THIBET MAY BE BURIAL PLACE FOR NASHVILLE DOCTOR

"Roof of the World" May Be the Resting Place for Man Who Tried to Bring Christianity to the Forbidden Land

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 8.—The eastern border of Thibet, "the roof of the world," may be the burial place of the second Nashville physician to give his life in the effort to bring Christianity and modern science to the forbidden land, if the city of Batang, in western Szechuan, China, is taken by the Thibetan bandits, who surround it, according to press dispatches. It is believed the bandits hold as prisoners Dr. William M. Hardy, representative of the Vine Street Christian church, of this city, his wife, and three children, Dr. W. H. Duncan and wife, also of the Foreign Christian Missionary society, and J. P. Morse and wife, of the United Charities commission.

Dr. Hardy is the successor of Dr. Loftis as a representative of the Vine Street church. He volunteered to go into the dangerous mission station as soon as news reached Nashville of the death from plague of Dr. Loftis several years ago.

Dr. Loftis' death followed in 1922 by the death of Dr. Albert LeRoy Shelton, several miles from Batang, on February 17, at the hands of a band of robbers. Dr. Shelton was buried beside Dr. Loftis. His death came as he was returning from an unsuccessful attempt to enter the forbidden territory of inner Thibet.

MOVIE INDUSTRY ON BUSINESS BASIS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Jan. 8.—Production costs have been brought under control, thus solving a major problem of the Famous Players-Lasky company, and for the motion picture industry as a whole, it was announced by officials of the company here today co-incidental with a reopening of production work following two months shut-down of the company's studios here.

A re-organization has been effected of methods and personnel of the production of the forces of the motion picture institution, it was announced. The studios here were shut down early in November, with an announcement from the Famous Players-Lasky company that a reorganization was necessary to eliminate wasteful extravagance and to bring costs under control.

These costs of production, it was said at that time, had gone beyond control through unnecessary expenditures and unwarranted extravagance growing out of unbridled competition in the market for bigger and better pictures. During November and December film executives of Lasky as well as other production companies worked out plans which were announced today as in effect in the Lasky West Coast studios.

McADOO VANGUARD IS IN TENNESSEE

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 8.—The vanguard of supporters of William Gibbs McAdoo for president reached Nashville Monday night, ready to sound the tocsin of political war today, when leaders within the democratic party will assemble from all parts of the state and from many parts of the country, to launch officially the state campaign for McAdoo.

The McAdoo supporters are determined to carry to a finish the fight for an instructed delegation from Tennessee to the democratic convention.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8.—Something of the rugged character and leadership of Andrew Jackson injected into American public affairs would "re-inspire the nation," William Gibbs McAdoo, war time director general of railroads, today told democrats of Tennessee, in a message sent to the conference of party leaders meeting in Nashville in celebration of Jackson Day.

"Please extend my greetings and best wishes," Mr. McAdoo's message stated, "to my friends who are meeting in Nashville on Jackson Day. If we can get something of Jackson's integrity, courage, decision, rugged character and leadership into the conduct of public affairs it will re-inspire the nation. Jackson never offered negatives when a stimulating fight in the service of democracy was demanded."
