.—Police today arrested a pair of alleged subscription collectors working under cloak of a fake movement to recall Mayor George E. Cryer and Chief of Police August Vollmer and make Los Angeles a "wide open" city. The two men, Harry J. Rohrbach, and Paul F. Ryan, were charged with petty larceny.

Officers say the men were circulating in the city's half-world collecting funds for the "movement" to oust the mayor and police chief and take the "lid" off Los Angeles.

**NEUNER PROSECUTES
ASTORIA BOOZE CASE**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
ASTORIA, Jan. 5.—With his forces marshalled for the prosecution of three Astorians on charges of possessing liquor and for the defense of one of his agents on a charge of accepting a bribe, George L. Cleaver, state prohibition director, is in Astoria, accompanied by George Neuner, Jr., assistant attorney-general, who will handle the prosecution of the liquor cases and who will defend State Agent McMills in case he is indicted by the grand jury in session.

In addition, Cleaver brought with him B. E. Randall, W. M. McMills, Walter Vinyard, and George Burch, some of his prohibition agents who will be witnesses against Frank Palmer, Ted Houser and Oscar Swan-son.

McMills was arrested on a charge of accepting a bribe from Anton Skojo, proprietor of the Gold Star Hotel, who has since been convicted in federal court on evidence gathered by McMills at the time he was accused of taking the bribe.

**SHERIFF REFUSES
POLICE MESSAGES**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Jan. 5.—Police today announced that the sheriff at Indianapolis has refused to collect messages announcing the arrest here of Harry Hardacre, alias "Curley" O'Brien, who informed local officers that he had escaped jail there three years ago, after having robbed a bank messenger in June, 1920. Hardacre told the police that the same thing occurred when he was in jail at Tucson, Ariz., about a year ago, when the officers there sought to inform Indianapolis of his arrest.

Hardacre today contradicted stories he told yesterday of being wounded in Denver in December, 1922, which led officers to investigate the possibility of his having been involved in the holdup of the Denver mint, December 18, 1922.

Hardacre said he was in jail at Tucson at the time of the Denver hold-up. The police were trying to verify this statement.

**CONTINUED COLD IN
WILLAMETTE VALLEY**

**MABEL NORMAND
MAKES AN APPEAL**

**Asks American Public to
Withhold Judgment Until
Facts Are Given.**

CLAIMS AN INJUSTICE

**Three Principals in New
Years Shooting—Dines
Is Unable to Explain
the Affair.**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5.—Three persons smarted today under what they termed the injustice of a situation created by the shooting here last Tuesday night of Courtland S. Dines, Denver oil operator and clubman.

They are Mabel Normand, motion picture actress; Horace A. Greer, her chauffeur, who fired the shots, and Dines, who was hit by two bullets.

Miss Normand, recuperating from an operation for chronic appendicitis, awaited at the Good Samaritan hospital the effect of an appeal she addressed last night to the American public to "withhold their judgment of me until the facts are explained."

"I feel that I am particularly unfortunate in facing most of the publicity in this tragedy," she said, "and it is unjust for anyone to condemn me before they have heard my story."

Greer, who police described as "a self-constituted hero who shot in outraged dignity," when Miss Normand failed to take seriously his efforts to "rescue" her from Dine's apartment, clung to his original story, that his desire to protect the screen actress, coupled with an equally laudable desire to save his own life, constituted his sole motive for pulling the trigger of Miss Normand's automatic pistol and sending a bullet through Dine's lung.

As for Dines, the injustice of the situation as it affected him was self-evident, "for I don't know why in the world that fool shot me—unless he was full of hop."

What Edna Purviance, the other motion picture actress thought about the course events have taken since the New Years night affray was not revealed, she having remained silent since her recent statement admitting that she and Dines were "engaged," and yet not engaged, if you understand what I mean.

To police the New Years shooting affray was a closed book and a task finished.

Meanwhile interest in the situation growing out of the shooting shifted to the probable effect—or lack of it—which Miss Normand's appeal to the public might have on movements under way in various states to bar films in which she is featured.

What effect her statement might have on the asserted "hero complex" of Greer, was also a matter of interest in the conjecture. Of Greer Miss Normand said last night:

"I can not conceive why my chauffeur should have taken the revolver. I cannot conceive why he should have the audacity to enter my bed room and take it. No one ever asked him to do it. Because he fired those shots, it seems that every censor in the country wants to ban my pictures. Because this man whom I had every reason to believe was just an ordinary chauffeur—because this man, I say, went out of his head, I have to pay the penalty."

At the hospital early today Miss Normand was reported "resting comfortably" and Dine's condition was described as "still serious but satisfactory." He was said to be experiencing pain with every deep breath—due to the wound in his lung.

