CLEVELAND FOR BAD BOOZE BAN AT CONVENTION

Pre-War Stock Is Virtually Depleted, but Plenty of Potent Poison Present.

FEDERAL MEN ON JOB

Expect to Have Dispensers of Home-Made Hootch Spotted Shortly.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 8.—If State Prohibition Commissioner B. F. McDonald, when he promised to make Cleveland "dry" during the republican convention which assembles here June 10, meant that liquor of pre-war quality...

However, if he meant that home-made concoctions, "poison," and diluted stuff imported from Canada will likewise be taboo for delegates and visitors...

Law enforcement in Cleveland is probably better than that in the average large city, but Cleveland is decidedly "moist" in spots...

There is no pre-war liquor left in Cleveland," it was declared. "Even the jealously guarded supplies of those who wanted to keep a little in the house in case of sickness has long since disappeared...

In addition, there is lots of synthetic gin, it is claimed, that is being dispensed and various concoctions made in cellar stills...

Authorities also claim that a vast quantity of etherized beer is dispensed daily over Cleveland bars.

"There is mighty little good liquor coming to Cleveland from any source now," an ex-saloon keeper said. "The dangers of rum-running have been increasing every month...

"Liquor law violations are constantly decreasing," a Federal official asserted. "Bad booze is killing many of the old toppers...

Reports are that a large number of state dry officers will make Cleveland their headquarters for a month or more before the convention meets...

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 8.—Norman (Red) Ryan, bank bandit and escaped convict, who recently was captured with confederates in a street fight with Minneapolis police, was sentenced today by Justice Judge Costawart to imprisonment for life, with 30 lashes to be given at the rate of ten a month for three months.

SEVENTY ENGINES FIGHT BIG BLAZE (Associated Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, Jan. 8.—One of the biggest fires London has seen in years was still blazing at daylight this morning in the neighborhood of the West India docks. The flames, which started at 3 o'clock yesterday morning, up to an early hour this morning had involved no buildings of importance, but rubber, oil and similar inflammables stored in warehouses, caused a tremendous blaze.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—General consolidation of railroads as tentatively suggested by the Interstate commerce commission was characterized as a bad and unworkable public policy by representatives of the Delaware and Hudson railroad, arguing today before the commission.

STUDENT OF UNIVERSITY IS DEAD Lawrence, Kan., Jan. 8.—A Weaver, Kansas University's best student, is dead. Mr. Weaver obtained his engineering degree from the university at the age of 21 last June, died of pneumonia at his home at Pueblo, Colo., last week.

SITUATION IS PITIABLE Oregon Methodist Bishop Appeals for Aid for Starving German Children. Bishop W. O. Shepard of Oregon, with headquarters in Portland, is a keen sympathizer with and supporter of the efforts now in progress throughout the state and nation to collect a fund of money for the relief of starving German children, of whom there are several millions. Bishop Shepard is a member of the Oregon committee which is endeavoring to raise \$100,000 in this state and is giving it his personal attention.

AMERICAN CHARITY ALONE CAN SAVE German Children Facing Starvation; Oregon Is Raising \$100,000 to Help Them. The very latest official word from headquarters of the American Committee for Relief of German Children, of which Major-General Allen, commander of the American troops on the Rhine during occupational days, is national director, is that conditions in Germany beggar description. Millions of children, under-nourished because of food scarcity and frightfully pitiable conditions resulting from the war, absolutely face starvation; American charity alone will save them, it is declared officially in dispatches from General Allen and Herbert Hoover, on President Coolidge's authority.

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
