PROTEST AGAINST LOOTING IN CHINA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Protests against the looting by Chinese soldiery of the mission maintained by the Protestant fathers at Suifu, in Honan province, China, have been lodged with Chinese officials by the American legation in Peking and also by Consul Meinhardt at Changsha.

The consul's protest was addressed to the provisional authorities and the legation's commission sent to the foreign office demanded full protection for the missionaries.

A summary of a report made to the consul by the Rev. Flavian Mullens, who with the Rev. Arthur Benson was at the mission, was called here by the legation. It said the soldiers who made the raid were of the first Hunan division, commanded by General Ho Yao Tau and that they looted and damaged the mission, fired at the two missionaries and also fired on the American flag. They "claimed to be acting under the orders of General Ho to loot the mission and kill the foreign devils."

General Chan Sian Li was said by the legation to be guarding the mission, members of which went to China in 1922 from the monastery at Brighton, Mass.

ROCHESTER OUT FOR COUNTY ASSESSOR

W. G. Rochester, today announced that he will be a candidate on the Republican ticket at the coming primary election for the office of County Assessor.

Mr. Rochester is a native of South Carolina, and was raised to maturity on a farm. He spent over twenty years with one of the leading transcontinental railway systems, beginning as telegraph operator and working up to the position of assistant superintendent. He moved to Douglas county in 1912, and ever since that time has resided on and operated a farm near Looking Glass. He served as deputy assessor under County Assessor Frank Perkins in 1916 and under County Assessor Guy Gordon during the latter's term. He is well acquainted with land values as a result of his work. Mr. Rochester is a republican in politics.

DEPUTY STATE FISH WARDENS PULL BOMBER

Two deputy state fish wardens, who came down from Portland to "hook" Douglas county anglers, were today directed to return to L. F. Langenberg his fishing equipment and four salmon which they took from him yesterday.

There is a law which prohibits taking more than three salmon in a day by any one fisherman from the Willamette river. The two wardens who apparently were working up stream with four nice salmon which he had caught, and they immediately stopped him, took away his fish and all of his equipment, worth about \$20.

This morning Mr. Langenberg consulted an attorney and was preparing to start action against the wardens to recover his property. The matter was taken before Justice of the Peace George Jones, who advised the wardens that the law under which they were acting applies only to the Willamette river and they immediately agreed to restore the articles taken from Mr. Langenberg.

SINCLAIR MAY FACE A RECALL

Convicted Ilwaco Banker
Probably Will Not Go to
Legislature Again.

CIRCULATE PETITIONS

Several Candidates Mentioned
for Job—Sinclair Has 5
Days to File Motion
for a New Trial.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Jan. 14.—Citizens of Pacific and Wahybakum counties will this week decide if State Senator Percy L. Sinclair, convicted here Saturday in connection with the failure of the bank at Ilwaco, is entitled to retain his seat in the legislature as their representative according to men who have been here for a week attending the trial. The recall petitions will be in circulation throughout the senator's district Monday it was said.

Sinclair moved to Seattle shortly after the failure of the bank and his constituents have been agitating the recall question ever since according to Ilwaco residents.

Attorneys for the state have persuaded them to delay their action until after Sinclair's trial, and now that a verdict of guilty has been returned the circulation of recall petitions will start immediately.

Present indications are that a banker will be among those anxious to fill the seat of Sinclair, if he is recalled. He is H. W. MacPhail.

Others mentioned as possible candidates are C. D. Walker Williams, of Ilwaco, son of County Commissioner L. D. Williams; Harry E. Christensen, of Seaview, former county commissioner; Fred H. Norman of Raymond, former state representative, and Martin Welch of Raymond.

If Sinclair retained his official position he would serve through the next legislature unless the verdict against him is confirmed.

His attorneys were granted five days in which to file a motion for a new trial. If denied, sentence will be imposed and his attorneys then plan to appeal to the supreme court.

