OIL COMPANY HAS HOLDINGS IN OREGON

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 5.—The Acme-Oregon Oil company, a subsidiary concern of the Acme Production company, which has been mentioned in congressional circles in connection with operations of Leonard Wood, Jr., has holdings amounting to approximately 200,000 acres in Oregon and Washington, according to E. P. Todd, capitalist of Hermiston, Ore. Leonard Wood, Jr., president of the Acme Production company is named on the Acme-Oregon letterheads as head of the organization which has extensive holdings around Hermiston in Umatilla county and around Heppner in Morrow county. Claude Baker, representative of the concern December 1, stated that actual drilling operations were to start around Hermiston January 1, but as yet they have not been started. Mr. Dodd said. Approximately \$10,000 was spent in this vicinity for leases a year and a half ago says Mr. Dodd. No western capital is believed to be invested in the Acme-Oregon concern. An oil well being sunk at Hermiston at the present time is being financed by local capital and has no connection with the Acme-Oregon company.

MYRTLE CREEK WOMAN DEAD

Mrs. Mary Hedgepeth, wife of W. P. Hedgepeth, died at her home in Myrtle Creek on January 4, and was buried in the pioneer cemetery there. Mrs. Hedgepeth was born in Clifton, Ohio, and was 89 years of age when death occurred. Fifty-five years ago she taught school near Oregon City.

OPERATIONS OF OIL COMPANY PROBED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Stock sales, transfers and exchanges which brought to Hyva corporation a present bank credit balance of \$2,000,000, were detailed to the senate public lands committee today by Harry F. Sinclair, oil promoter, and leader of the Tea Pot Dome Naval Oil Reserve.

Mr. Sinclair did not repeat the protest made on his last appearance against being called upon to answer questions concerning the "private business affairs of himself and his associates." He told of the transfer to the Hyva corporation of one million shares of the Mammoth Oil company, organized to operate the Tea Pot Dome lease and said that the Hyva purchased outright from Mammoth 191,200 additional shares for \$3,250,000. Hyva sold 100,000 shares for \$3,000,000, he said, and that 5,000 shares with a block of Sinclair Consolidated to H. P. Whitney for securities which later were disposed of for \$3,250,000.

"What sum remains to the credit of Hyva from these deals?" asked Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana. "About \$2,000,000," said the witness.

The price of the stock distributed to the 15 members of the Mammoth Oil Syndicate group averaged \$17 a share, Mr. Sinclair said. He also analyzed the composition and holdings of the Selah corporation, another of his subsidiaries. He was excused from the stand with the assurance from the members of the committee that his return probably would not be required.
