MELLON'S TAX PROGRAM.

Secretary Mellon suggests a program of tax reductions which he estimates would cut down the total assessment by \$523,000,000. If this reduction could go into effect, many concerns that have reckoned their federal income taxes as one of the expenses of their business, would no longer have to add to their prices a sum sufficient to pay these assessments. Thus such a reduction would benefit the non-tax paying consumer. It would encourage people to put their money into industrial enterprises instead of into tax exempt bonds. A heavy weight of taxation rests as a kind of cold blanket on the courage and enthusiasm of the whole community. Opinions will differ as to just how such decreases should be apportioned but the country is in great need of lower taxes. However, any reduction in federal income taxes should be passed on the consumer, otherwise it would benefit only those persons having a sufficient income already and well able to pay the present rate of taxation.

Some modern philosophers think that the only permanent way for the human race to make progress, is through the evolutionary process of natural selection. The fittest will survive, they say, and eventually assure the progress of the race. Helping the unfit to survive through charities and philanthropies, they say, may tend to weaken the race as a whole. The trouble with that theory is that it places too high a value on material power. The moral and spiritual fit are at a disadvantage under such a system, as they are not usually so good at war and fighting. According to that theory, Germany should have won the war. It had developed power and efficiency more than any other nation. But human progress would have been set back many years if Germany had won the war, for it had not developed those generous and moral qualities that are necessary for human progress. The world needs something other than physical power and material efficiency.

Millions of dollars are lost to agriculture every year through harmful insects. The birds are their natural enemies. They also destroy the seeds of weeds, act as scavengers, and in the winter eat the eggs and grubs of insects. Most states having ornithologists have requested that persons kindly disposed towards birds place food in their usual haunts. The cold season is here and, with regular supply of food cut off, the birds are now facing the period in which there is great danger of extermination by starvation. Although the songsters have migrated the ones remaining deserve attention. A little grain will do much to relieve the birds' distress during the winter. Or, if this is too much trouble, table crumbs thrown to them will be welcome. Watching the cat will also be appreciated, and this is small enough compensation for services rendered.—Wheeling, West Va., Intelligencer.

A milking contest was held the other day between Senator Magnus Johnson and Secretary of Agriculture Wallace. It may not be possible to induce many senators and cabinet secretaries to learn how to milk, but some people feel that it would be a good thing if every boy could spend some time working on a farm. He would thereby be taught to use his head and hands more, and hired service less. Also such an every day art as milking would teach him something. Learning how to so influence the cow that she would give milk freely, might help him later in the art of influencing people, who often show cow like traits.

BANKS TO MAINTAIN
UNIFORM HOURS

An announcement was made today by the Roseburg banks, that starting with January 15 the national and state banking department rules regarding the opening and closing of banks will be strictly observed. The banks will open their doors at 9 o'clock and will close every day at 3 o'clock. In the past the banks have been accommodating some of the business houses and others of their patrons, by leaving side or back entrances open after the doors were closed to the general public. This was an appreciated accommodation, but was not in accordance with the banking rules. As an additional safeguard to public funds, and in order to fully comply with the rules, both state and national, the banks of Roseburg have announced their intention of adhering strictly to the opening and closing hours regularly fixed.

BRITISH LABOR PARTY IS ACTIVE

Mass Meeting Held Last Night in London Was Serious—"Red Flag" Is Sung.

REMARKS NOT RADICAL

Ramsay MacDonald Tells Compatriots Labor Party Will Proceed in Conservative Manner.

(Associated Press London Wire.)
LONDON, Jan. 9.—Ramsay MacDonald's address in Albert hall last night, in which he informed his laborer compatriots, and through them the nation at large, that if he should be made premier, his policy would be one of peace at home and abroad, is interpreted as indicating that the labor party will proceed conservatively and slowly, with no inclination to press the extreme articles of the labor platform.

The meeting was a serious affair, even though the audience loudly sang "The Red Flag," and failed to sing "God Save the King."

The speaker made few remarks that could be hailed as radical, and gave every evidence that the party for some time considered as Great Britain's revolutionary faction, did not intend to make drastic changes.

The only opportunity for a demonstration by the radicals with Russian leanings came when Mr. MacDonald said that one of the first acts of labor would be to end the pernicious folly of alcoholism. Scattered shouts of approval burst from widely separated sections of the crowd, but it was nothing to compare with the ovation later accorded Margaret Bonfield, a frail little woman, whose voice carried to the loftiest galleries of the big building. She seemed to touch the hearts of the whole audience, and everybody there joined in applauding her simple recitation of the story of the "Man named Jesus" whose creed was the brotherhood of man. The labor party, she said, wanted to walk in his footsteps.

From the expected flood of lobby rumors to which the first meeting of the new parliament gave rise, there emerged reports involving the three parties. One of these says that a section of the conservatives is disgruntled with what it regards as Mr. Baldwin's hasty and mistaken action in precipitating an election, thus losing the conservative majority.

Another says that a faction of the Liberals is equally disgruntled with Herbert Asquith's determination to help the laborites into power while still another rumor is built around the supposed disapproval by a group in the labor party of Ramsay MacDonald accepting the prospective premiership, which it is held, he can only hold on the suffrage of the laborites.

The resumption of full diplomatic relations with Russia, involving recognition de jure, is understood to be one of the first acts contemplated by the labor administration, according to the diplomatic correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, and there are many others who think this prediction will be fulfilled, according to Mr. MacDonald's opinion voiced last night.

Officers Re-Elected
LONDON, Jan. 9.—The parliamentary labor party, at a meeting in the house of commons today, presided over by Ramsay MacDonald, re-elected its officers en bloc temporarily, pending possible developments in the political situation.

The meeting also endorsed the decision of the two national committees and the executive officers of the parliamentary party that in the event of the labor party being permitted to form a government the opportunity should be taken.

The parliamentary labor party will meet again next Tuesday to consider the speech from the throne and the drafting of an amendment to it.

PORTO RICO SENDS
DELEGATES TO U. S.

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Jan. 9.—Porto Rico is sending to Washington today a commission of 11 members to seek at the hands of congress further modifications of its organic law. Governor Victor M. Townsend, appointed by President Harding, is an ex-officio member of the commission, which will also work for an elective governor.
