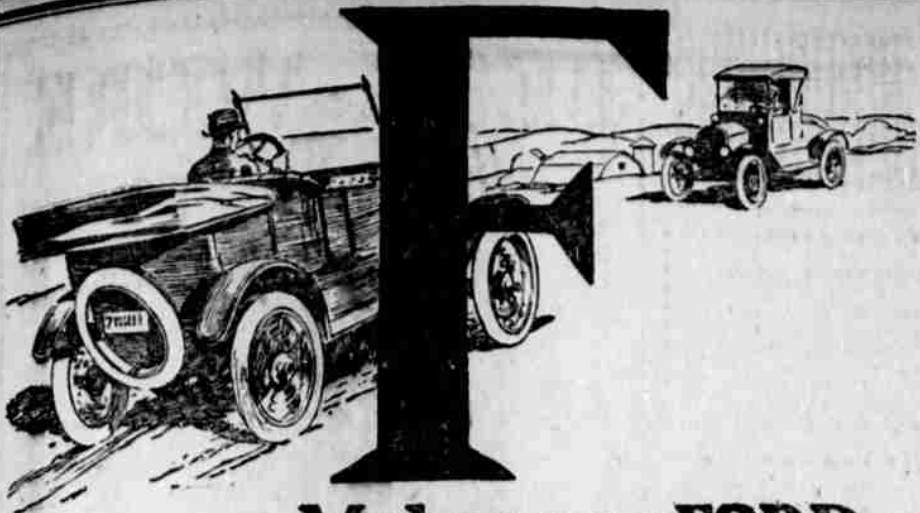

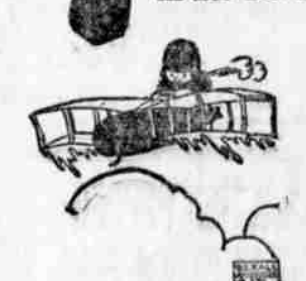

MEXICAN TOWN TO BE BUILT FIRE PROOF

Mexican authorities are determined to prevent a recurrence of the fire which recently wiped out a considerable area of Tia Juana, according to officials of the National Stone-Tile corporation and the Best Concrete Pipe company who have returned from a conference with Mayor Luis G. Beltran at Ensenada, Mexico, said the Denn-Gerretsen company today.

Regulations now in effect require that all new construction in the business district of Tia Juana shall be of substantial, fire-proof character. Plans and specifications must first be submitted for approval at Senator Beltran's office at Ensenada, and an inspector has been appointed to enforce the new regulations during construction. New standards have also been set for plumbing, electric wiring and the like.

A number of property owners of Tia Juana have already announced plans for new buildings to replace the burned structures. The first of these, a business building of three stories, will be of stone tile construction.
