TRAIN TIMES TO CHANGE SUNDAY RELIEF DRIVE IS UNDERWAY

Minor Alterations Made in Running Times of Southern Pacific Trains.

NO BIG CHANGES

Sixteen and Fifty-Four Will Practically Switch Times, but Others Nearly the Same as Now.

A change in train schedules, which, however, will make only minor alterations in the arriving and leaving time of trains in Roseburg, will become effective on Sunday, Jan. 13, it was announced today. The greatest change will take place in the schedule of trains number 16 and 54, these two trains practically exchanging times. Number 16, now leaving at 11:40 p. m. will leave Roseburg after Sunday, at 1:25, and will do local work along the line. Number 54, now leaving at 12:05 a. m., will leave at 11:40 p. m. stopping only at Medford, Grants Pass, Glendale, Roseburg, Eugene, Junction, Albany, Salem and Portland.

There is very little change in the southbound trains. Number 53, now leaving at 9:10 a. m. will drop back five minutes, leaving the city at 9:15 under the new schedule. Number 11 advances five minutes, from 2:55 p. m. to 2:50 p. m. Number 15 remains the same, leaving at 4:55 p. m. Number 13, now leaving at 4:25 a. m. will change to 4:33 a. m. Number 17, the local train which terminates its run here, will drop back twenty-five minutes, reaching Roseburg at 4:25 p. m. instead of 4:00 p. m. as at present.

Aside from the changes made to the running time of number 16 and 54, there will be little difference in the northbound trains. Number 14 will leave at 12:50 p. m. instead of 12:55 and Number 18 will leave at 7:35 a. m. instead of 7:45 as at present. Number 12 will continue to leave the city at 4 p. m.

The few minor changes which have been made, will add considerably in making various meets, and in the efficient operation of the Southern Pacific passenger trains. Chief Dispatcher J. I. Love stated this morning. Mr. Love was one of those who was called to San Francisco to aid in the formation of the new schedule and says that it was made entirely to enable the company to further accommodate the traveling public.

The changes will take place on Sunday January 13, after which time the old time tables will be discarded.

GIVES REMEDY FOR WHEAT CONDITIONS

TOPPERS, Kan., Jan. 11.—A remedy for the leading wheat growing sections of the country was given by Dr. Alonzo Taylor, director of food research of Leland Stanford University, speaking today at the state agricultural convention as follows:

Reduce the wheat acreage; emphasize hard wheat; secure more dairy cows and better cows; develop foder crops for the balanced animal husbandry; raise more of the farm foods on the farm; diversify operations in accordance with the locality, and practice summer fallowing where diversification is difficult.

Dr. Taylor, widely known as a food economist, expressed the opinion that co-operative marketing of wheat at this time would not raise the price. Co-operative endeavor to improve growers practices more than co-operative selling should prove advantageous to wheat farmers, he said.

CONSOLIDATION OPPOSED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Opposition to the proposed consolidation legislation of the war and navy departments under the departmental reorganization plan was reiterated today by Secretaries Weeks and Donby, who again appeared before the congressional reorganization committee.

The testimony of the secretaries was in part a rebuttal to recommendations placed before the committee by W. F. Willoughby, director of the institute for governmental research, who advocated the consolidation.

Effort to Provide Money to Buy Food for German Children Started.

COMMITTEE IS CHOSEN

Attorney B. L. Eddy to Serve as Chairman and Mayor N. Rice Is Treasurer—Campaign Short.

The executive committee in charge of the drive in Roseburg for the relief of German children, met last night to consider plans for the campaign to be conducted here. It was shown that the case is one of real charity, and regardless of the feeling against Germany, that little children are slowly starving because of lack of nourishment.

A committee composed of B. L. Eddy, chairman, Mayor Rice, treasurer; B. W. Strong, A. C. Marsters, A. J. Hochradel, Judge George Quine, and O. C. Baker, has agreed to take charge of the relief drive and will carry out the plans here.

The money raised will be expended through the American Quakers or friends, who have been conducting relief work for some time. The Quakers have established soup kitchens and food distribution depots, where they are providing one hot meal each day for undernourished children. It is estimated that under the organization, which has been worked out, meals can be provided at a cost of about two cents each. The period for which support is necessary is about 150 days, so that \$3.00 will provide for one undernourished child for a period of 150 days, when it is estimated that further relief will not be needed.

American people are being asked to care for these children at this rate, and subscriptions will be asked on the basis of \$3 per child. The quota fixed for Roseburg is 20 cents per capita. Oregon's quota is \$100,000, of which half is to be raised in Portland and the remainder in the state at large.

It is the plan of the committee to fix one day, between now and the 20th in which to make the drive. The city will be divided into districts and a team appointed for each district and it is expected that the entire campaign can be put over in about two hours.

The relief drive has the endorsement of leading officials of this country and of ambassadors who are now in Europe and in touch with the situation. President Harding, before his death, favored the campaign, President Coolidge, Herbert Hoover, General Allen, and many others have given their endorsement, stating that conditions in Germany justify help for the children.

Already some money has been received, one Edenbrow resident having voluntarily sought the chairman of the local committee and contributed \$10 to the fund. Others who desire to aid may leave contributions with Mayor N. Rice, who is serving as chairman.

AGED MISSIONARY SACRIFICES HERSELF

Pleaded With Chinese Brigands to Take Her Instead of Her American Co-Worker Who Had Been Wounded

PEKING, Jan. 11.—Mrs. Julia Kilen, of Northfield, Minn., 50 years old, and frail, sacrificed herself and persuaded bandits who raided the mission at Tsaoysang, Hupeh province last week, to take her with them instead of her wounded American co-worker, Mrs. Bernhard Hoff, stated reports received today from Hankow.

When the mission was invaded, Mrs. Hoff and her husband, Professor Hoff, were warned by the bandits against trying to flee. The advice said, but not knowing the Chinese language they attempted to bolt and were shot down. Mrs. Kilen, a veteran missionary, who speaks the Chinese tongue, overheard the plans of the bandits to take the wounded woman with them and is quoted as having pleaded, "Take me. I will go in her place. She would die on your hands."

The Hoff family is in a hospital at Tsaoysang. Efforts to find the bandits who spirited away Mrs. Kilen and who were traced to the neighboring province of Houng, thus far have been unavailing.

The bandits were reported to be willing to release her provided they were permitted to enroll in the army.

HIGHWAY PROGRAM TO BE A CLEANUP

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—An outline of its 1924 program completed yesterday by the state highway commission included cleanup of work on the Roosevelt highway in Tillamook and Coos counties and of the Dalles-California highway in Klamath county, and of the John Day highway as far as Unity. Work on the Mount Hood loop, except a bridge across the White river also was ordered pushed to completion.
