FIFTH PARLIAMENT ASSEMBLES TODAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LONDON, Jan. 8.—Although King George's fifth parliament, assembled today, met in an atmosphere of eager political expectation, the first session itself offered no opportunity for sensational development, for its only immediate business was the unopposed re-election of the Right Hon. Whitely as speaker of the commons with the customary felicitations from the leaders of the three political parties.

The real political interest of the first few days lies outside the halls of parliament. In the meeting places of the various parties and in their organizations, at which the country's immediate political future will be shaped.

Today's session of the national executive committee of the labor party is to select Ramsey MacDonald and to appoint the party's officers. It is understood that the cabinet meets tomorrow for final drafting of the King's speech from the throne at the formal opening of parliament next week.

FEAR MISSIONARIES MAY SUFFER HARM

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8.—Fear was expressed here today for the safety of a party of 12 missionaries sent to China by the missionary board of the Christian church and believed to be not far from Hainan, center of the Orient depredations by Chinese bandits. Alarmed over inability to get word to or from the party, Dr. Royal J. Ives, field secretary for the board of missions, has wired the general headquarters of the Christian church at St. Louis asking them that immediate efforts be made to get in touch with them.

An important business deal was completed today when A. J. Lilburn and Son, local insurance firm, sold their business to Herbert D. Quine, and James T. Goodman. TOMMY GIBBONS STARTS TRAINING

ST. PAUL, Jan. 8.—Confident that negotiations now under way for another bout with Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, will be staged, Tommy Gibbons, of St. Paul, said today he plans to get an early start in conditioning himself for the prospective match.

Gibbons now is in fairly good shape, he said, weighing close to 195 pounds, or about 15 pounds more than when he fought Dempsey at Shelby, Montana, last July 4, staying the full fifteen rounds with the champion, but losing the decision. Word that a second bout between the two is in sight and that prospects for the match "look exceedingly bright" was received by Gibbons yesterday in a letter from his manager, Eddie Kane, who is in the east.

SPANISH WAR VETS FIGHTING PARDON

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 8.—The local camp of Spanish War Veterans last night adopted a resolution protesting against a petition now in circulation to procure from the government a pardon for Mrs. Alma Louise Wurtzbarger, who killed her husband at Chemawa about three years ago. The action of the veterans is on grounds that Wurtzbarger was a Spanish War veteran and that there is evidence indicating that the murder was in cold blood. Mrs. Wurtzbarger is a federal prisoner for the reason that the crime was committed at their home on the premises of the Chemawa Indian school. She is held at the Oregon prison for the reason that her health would not permit her to be taken to a federal prison. The local post will ask the state department to request all other local posts in the state to take similar action.

NEW SCHOOL LAW FOR WASHINGTON

OLYMPIA, Jan. 8.—A movement to amend the state laws to compel all children in the state of Washington between the ages of 8 and 16 to attend the public schools unless mentally or physically incapacitated, has been begun through a petition for an initiative measure filed with Secretary of State J. O. Grant this today.

When this initiative measure has been given a ballot title, petitions will be circulated for signatures. The proposed bill would amend state statutes in such a manner as to render attendance at private or parochial schools unlawful; and parents of pupils not sent to the public schools would be liable to a fine of \$5 to \$100 and imprisonment of from two to thirty days.

A labor clause is provided by which pupils 14 years old or over might be excused from school by a superior court judge to go to work. It is proposed that the measure go into effect if passed in September, 1925.

MORE CHARGES IN TRIAL OF BANKER

CHELSEA, Wash., Jan. 8.—John I. O'Phelan, prosecuting attorney of Pacific county, told a jury in the Lewis county superior court here today that State Senator Percy L. Sinclair not only knew of irregularities in the Southwestern Washington Bank at Ilwaco, of which the senator was president, but had money of which there was no record, set aside in the bank for his private use.

SEEK TO VINDICATE REV. LEE HEATON

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Nothing but a complete vindication of the Rev. Lee W. Heaton of Fort Worth, Tex., whose trial for heresy recently was called off, can be taken as an evidence of fairness, said a statement issued today by a group of leading moderate clergymen and laymen of the Protestant Episcopal church.

COUNTIES APPEAR BEFORE COMMISSION

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—The state highway commission meeting here this afternoon faced delegates from a number of county delegations asking the road work ranging in cost from \$5,000 to \$50,000. Contracts for two large road projects and several smaller jobs are to be awarded. The two large contracts are for

re-surfacing with crushed rock 22 miles of the Old Oregon Trail between Umatilla and Echo, and for re-surfacing with rock 17 miles of highway between Bandon and Coquille in Coos county.

County Judge W. A. Wood is heading a delegation from Curry county. The entire county courts from Umatilla, Malheur, Baker and Grant counties are here.

The Malheur county residents want the Jordan Valley road improved as quickly as possible because improvements on the Idaho side of the state line are diverting the trade of the Jordan Valley country to Idaho towns. The two commissioners of Walla Walla county also are on hand.

KIWANIS MEET IN LIVELY SESSION

Roseburg Kiwanians came back from their holiday vacation of two weeks stronger than ever and at today's luncheon session participated in one of the snappiest meetings ever held by the Roseburg club.

Several five-minute speakers entertained the members today and Mayor Nap Rice, speaking on a Roseburg Beautiful, failed to keep his weather eye on the alarm clock and was sent by the gavel. The mayor, however, gave the boys just the stuff they wanted to hear and when Kiwanian Nap gets warmed up to his subject it takes more than a gavel to end his speech. Walt Fisher, and Carl Neal, both gave fine talks, the former discussing the dry goods business and the latter the Umpqua Forest Reserve.

A City Beautiful committee was appointed and a resolution endorsing the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce drive for membership was passed.

The new Kiwanis quartette sang two numbers which were heartily enjoyed. Harry Johnson led the boys in some lively song numbers and the meeting closed with a bang.

Two games with Myrtle Creek and one with the Alumni have been played and won, with the opening of the season over events coming only to 31 points. Nothing informative has been given out on the Eugene team except information that with the opening of the season over eighty students turned out for practice. Outside of that there has been nothing said concerning the strength of the team, but the locals are practicing hard and steady and will be ready to meet the strongest team they can put up.

LABOR LEADER GIVES AN ADDRESS

LONDON, Jan. 8.—"We are not going to take office in order to prepare for a general election, but for the purpose of work," said Ramsey MacDonald, the labor party leader, at a labor demonstration at Albert Hall tonight. "If capital flies from the country when we come into power it will be the panic mongers who will be responsible, not the labor party."

"There is not a capital city today but contains embers which a fresh blowing wind will scatter over the inflammable material in Europe and start a new war," he continued.

"My party desires to enter office with a broad foot and a big heel to stamp upon every one of these embers."

The pompous folly of standing aloof from the Russian government will be ended," he added.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The administration shipping board plan worked out and approved by President Coolidge is regarded by him as contemplating the maintenance of the integrity of the shipping board with the emergency fleet corporation as a subordinated agency.

The resolution now before the board looking toward the divorce of fleet operations from the board and placing it under the fleet corporation does not, in the opinion of the fleet corporation, he holds, any of its final authority. The head of the fleet corporation, he holds, would simply act as a manager under orders of the board.
