JAPAN FACING NEW SITUATION

TOKIO, Jan. 17.—A political crisis confronts Japan as a result of a split in the Seiyukai, majority political party of the lower house for the diet, following announcement Wednesday of the opposition of Viscount Takahashi, president of the Seiyukai to the newly formed cabinet of Viscount Kiyomura, which has the support of the Kenkyukai, or ruling faction of the house of peers.

Four of the most influential lieutenants of Viscount Takahashi, all of whom were members of his cabinet prior to its collapse, in 1922, have announced their withdrawal from the Seiyukai and their intention to form a new party to support Premier Kiyomura. The secessionist leaders are Baron Yamamoto, former premier and a veteran statesman of Japan; H. Motoda, one of the pioneer leaders of the Seiyukai; T. Tokonami, former minister of home affairs and T. Nakahashi, former minister of education. They are expected to draw nearly half the parliamentary strength of the Seiyukai away from Viscount Takahashi whose announced opposition to the new cabinet, before the assembly within the Seiyukai, was ordered to sound the death knell of the Kiyomura ministry.

The premier still is facing a large, hostile majority in the lower house of the diet but the certainty which seemed apparent, that the new cabinet would be forced to resign immediately after the forthcoming wedding of the Prince Regent now apparently has passed. Encouraged by the sudden accession of support from the secessionist group of the Seiyukai, Premier Kiyomura is expected to carry the fight to hold office to the opposition, by dissolving the diet and seeking victory through the ensuing election.

MEETINGS AT MYRTLE CREEK

The Roseburg Christian Church orchestra went to Myrtle Creek last night to play at an evangelistic meeting being conducted by Rev. John T. Strivers. The orchestra gave several special numbers during the service, and a concert following the meeting.

The revival services being held are well attended and many people are being turned away, unable to find seats in the building. A delegation of Klansmen from Riddle, attended the services on Tuesday night, and presented the Myrtle Creek Christian church with a gift of money. Mr. Strivers is one of the leading evangelists on the coast, and is employed as Oregon State evangelist, to work in the smaller churches. He has been selected by the Roseburg Christian church as their missionary, and the local congregation contributes several hundred dollars each year for his expenses. He will hold meetings in Roseburg, at the local Christian church, starting in February, and will be assisted by C. H. Althoff, evangelistic singer, of Denver, Colorado.

SAN FRANCISCO GOLFER WINNER

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17.—A lead of four strokes in the first day of competition, obtained by brilliant and consistent playing in a high wind and the ability to conquer the difficult tricky greens that baffled a number of internationally famous golf stars, yesterday gave McDonald Smith, San Francisco professional, the 1924 open golf championship of the California. Smith finished with the low score of 295 in the state open tournament, on the Los Angeles country club links, leading Eddie Loos, Annadale, California, professional, by one stroke, Loos being runner-up with a score of 296.

Third honors were divided between Abe Espinosa, of Oakland, and Harold Sampson, professional at the Municipal Links, San Francisco, each having a total of 297.

To McDonald Smith went the added honor of defeating the strongest field ever entered in a Pacific coast tournament, internationally famous stars from both amateur and professional from both amateur and professional.

George Von Elm, holder of the trans-Mississippi title in 1921, was low amateur with a score of 307 strokes for the 72 holes of medal play. He finished one stroke below Gene Sarazen, national professional champion.

The close finish, with the galleries keyed to a high pitch and with five in the running, provided a touch of the dramatic when Eddie Loos missed a tie for low with MacDonald Smith. Loos hit the ball for a 30 foot putt on the final hole and a roar went up from the gallery when it looked as if the ball was headed for the cup. It missed the pin by inches and Loos lost his right to meet MacDonald Smith on a playoff for the title.

WOMEN REFUSE TO BAN MABEL'S FILMS

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—Members of the first district Illinois Federation of Women's Clubs yesterday refused to approve a resolution recommending that Mable Normand's films be banned and tabled the resolution by a large majority.

More than a score of prominent women participated in the sharp debate which followed the introduction of the measure at the annual mid-winter meeting of the organization. Opponents of the proposed action declared it was time enough to pass such a resolution after the grand jury and other investigating bodies had heard the evidence and reached a verdict.

As soon as the film star has sufficiently recovered, she will be invited to address the women's association of commerce and tell her story. Mrs. Sophia De Laven Cowles, president of the association, declared. She said it was absurd for Chicago club women "to follow the lead of a few foolish women in a small town club who thought they were doing their duty when they passed such a resolution."

"Men stick together—its high time women did especially until they know the real facts of a case," declared Mrs. Marion Hiel, chairman of the committee.
