PLANS MADE FOR RELIEF DRIVE

Committee Organizing for Canvass to Raise Food for German Children.

IS PURE CHARITY

Regardless Prejudice American Cannot See Children Starve, Is Word Being Sent Out.

The executive committee having in charge the raising of the funds at Roseburg for the starving German children is still at work organizing the campaign. The canvass for subscriptions is to be made some day this week, the date not having yet been determined.

The following is the sponsors committee, consisting of names of people, who in addition to the executive committee have endorsed the movement: Dr. A. P. Sether, Prof. M. S. Hamlin, Mrs. William Bell, Frank Clemens, Miss Agnes Pitchford, Rev. Jos. Knotts, Rev. L. B. Quick, Rev. Stuart O'Dell, Rev. H. L. Caldwell, Rev. C. H. Hilton, W. F. Chapman, M. F. Rice, M. E. Ritter, Mrs. A. C. Marsters, H. B. Hudson and Glen Wimberly.

While some prejudice exists, this melts away when it is realized that the purpose is merely the feeding of about two million children who are facing starvation. No matter what the crimes of former rulers of Germany, no matter what may be the selfishness of some of her big business men or of her hoarders of food, the fact remains that in the industrial centers of Germany millions of men are out of work and little children born since the great war began, and who have never had a fair chance, will not survive unless America furnishes food. The plan is to give each child in need one square meal a day for 150 days during the present winter. The food will be served directly to the children by the American Quakers, in food kitchens operated by that organization. This movement had the endorsement of President Harding and is now endorsed by President Coolidge in the following words:

(Copy of letter to Chicago Committee for Relief of German Children.)

"It was good to have your letter of December 18, and to know of the vigorous efforts that are being put forth to mobilize the charitable purposes of the nation in behalf of relief for the starving children of Germany. I have expressed repeatedly the hope that American benevolence would rise in this connection to the high standard it has set so many other times and that our assistance be prompt and effective."

Herbert Hoover says: "The breakdown in currency and the rapidly spreading unemployment in Germany is such that hunger and under-nourishment are already spreading among the poorer classes in the large towns and manufacturing districts."

"It is always the children who are ground in the mills of international disputes. I know that many will feel it is the fault of one side or another that these things have come to pass amongst the German people. Whoever may be at fault, it is not the children who must go hungry, and honest charity inquires no further than that."

Dr. C. S. Leode, a diagnostic physician of Seattle, who visited Germany in 1923, makes the following statement: "I went to the public baths in order that I might better observe the real physical condition of the boys in Germany. A class of boys was brought into the swimming pool room for my observation. I found the marks of rickets indelibly impressed upon these lads' chests. The instructor asked me to guess the ages of those youngsters. 'If they had been American boys,' I replied, 'from their size I should judge them to be 6 to 7 years old.' 'That is the pity,' replied the instructor, 'these boys are 12, 13 and 14 years of age.'"

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

Wants Road Maintained

News-Review:

A recent issue of your valuable paper appeared an article saying that road between Roseburg and Dixie was in bad condition and that farmers who have to use that road are complaining.

About six weeks ago the writer of Judge Quine to have this road spot and graded up, and the Judge said me that it would be done, but has never, failed to keep his word, and the road is now almost impassable at a speed greater than 15 miles per hour. There is at least one hole for every two square feet of road surface, and the roadbed is rapidly deteriorating.

It would seem the better plan to let what road we have by a certain expenditure for maintenance than to let all our money for the purpose of building new roads. This five mile stretch of road is the outlet of a large city back of it, and should have just enough attention to keep it in fairly good condition.

The writer has also asked Mr. Quine, the county road master, to let a little energy on this road, and he claims there are no funds available for that purpose. Let's see the situation and see if there are no funds, and if not, where our money is going. There are at least autos and trucks owned by farmers who travel this road between Dixie and Roseburg, and at the average of \$20 per car for 11-12 miles, at least \$4000 per year is paid out of these communities. With a tax of three cents on gasoline and two cents on distillate, another \$2000 is certainly spent by the farmers for road purposes.

While I do not know the exact condition of the several districts springing the sections using the Dixie road, it is considerably a million dollars. We are taxed by the court with another tax of 10c and a half, which is a tax of 10c upon the farms of these communities. Then we have the annual tax of the county of five mills for work which which means that the sections are turning in \$5,000
