READING CONGRESSIONAL DIRECTORY NOW POPULAR INDOOR SPORT IN CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Washington's annual winter novel just off the presses is being devoured with great avidity in the lobbies and drawing rooms of the national capital these days. It is the congressional directory, containing the biographies of some 600 members of congress and other figures in political and official life who can be classed under the general heading of "prominent."

Interest in this annual publication is heightened this year because there are several hundred new members of the senate and house about whom comparatively little was known hitherto.

All officials, from President Coolidge down to the least known member of congress, write their own sketches, or have their secretaries do it for them, and the results are always interesting and sometimes comical.

Some go into the most minute details of their personal and official life, some are short to the point of not telling anything; some are frankly boastful, some are very serious, others are written in an obvious spirit of levity. The composite effort provides Washington with many hours of interesting reading about the great and the near great.

Coolidge Brief
 President Coolidge is very brief and matter of fact, his biography taking up but nine and one-half lines, as compared, for instance, with that of Senator Henry Cabot Lodge (R.), of Massachusetts, whose narration of his political and literary history occupies an imposing space of forty-three lines. The president confines himself to stating what offices he has held, when he was born and where, and when he married and when. Senator Lodge gives the flues of most of the books he has written and the offices he has held during a long and varied life.

Two members of congress run a dead heat for brevity. They are: Senator Caraway (D.), of Arkansas, and Representative Mead (D.), of New York.

"P. H. Caraway, Democrat of Jonesboro," and "James M. Mead, Democrat, Buffalo," is all that appears under their respective names.

Representative Edgar Howard (D.), of Nebraska, who used to be William Jennings Bryan's secretary when the commoner was in congress, apparently wrote his own. He failed to reveal his age, merely stating he was "born before the war" (he doesn't even say which war), and goes on to state that "he held offices of probate judge, member of the Nebraska legislature and lieutenant governor of Nebraska, while holding contemporaneously the higher office of editor of a country newspaper, and still in that estate."

He further states that he was married at a lawful age and is still married.

Progeny His Pride
 Representative Casey (D.), of Pennsylvania, holds the record for the largest family in either house. He has eleven children, eight boys and three girls, he records, and he

names them. Representative Knud Wefald (F. L.), of Minnesota, runs him a close race with ten children. Representative Free (R.), of California records the fact that he is the father of two sets of twins.

The two youngest members of congress are Representative Clarence J. McLeod (R.), of Michigan, and Representative Lister Hill (D.), of Alabama. Both are 28. Hill is unmarried, whereas McLeod sets forth that he was married in 1920 and has "two minor children."

O. J. Kvale (R.), of Minnesota, who succeeded Representative Volstead, records the fact that he is an ordained Lutheran preacher and served for 23 years in one pastorate—at Ordville, Wis.

Representative Thomas D. Schall (R.), of Minnesota, notes that he is blind. His simple announcement says:

"Thomas D. Schall, A. B., L. L. B., Republican, practicing attorney at Minneapolis; residence Excelsior, Minn. (blind), lost sight through electric shock. Fifth term."

Mrs. Nolan Modest
 Mrs. Mae E. Nolan, the only woman member of the sixty-eighth congress, observes woman's prerogative by not stating her age. She confines herself to stating she was born in San Francisco and that following the death of her husband, the late Representative John E. Nolan, she was elected to take his place.

Representative Victor Berger (Socialist), of Milwaukee, records that he was the first socialist ever elected to congress, and he recites the fact that he was tried and convicted for "having written articles opposing American entrance into the world war," and that he was twice elected before the house of representatives finally admitted him.

Senator LaFollette's brief biography does not record his stormy political career, nor the fact he has been a thorn in the side of the republican party for years. He simply states he was elected to the senate 19 years ago and is still there.

Stage Cheated
 Senator Porter H. Dale (R.), of Vermont, sets forth that for two years, as a youth he "studied with the Shakespearean actor and scholar, James E. Murdoch."

Senator Peter Norbeck (R.), of South Dakota, gives his chief occupation as that of "well digger."

Senator Stanford (R.), of Oregon repeats this year his statement of last year, that he is "America's largest producer of wool and mutton."

Isaac R. Sherwood (D.), of Toledo, reveals himself as the oldest member of congress, being 88 years old, and he records that he was mustered into the Civil War as a private and mustered out as a Brigadier-General.

Senator Lynn Frazier (R.), of North Dakota, one of the senate "insurgents," states that "while in college he attained wide distinction in athletics, especially in football, and was captain of the varsity team for two years."

