NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Stock prices developed a firm tone at the opening of today's stock market with a good demand noted for the oils, coppers, southern and western rails and shipping.

Marie preferred, Magma Copper and Pan-American B opened a point or so higher, while United States Cast Iron Pipe advanced 3-4 to its highest price for all time.

Motor, motor accessories and chemical shares joined the upward movement which assumed larger proportions as trading progressed. Market Street Railway preferred advanced two points. General Electric was one of the few soft spots, dropping three points. Foreign exchanges were steady.

GRAIN MARKET

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—New strength quickly developed in the grain markets today. Soon after the opening wheat, corn and oats were all above yesterday's finish, with corn again establishing a new all-around high price record for the season. Initial prices which varied from unchanged figures to half higher, May 76 3/4 to 76 3/8 were followed by moderate further gains.

Wheat rose in sympathy with corn as a result of an advance in Liverpool wheat quotations. On the upturn, however, selling here against buying at Winnipeg became a noticeable feature. The Chicago opening ranged from a shade to half higher, with May 108 3/4 to 108 7/8 and July 107 1/4 to 107 3/8, but after a slight additional advance, something of a reaction took place.

Later the market eased down to influences on the part of scattered holders.

Oats started unchanged to 1-8c higher, May 45 7/8 to 46 and continued firm.

Provisions responded to the strength shown by hogs and corn. Profit-taking sales acted as a weight on the market, later, and resulted in a decline. The close was unsettled, 1-8 to 3-8¢ net lower, May 75 7/8 to 76 to 76.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Jan. 5.—J. E. Ferguson, member of a prominent pioneer family of Salem, succumbed suddenly yesterday to an attack of pneumonia.

FIVE MILLION FEET CASCADE TIMBER CUT

EUGENE, Jan. 5.—Contracted timber in the Cascade national forest during the year 1923 totaled 689,057,690 feet, and there were 5,929,520 feet cut during the year, according to the annual report of Nelson F. MacDuff, supervisor of the forest. There were fourteen sales, two for more than \$5,000 and ten for \$1,000 or under each. The total value of the timber cut during the year was \$135,598, while the value of the timber sold or contracted, \$15,549,025. Lane county is to receive 25 per cent of all the timber receipts from the forest.

LINCOLN LETTERS BRING HIGH PRICE

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 5.—Two letters written by Abraham Lincoln to his secretary of navy, Gideon Wells, brought \$1,250 each here yesterday at a public auction of civil war documents. In one of the letters, relating to the gunboat Monitor, Lincoln said that he was "decidedly of the opinion that she should not go skulking up to Norfolk," for he wrote, Lieutenant Worden had told him the Monitor could be easily boarded and captured. In the letter, dated August 23, 1864, President Lincoln said that he felt he would be defeated for re-election by McClellan. A letter in which he asked for a "war steamer" to cruise the Potomac and protect the approaches to Washington, brought \$470.

RUSSIAN BOATS RESCUE U. S. CREW

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 5.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Post, cabling under yesterday's date, says that the captain of the American steamer Winona, which has just arrived at the Turkish city, reports that two Russian boats rescued the crew of the United States shipping board steamer Conchos which has been reported lost in the Black sea.

The message adds that the Conchos struck a floating mine 160 miles off a port on the Russian coast of the Black sea Friday of last week.

FROST IN PARIS IS STOPPING FLOOD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PARIS, Jan. 5.—The spell of frost weather that set in yesterday after many days of rain, seems likely to last, increasing the hope that the end of the Seine flood is in sight.

With the exception of the disaster of 1910 the flood is the worst the capital has experienced since 1658.

The situation in the suburbs approaches the proportions of a calamity and thousands of citizens face the prospect of financial ruin to their household property. The suburbs which have suffered most are adjacent to the confluence of the Marne and Seine at the very gates of Paris. They are populated entirely by workers.

The retaining wall at the entrance of the Invalides railroad station collapsed for a distance of 100 feet this morning and the water from the Seine immediately rushed in. The station has been closed since Tuesday because of danger from the floods.

JUSTICES ARE APPOINTED

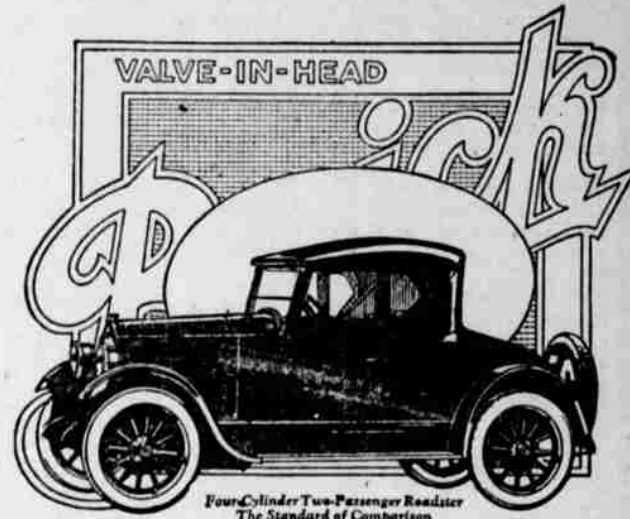
