

BIG EXPANSION AT AUTO PLANT ANNOUNCED!

Buick Company Will Expend \$11,000,000 on Factory Additions, Equipment.

Charles S. Howard, head of the Howard Automobile Company of this city, Pacific Coast Buick distributor, arrived in New York City yesterday for the automobile show and for a conference with H. H. Bassett, president of the Buick Motor Company, who is also in the metropolis for the annual motor exhibition. In a telegram received late last evening by General Manager Bob Thompson of the Howard organization, the chief unfolded the big construction program that the Buick Company has outlined for the coming year. According to Howard's message the factory will expend \$11,000,000 in new buildings, additions and equipment for its main plant at Flint and its subsidiary factory at Detroit, this in order to bring the production capacity up to 1200 cars a day.

TO BUILD 250,000 CARS

Howard states that his information came direct from President Bassett, who pointed out that although the Buick factory built more than 200,000 automobiles in 1923 this record-breaking number was insufficient to supply the demand and that an expansion of the factory facilities was necessary. The company plans to build between 235,000 and 250,000 cars this calendar year and Bassett feels confident that with the new building and additions at both Flint and Detroit this estimated schedule can be easily carried out.

Giving further details, Howard's wire states that already nearing completion is a stock storage building 1064x63 feet; also 41,000 square feet added to the Gray iron foundry; 8000 square feet to the forge shops and increased lumber-drying facilities for the body shop.

CONSTRUCTION ORDERED

Additions authorized for completion prior to June 1, 1924, include the following: a 210x360-foot addition to motor plant; 55x120-foot addition to the heat-treat plant; 50x120-foot addition to the motor test building; 125,000 square feet added to the sheet metal plant; 140x200-foot addition to completed car warehouse; 80x240 feet added to the tool-making shop.

These additions naturally require increased space for executive functions and for the latter purposes a number of entirely new buildings will be provided at Flint.

Among these, two are to be devoted respectively to engineering and personal service, while another entirely new plant will be erected for the manufacture of automatic screw machine parts.

Thompson is elated over the news received from his chief, for he feels that with the new construction program under way there will be less difficulty experienced in securing an adequate number of Buick cars to meet the demand at all seasons of the year.

Miller suffered defeat in a match with Thye last spring and is anxious for a return bout before departing for Australia February 5, where he is to appear in a series of matches. Miller says that he is willing to meet Thye on the basis of winner take all for a side bet of \$500.

Glenn, 12, son of Dr. and Mrs. V. R. Abraham, and Richard, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Baylone, are the victims. Arch and Cad Williams, sons of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Williams, narrowly escaped while trying to rescue the boys, and Paul Keir, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. S. Keir, broke through the ice while aiding to drag the Williams boy to shore.

MISSING GIRL IS IN LONG BEACH, CAL.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) OREGON CITY, Ore., Jan. 14.—Relatives of Nettie Patterson, Willamette girl missing for the past 19 days or two weeks, and for whom federal as well as county officers have been searching, have received a post card from the girl, mailed at Long Beach, Cal.

The card bears the message that she is well and happy, but gives no explanation of her reasons for going away. The girl disappeared here after going to the West Linn Union high school as usual one morning.

SALEM, Jan. 14.—The special committee on reorganization of the Oregon Growers Co-operative Association, is meeting here today with the association's attorney to prepare drafts of tentative plans for the reorganization of the association as an exclusive selling agency for dried fruits.

Newhouse, assistant general manager of the association, sentiment among the fruit growers of the state, as evidenced at district meetings held during the past few weeks, is predominantly for the proposed type of organization. The problem now to be settled, Mr. Newhouse says, is whether the reorganization association shall be extended to take in the entire northwest.

Wilhite, business man of that city and volunteer member of the fire department, who recently lost his life fighting a fire, will receive compensation from the state under the state workmen's compensation act, the state accident commission announced today. The fire occurred December 20. It is said that many cities and towns of the state are now carrying state accident insurance on their firemen and policemen. The amount set aside to provide for Mrs. Wilhite and her son is \$7,567.70.