"DEAD MAN" GIVES BACK INSURANCE

 MOUNT VERNON, Wash., Jan. 10. Frank P. Simmons, or as he has been known since a disappearance in 1919 that was interpreted as his death, Frank P. Simmons, is in this city on his rounds of Washington as traveling auditor for the Shell Oil company.

Simmons confirmed reports from San Francisco that \$5,000 insurance which had been paid his wife after his clothes were found on a beach at Beldere, a beach resort near San Francisco, was being restored to the company out of the estate that had been "inherited" by his widow.

"The insurance policy had lapsed before I left San Francisco," said Mr. Simmons, "and I cannot understand why the company should have made payment on it."

"The matter is settled between the insurance company and myself and the whole affair of my removal from San Francisco to Seattle seems to be a closed chapter."

Through relatives, Simmons and his wife have been kept informed of each other's movements for some time, it was learned, but neither of the pair has made a move toward reconciliation.

SAYS RAILROADS COULD SAVE MONEY

National Transportation Conference Speaker Points Out Method Which Would Result in Enormous Savings to R. R. Lines

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
 WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The railroads and merchants of the United States could save more than \$1,000,000,000 in the next five years through removal of freight terminals from congested city areas to cheaper outlying property and the use of motor trucking service for the delivery of freight, Alfred S. Swayne of New York, today told the National Transportation conference called by the chamber of commerce of the United States.

Mr. Swayne, who is chairman of one of the six committees, which recently completed studies of various phases of the transportation problem, discussed the relation of highways and motor transportation to other transportation agencies.

He outlined economies his committee had found possible, recommended proper regulation of motor transportation, advocated the development of highways suitable for economic handling of traffic, and urged continued research to disclose more fully the possibilities of the use of motor vehicles.

Insulators on Warship Like Strings of Beads

Every rope and stay of the "Colorado," Navy's new electrically driven warship, is thoroughly insulated, the knobs



insulating the appearance of being decorated with strings of large beads. Because of the great amount of current generated aboard the vessel and also because the ship is so necessary for its guidance, no electrical leakage can be permitted anywhere aboard. According to navy officials, the craft is one of the best insulated ever afloat.

Cities Half Century Hence to be "Built in Air"

Moving the calendar ahead fifty years, our noted experts see American cities with towering skyscrapers beside which even the tallest and most beautiful buildings of today will seem very ordinary. Even the small towns will have structures as large as those now considered huge. Street traffic will have been almost eliminated, workers will travel in subways, trams, or on elevated roads at high speed. The telephone will have added improvements. Radio sets will be essential in every office and home. Houses will be heated by electricity in a few min-

utes, and little coal will be used in either homes or office buildings. The camera will have been discarded for pocket motion-picture outfits, and "movies" in the theaters will have been given speech. College students will report their lessons by wireless, and ministers will broadcast their sermons.

Automatic Gear to Replace Clutch in Autos

In the invention in England of an automatic automobile gear, which dispenses with the clutch, gear box, and the usual type of rear-drive axle, certain engineers see the beginning of a new era in the industry that will be marked by many revolutionary changes in the vehicle's mechanism. The device is said to instantly adjust itself to loads and grades without attention from the driver.

Phone Receiver Held to Ear by Bracket; Frees Hands

Free use of both hands is permitted a person using a telephone equipped with a folding steel arm recently invented, that holds the receiver to the ear. Clamped to the stand, it is easily adjusted to any position desired. With a single movement of the arm, the receiver hook is raised to signal the operator. To dis-



connect, the holder is folded back. Its weight is counterbalanced by a plate fitted under the telephone.

A Ski Toboggan

The exhilarating sport of sliding downhill on the snow crust has much to commend it. It also has its dangers, as the crust softens toward spring, and a heavy sled is liable to break through, catapulting its passengers headlong into the frozen snow, which breaks up and presents jagged cutting edges capable of inflicting considerable injury. A sled that is so built as to practically eliminate this danger is shown in the drawing.



It is made from a pair of old skis, securely fastened together by means of three crosspieces and two diagonal braces, as shown in the upper details. The top board and foot rail are attached to this framework by means of wood screws, and a hole is drilled through the end of each ski to take a 1/4-in. rope. This sled will slide just as easily and just as far as any other sled, and will not break through the snow crust, or turn over, due to the width of the runners. It is also light in weight and can be easily managed by children.

Cleaning an Oil-Soaked Belt

To clean an oil-soaked belt, coil the belt loosely in a box or tub and fill the box with whitening, being sure to get the whitening between the surfaces for the entire length. Let it remain thus overnight, and the whitening will absorb the oil and leave the belt clean.
