Tuesday afternoon The Sun received a telephone message from Roseburg making inquiry regarding a report there to the effect that a young woman had been assaulted and seriously injured while in Sutherlin last Monday night, says the Sutherlin Sun. The Sun had heard nothing of the affair, but an investigation of the report brought to light the fact that a party of two or three men from Roseburg, accompanied by women, visited Sutherlin Monday night for the purpose of attending a dance in progress in Community Hall. At it was evident that two or three members of the party, including one of the women, were intoxicated, they were not allowed to enter the hall.

The intoxicated woman, who was in the back seat of the car with one of the men, became sick and vomited over the cushions and the Sunday suit of her companion. A little later she became somewhat hysterical and the car was driven into the alley at the rear of the postoffice. Here one of the men attempted to stop her ravings by placing his hand over her mouth. The woman rolled from the seat onto the floor of the car and in an effort to regain her "perch," the door flew open and she slid partially out of the flitter, exposing much of her undergarments to a gaping crowd of "rubbernecks" who had been attracted to the vicinity by her hysterical cries.

DOUBLE ELECTION BOARDS INCREASED

The county court today authorized County Clerk I. B. Riddle, to increase the number of double election boards in the county, and it is expected that there will be nearly twice as many counting boards established for the elections to be held this year. The county clerk is now engaged in making up the boards and the list will be presented to the court for adoption in a few days.

In all precincts where there are more than 100 registered voters, double boards are being provided. This is expected to greatly aid in making up election returns, and the task of tabulating the vote will be completed quickly. With primaries in May and the general election in November, it is expected that the boards will have some hard work before them, and the court is making every preparation to conduct the elections as rapidly and economically as possible.

The double election board system has proven very satisfactory in the county, and has resulted in returns being received with much less delay than under the old system.

PAULUS RESIGNS FROM GROWERS

SALEM, Jan. 5.—It was officially announced yesterday by Kenneth C. Miller, president of the board of directors of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association and the Oregon Growers packing corporation, that Robert C. Paulus, general manager of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association and its affiliated packing and warehousing company, the Oregon Growers Packing corporation, had tendered his resignation to the board of directors of both companies at their meeting last Friday, December 28.

In tendering his resignation to the directors Mr. Paulus stated that during the first year of the organization before he became manager, the packing company had invested too heavily in packing plants in anticipation of additional acreage of fruits which was never signed up, and as a result it was badly over-invested and correspondingly under-financed; that at the end of that year upon taking the general management of both concerns, which was conferred upon him at that time, it became necessary for him to devote practically all of his time and energy in connection with financial matters while pulling the organization through the serious financial stringency following the deflation period.

The obstacles of this financial condition had been gradually overcome, but the handling of the situation, the marketing of enormous crops through this period of poor markets, the reduction of a heavy overhead under

which the concern was organized and the building of a smooth working organization had taxed his strength to the utmost, and he felt a severe need for rest. He tendered his resignation to take effect on April 1, or as soon thereafter as the board felt they could spare him.

The board of directors felt the justice of this request and after almost every member of the board had taken occasion to pay tribute to the manner in which the manager had met the various problems of the last four years, reluctantly accepted the resignation, with regret at losing a man as valuable and courageous as Mr. Paulus has proven to be. The board accepted Mr. Paulus' resignation, however, only on condition that it should not go into effect until after April 1.

FARM LABOR WAGES HIGHER DURING 1923

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Wages of farm labor were higher last year than since 1920, the department of agriculture reported today. The average rate with board was \$33.18 and without board \$46.91 a month. The rates in 1914 were \$21.05 and \$29.58, respectively.

Day wages of harvest labor with board averaged \$2.45 last year, compared with \$1.55 in 1914.

BRITISH CREW SEEKS RELEASE FROM BAIL

LONDON, Jan. 4.—Great Britain has asked the United States for the release from bail of the British and Canadian members of the crew of the British schooner Yomoka, alleged rum runner seized last November beyond the three mile limit off New York.

The request for the release of the crew is being made through Henry C. Clifton, the charge d'affaires in Washington, at the instance of the Canadian government. Further information is being sought by the British government respecting the circumstances attending the seizure of the Yomoka beyond the three mile limit.

NEUNER NOT TO ACT IN LABBE TRIAL

SALEM, Or., Jan. 3.—Any action that may be taken to the end of prosecuting A. G. Labbe, prominent Portland man, who was arrested late Monday night when operatives from the state prohibition department raided his home during the progress of a New Year's party, is entirely in the hands of Stanley Myers, district attorney of Multnomah county.

This was announced by Governor Pierce tonight following a two hours' conference attended by the executive, George L. Cleaver, state prohibition director, and Willard M. Houston, who was said to have been in charge of the raiders. Mr. Houston is chief deputy under Mr. Cleaver.

Although George Neuner of Roseburg, who recently was selected by the attorney general to prosecute a number of liquor cases in Lincoln and Clatsop counties was at the conference, the governor denied that Mr. Neuner took any part in the discussion of the Labbe case.

"You can say," said Governor Pierce, when asked with reference to Mr. Neuner's presence at the conference "that there will be no special prosecutor appointed to handle the case involving Mr. Labbe. Mr. Cleaver in the role of state prohibition director, has placed the evidence against Mr. Labbe in the hands of the Multnomah county district attorney, and
