CRUISER TACOMA
NOT YET FLOATED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The United States cruiser Tacoma, aground on Blaquilla reef, off Vera Cruz, has three compartments flooded, according to wireless reports from the ship received today at the navy department.

Tugs were standing by, it was said, and hopes were entertained that the craft could be drawn into deeper waters as soon as the heavy seas subsided. No fears were felt for the safety of the officers and men aboard.

The Tacoma was thrown on the reef during a storm. She was high on the reef and in only two fathoms of water when the message was dispatched.

The cruiser Richmond probably will be stationed at Vera Cruz to take the place of the Tacoma, which has been ordered to that port to act as an emergency communication station to the United States due to the interruption of cable facilities incident to the De La Huerta insurrection.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Dispatches outlining the situation of the cruiser, however, led some high officials to believe that she might have to be abandoned. If she is on rocky bottom in 12 feet of water and was

driven there by the force of a north-easter, it was estimated the cost of getting her off may not be justified.

FOREST SERVICE NAMES PEAKS

Word has just been received at the district forester's office at Portland of the official change in name of two peaks within the Oregon National Forest in memory of two former forest officers.

Frazier Mountain, in Clackamas county, formerly known as Shell Rock is named in memory of Donald R. Frazier, of Hood River, one time forest guard on the Oregon National Forest who was killed in an airplane accident at an aero training camp in England in April, 1918.

Mitchell Mountain, formerly Oak Grove Mt. in Clackamas county, is renamed in honor of Roy Mitchell who was killed while fighting fire on the Oregon National Forest on August 20, 1919.

Muncaster Mountain within the Olympic National Forest, Washington, has already been officially named in memory of Forest Ranger Roy Muncaster, of the 20th Engineers (Forestry) who was lost on the "Tacoma."

These changes in names of local peaks were recommended by the district forester's office to the U. S. Geographic Board, which is the government committee made up of representatives of practically all the federal departments in Washington, D. C. that finally decide on the names and spelling of all topographic features that appear on all government maps.

NEUNER WILL GO
TO BURNS, OREGON

SALEM, Jan. 17.—Attorney-General Van Winkle has appointed George Neuner of Roseburg to go to Burns, Oregon, to assist in the prosecution of Joe Cavender, who is to be tried for shooting R. L. Haines, a state prohibition agent last summer. Haines was not killed, but was dangerously wounded.

The request for assistance from the state came from George Sizemore, district attorney for Harney county.

PORTLAND CONCERN
GETS FINE CONTRACT

PORTLAND, Jan. 17.—According to information from San Francisco, the Portland contracting firm of Kelly and Sullivan has been awarded a contract for building the grade for eleven and one half miles of the Southern Pacific Eugene-Klamath Falls cut-off from a point five and one half miles south of Oak Ridge. It is said that the railway company will receive bids about February, for furnishing the cross ties and laying steel rails.

Secretary Denby telegraphed his congratulations to the crew of the Shenandoah who brought her back in safety after her wind-driven flight. Mrs. Denby was so greatly impressed by the story of the night that she also sent her congratulations to the ship's personnel.

The secretary also issued a formal statement outlining what was known so far as the navy department of the incident. He concluded with a paragraph disclosing the determination of the navy department to get the Shenandoah ready promptly for the Polar expedition this summer.

"From all our information," Mr. Denby said, "it may be ascertained with positive certainty that there is hardly a possibility that this ship will encounter in her Arctic expedition any test so severe as that she has already met successfully."

FARM TROUBLES
ARE ECONOMIC

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—A statement issued today by the committee on marketing and production of the National Grange, in session here, declared that "the farmers' troubles are economic and not political."

"The biggest problem before America today," the statement said, "is the restoring of the purchasing power of the American farmer. It is not more legislation but more team work and cooperation that is needed to solve the farmers' ills."

WATCHING LONDON POLITICS

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The country watched today the opening of the final scene in the life of the Baldwin government; the introduction in the house of commons of labor's "no confidence" motion.

Notwithstanding the belief that the overthrow of the ministry is inevitable, the conservative whips are doing their utmost to keep the party at full strength throughout the debate on the amendment, especially for next Monday's crucial vote. The other parties also are whipping their followers and there is every indication of a full attendance at the night session of twenty first at which the vote on the no-confidence resolution will probably be taken.

The latest effort of the opponents of a laborite government is an appeal to Winston Spencer Churchill to take the lead against Ramsey MacDonald and his followers.

LOCAL LAND OFFICE
SECOND IN U. S.

The Roseburg land office was second in the United States, from the standpoint of money earned during the fiscal year just closed, according to the report of the U. S. Land Office Commissioner just received. The Roseburg land office received more money than all of the six others, land offices in the state of Oregon, combined, the state itself ranking in second place in the United States, with California in third position.

The only land office earning more money during the past year than the Roseburg office, was at Douglas, Wyoming, where the famous Teapot Dome oil leases brought the receipts to \$4,538,000. The receipts of all land offices in Wyoming amounted to \$5,054,099. In Oregon the total receipts of the seven land offices were \$1,127,726. Roseburg land office took \$589,179.40 and Portland land office, \$424,182. California's receipts were \$298,288.19. The land office at Visalia, California, was third in the United States, and Portland took fourth place.

The receipts of the Roseburg office were due largely to the big timber sales conducted during the year and the payments made on homestead lands. The same condition prevailed in the Portland office, Douglas, Wyoming, and Visalia, California, both of which received their large totals from oil leases and royalties.

WANTS TO EXPLAIN

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17.—Mabel Normand, film actress, will appear before the Women's Association of Commerce in Chicago, if they want her, and if it is possible for her to travel, it was declared here today by Mack Sennett, employer of the motion picture star. Sennett in behalf of the actress for the action of the Illinois club women in refusing to approve a resolution recommending banning of the Normand films until they heard the defense of the player.

NOTORIOUS BANDIT
KILLED IN BATTLE

PEKIN, Jan. 17.—Lao Yang-Jen, notorious bandit, whose men recently shot and fatally wounded Professor Bernhard Hoff and kidnapped Mrs. Juliana Kilen, both American missionaries, was killed in battle at Kwantling, the foreign office has been advised. Mrs. Kilen was rescued several days ago.

Lao Yang-Jen had terrorized the provincial borders of Honan and Hupoh for two years.

The dispatch announcing his death came from General Wu Pei-Fu, commander of the northern provinces to whose headquarters the body was brought and identified.

FIRE THREATENS
SHIP NEAR ASTORIA

ASTORIA, Jan. 17.—The Steamer Silverado was threatened by a fire which broke out in her number 1 early this morning, causing her to send distress signals five miles off Willapa harbor. The vessels call for immediate assistance stated that there was oil in her cargo, and fears were expressed that it would flame up at any minute.
