

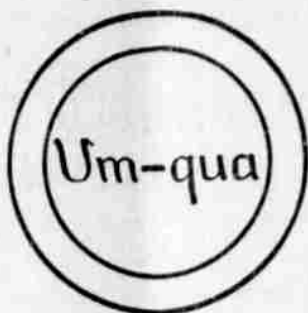

### FORTY MEN HANDLE CITY GOVERNMENT

Ludwigshafen, Bavaria, in the Hands of a Little Group Who Perform Official Duties of City Including Street Cleaning

(Associated Press Licensed Wire) LUDWIGSHAFEN, Bavaria, Jan. 11.—(By Courier to Paris)—By the Associated Press.—Forty men, including the green uniformed separatist guard in front of the main government building, have been performing the functions of whatever government there is—besides the army of occupation in this industrial center, the home of the famous Badische aniline dye factories. These 40 men include not only government officials and office employees but also the police force, men of the street cleaning department and public servants.

The separatist government of the autonomous palatinate, was proclaimed here with appropriate ceremonies on November 25, but neither its beginning nor its ultimate effect on the people was ever made known to the outside world, owing partly to difficult telegraphic communications and partly to the pre-occupation of most of the foreign correspondents with important developments in the Ruhr.

As was the case in the Rhineland where the separatists were in control and later ejected, all newspapers here were suppressed from the beginning of the declaration of the "republic" except those whose proprietors agreed to submit to the censorship of the new government. Consequently all but two stopped publication at once and these two have now been forbidden because they published a proclamation a few days ago against the separatist regime.