State attorneys today said that if Sinclair does not appeal, the charges pending against him and his wife for accepting deposits when they knew their bank to be insolvent, would be dropped.

CHARLES DAWES OPENS SESSION

knowledge of whether this contention exists, the result of our work and the action of the reparation commission thereon will perhaps be the final contribution.

Dawes said he highly appreciated the commission's wisdom in setting the task of stabilizing German currency and balancing the German budget, for if this were done without fear or favor and the reparation commission ratifies the action it would start Germany toward productivity. And, he said, "The re-establishment of German productivity is the starting point of European prosperity."

The committee, after adopting Chairman Dawes' suggestion that it proceed to the study of the stabilization of the German currency as the first item on the agenda, adjourned until after noon.

"With all due respect to the experts who had wandered to the gloomy reparation labyrinth, these experts," said Mr. Dawes, "could not have failed to come out in different directions, for they had to find stable conclusions where no conditions were stated."

"The ordinary man," he said, "does not realize the barriers which must be beaten down—barriers erected by national pride and the pride and selfish interests of different allied officials whose powers were affected by any act of coercive international co-ordination and the inevitable misrepresentations and intolerable interpretations of these fertile and barren loving cultures, the nationalistic demagogues of all countries, who would exploit their pitiful personalities out of the common misfortune."

Louis Barthod, president of the reparation commission in welcoming the committee said: "The reparation commission, in proceeding to your official installation, has desired both to show the importance of the task assigned you and to thank you for having accepted it. Some of you are coming from afar with a promptness and devotion for which universal opinion is grateful."

"The treaty of Versailles is our charter. It shall be ours. It is within its scope that you will pursue your work in full in practical and high impartiality."

"The balancing of the German budget and the stabilization of the currency of Germany, two problems bound together, are first and essential conditions of a reparations settlement itself."

"We will place at your disposal all the studies and investigations already made by our inter-allied services, or our national organizations and all other documents necessary to your work. You shall be the masters and your the method of procedure."

"Germany received from the

treaty the right to be heard. You shall hear in the form which appears most useful to you. We eagerly desire for the common good that its governmental administrations will facilitate your task, so arduous and and so complex.

"We must reach results. Germany's creditors and Germany herself are not the only ones interested in a reparations settlement. It is not excessive to say that the pacific equilibrium of the world is dependent upon it."

"Gentlemen, experts, get to work with courage and formulate the opinion which the commission has requested of you. Take your time, but take only the time necessary. We expect much from you."

"The entire commission is rejoiced at the co-operation American citizens have brought to the allied experts. The committee's conclusions will receive from this increased authority."

"I pray, in the name of the reparation commission, that General Dawes will accept the presidency of our work. His tried competence and energy will greatly help in bringing it rapidly to a successful conclusion."

The committee met again promptly at 3 o'clock and decided to adjourn only for dinner and to hold a night session.

Several days will be devoted to the study of pertinent documents. The committee will then split into two sub-committees, one on currency and the other on budget.

General Dawes' speech made an excellent impression upon the French delegation in the reparation commission, which was particularly gratified by the insistence with which the American dwelt upon the necessity for a policy of unity among the allies.

SNOWFALL AT LAKE LESS THAN USUAL

Thomson today. There are only 47 inches of snow at Anna Spring camp and five feet, 8 inches at the lake, four feet less than at this time last year. There has been clear weather at the park for a week past, said Superintendent Thomson.

MINORITY PARTIES TO WORK JOINTLY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—The minority parties in California, among them the farmer labor party, non-partisan league, socialists and the farmers union, will work jointly as a single party in the forth-coming state and national campaigns, according to an agreement reached here yesterday at a meeting of representatives of these parties. It was decided to call a general state convention during March at which time the fusion organization will be given a name and will inaugurate its campaign.

It is proposed to put up a full legislative and congressional ticket at the fall elections.
