VENIZELOS RECOVERS FROM HIS ILLNESS

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Ex-premier Venizelos of Greece has recovered from his indisposition and seems to be planning to become a figure in the new cabinet says a dispatch from Athens today. He is declared to have become optimistic regarding the achievements of unity within the nation and to be highly satisfied with the conversations he has had with the opposition leaders.

"Everything," adds the dispatch, "points to the definite overthrow of the Gluckeburg dynasty."

REBELS EVACUATE IMPORTANT POSITION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) MEXICO CITY, Jan. 8.—Revolutionary forces under Col. Ismael Rodriguez, which recently occupied Tuxpam, an important oil center in northern Vera Cruz, have evacuated the city, according to a statement given out at the headquarters of General Anuelfo Gomez, commander of the Mexico City garrison.

A wireless dispatch from Mexico City via Fort Worth also dated January 7, but apparently filed from the Mexican capitol last night, stated that rebel leaders denied published reports that they had evacuated Tuxpam.

SEIZURE OF SHIP CAUSES DISCUSSION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Seizure of the British schooner Kewstead by United States authorities at Wilmington, N. C., after the ship had put in repairs, carrying a cargo of intoxicating liquor, has been the subject of a new inquiry filed with the state department by the British government through its embassy here.

The action is believed to be preliminary to the filing of a formal protest. Meanwhile the state department is waiting for information from the treasury department.

ASSAULT PROPAGANDA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Propaganda directed at congress, particularly with reference to tax reduction proposals, was assailed today by Representative Jones, democrat of Texas, "because of the issue and making intelligent legislation much more difficult."

"We are getting to be a government by groups and the victim of propaganda," Mr. Jones said. "Some old boy, or some group, will conceive an idea to save the country. He'll organize his little group and wire all over the United States, saying 'Wire or write your congressman to do so and so,' then they operate frequently by mis-stating or exaggerating the facts and beating the 'tom-tom' and finally wind up by 'causing' the 'Yolthead act.'"

SENATE DEADLOCK STILL UNBROKEN

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—On two more ballots today the senate failed to break its deadlock over the chairmanship of the interstate commerce committee and adjournment was taken until tomorrow.

The first ballot showed: Smith, democrat, South Carolina, 32; Cummins, republican, Iowa, 26; Couzens, republican, Michigan, 12, and Fess, republican, Ohio, 1.

Smith thus was four short of the necessary majority.

The second ballot, the 29th since the deadlock began, also was without result. Smith had 24 votes.

LEAVES FOR PORTLAND

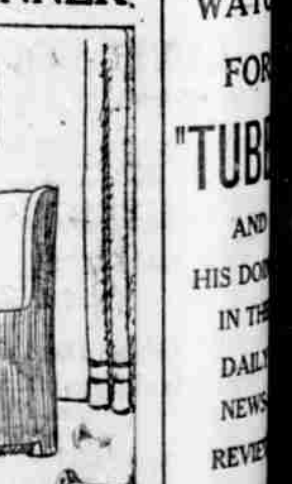