**PUGET SOUND COLD
WAVE IS ALL OVER**

**VIVING AGAIN HEAD
OF STATE CHAMBER**

PORTLAND, Jan. 5.—Irving W. Vinick of Ashland, was reelected president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce today at a reorganization meeting of the board of directors. Three vice-presidents, representing three districts of the state, instead of two as formerly, were chosen. Roy T. Bishop was reelected to represent the Multnomah county district; R. S. Hamilton of Bend was reelected from the Eastern Oregon district, and Peter Loggie of North Bend, for Western Oregon.

The executive personnel of the organization remains unchanged with A. D. Dudley as manager and J. W. Brewer, executive secretary. The board today discussed plans approved yesterday at the annual meeting and arranged for organization of several bureaus, including financing, organization service, publicity, legislation, research, agriculture, industries, and resorts and travel.

Two new members were added to the board of directors yesterday. They were Julius L. Meier of Portland, succeeding W. O. Munsell, and F. T. Reed of Corvallis, succeeding Arthur Clarke. All other members whose terms had expired were re-elected.

**COPCO CONCERN TO
EXPEND LARGE SUMS**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Jan. 4.—Construction work involving an expenditure of \$2,020,000 is contemplated on the Rogue River in southern Oregon by the California Oregon Power company it was announced here today when the company filed with State Engineer Rhea Lupton four applications for permits to appropriate water for power development.

The applications cover the appropriation of 100 second feet from the southern fork of Rogue River; 100 second feet from Middle Fork of Rogue River; 75 second from Red Blanket Creek, and 50 second feet from Mill Creek, for development of approximately 21,020 horsepower at the prospect plant on Rogue River.

The total expenditure of \$2,020,000 includes the construction of the Middle Fork power plant for development of 5680 theoretical horsepower at a cost of approximately \$815,000.

**MISSING DOCTOR
TOOK WIFE'S MONEY**

TRADE LAKE, Wis., Jan. 5.—Dr. Robert S. Frank, claiming to be an officer of the medical corps at Presidio, San Francisco, who disappeared with an 18-year-old niece of his bride of less than two weeks, took \$1600 of his wife's savings, according to the statement of Cleve J. Strang, district attorney.

Dr. Frank, who married Miss Julia Cedarquist, a nurse, employed at a Seattle, Wash., hospital, is charged by Strang with having deserted his bride, shortly before Christmas. The same day Dr. Frank disappeared from sight, Miss Marion Z. Christopherson, 18-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Christopherson, also disappeared.

**TUT'S TOMB IS
A WORK OF ART**

**Will Be Impossible at Present
to Get View of Giant
Granite Sarcophagus.**

STONE IS BEAUTIFUL

**Howard Carter Beginning to
Show Effect of Heavy
Strain—Has Trouble
With Government.**

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LUXOR, Egypt, Jan. 5.—For the present at least and probably for some time to come, it will be impossible to get a comparative view of the gigantic granite sarcophagus of Pharaoh Tutankhamun, surrounded as it is by the nest of shrines.

There is abundant evidence to show that it fully bears out the surmise of the archaeologists that the sarcophagus of Tutankhamun the magnificent would in every wise be worthy of the great era of art in which the pharaoh reigned. The coffin of Harmahib, his successor, which lies in the depths of Harmahib's ruined tomb, not four hundred yards from the resting place of Tutankhamun, is also of pinkish stone and is of a pretty design and delicate workmanship that represent the great sculpture of Egypt at its best, notably the protective goddesses at the four corners, covering with outspread wings, as it were, the body of the dead king.

It is considered probable that the excavators will arrange for a view of the sarcophagus in its shrine for the official world within the next week or so.

As Mr. Carter is sanguine of being able to radiograph the contents of the coffin through the stone, there is some speculation as to whether, now that the sarcophagus has been found, and he may not after his previously announced decision not to employ roentgen rays on the tomb this season.

Strain on Carter Great
LONDON, Jan. 5.—The correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph at Luxor, Egypt, forwarded the following dispatch:

"Following Howard Carter's magnificent discovery of the contents of the second and successive shrines in the Tutankhamun tomb there has come a sudden slump. Mr. Carter has been working under the highest tension lately and the culmination of his brightest hopes has been followed by a reaction."

"As he walked through the Valley of Kings yesterday afternoon in the blazing sunlight wearing a heavy overcoat, his face was drawn with the heavy strain of the last few days. The correspondent has excellent reason to believe that his relations with the Egyptian government are getting more intolerable all the time, which, coupled with the ever increasing responsibility of the tomb is affecting his constitution, which has not been robust for some years."

"Nevertheless, he is continuing his work, which for the next few days must be robbed of its glamour. Mr. Carter believes he will be able to reach the point where it will be possible to raise the lid of the sarcophagus a fortnight hence when further and more dramatic discoveries are certain."

**REBEL STEAMSHIP
