ly taken from the Klamath Indian reservation by the United States government in 1876, will be filed by the Klamath Indians in the United States court of claims sometime before April 1, according to announcement here. In 1864 the Klamath Indians made a treaty with the government embracing a territory known as the Klamath Indian reservation. Twelve years later, in 1876, the government made a survey of the reservation, and according to allegations, established new boundary lines inside the boundaries established by the treaty. The tract of land alleged illegally taken from the reservation is said to be 1,200,000 acres. On June 20, 1920, the government gave permission to be sued by the Indians and recently the secretary of interior approved the lawyers selected by the Indians. A commissioner will be appointed by the government to take testimony in the case in Chillicothe and the case will then be tried on the testimony before the court of claims in Washington.

NEW JAP CABINET IS JUST STOP-GAP

Merely A Step to Full Government Posts Until After the Wedding of Prince Regent to Be Held January 29

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) TOKYO, Jan. 5.—The new cabinet, formed by Viscount Kiyoura with the endorsement of the Kenkyukai and which is to take office tomorrow, is regarded by political observers here as a mere stop-gap to fill the government posts until after the wedding of the Prince Regent. This now is expected to be solemnized January 29.

The selection of Baron Fujimura as minister of foreign affairs, upset the predictions of the political prophets who had expected that the long-established policy of selecting a trained diplomat for that office would be adhered to in the naming of the new cabinet. Baron Fujimura, however, has an unusual acquaintance with Chinese affairs through his long residence in Shanghai and through his business career, during which he was connected with the Mitsui interests. He is an English scholar, having been graduated from Cambridge university and having resided in England for a number of years as head of the London branch of the Mitsui concern. His elevation to the postage followed his retirement from business. He at one time engaged in a newspaper business in Osaka, which was, however, unsuccessful.

U. S. WILL BUILD LIGHT GUN BOATS

Will Maintain a Yangtze Patrol To Combat Activities of Pirate on River in China Say Officials

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—Orders received here announcing the suspension temporarily of all naval construction on the Pacific coast, revealed the fact that the United States contemplates the construction of a flotilla of light draught gun boats for the sole purpose of combating pirate activities on the Yangtze river of China. The Yangtze patrol" as it is called has been maintained by the American navy for many years in collaboration with patrols of other nations, to keep down the fierce piratical attacks that otherwise would drive all commerce from the great waterway.

These attacks have been greatly accentuated by the political chaos of China, and the flotilla is designed to restore order and protect commerce. The patrol is made up at present of seven small gun-boats, but their draught is designed particularly for deep sea work and they are greatly hindered by the Yangtze shoals. Four are old Spanish gunboats captured by Admiral Dewey at Manila bay.

The new patrol is designed to protect the great flood of commerce between Shanghai and the up-river ports. At present it is necessary to put American marines on the merchant boats to protect them from the river snipers. The twelfth district naval headquarters here announced today that the two remaining naval shipyards, the Bethlehem plant here and the Todd plant at Tacoma, would be in a position to bid for the construction of the vessels.

MELLON TAX BILL FOUGHT BY DEMOCRAT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Democratic house leaders are preparing to launch a fight against several important provisions of the Mellon tax bill, among them the proposal to reduce sur-tax rates to a maximum of 25 per cent on net incomes exceeding \$100,000.
