ENGLAND R. R. MEN OUT ON STRIKE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, Jan. 21.—A statement issued early today at the headquarters of the Associated Society of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen, which last night called a strike on the railways of Great Britain, said the men "were coming out solidly and standing together splendidly." Press telegrams suggested that this assertion was likely to prove not far from the truth.

Apparently some traffic was moved after midnight, but in the main it seemed the strike call would be obeyed by a great majority of the organization's 59,000 members. The score of a limited service depends on the loyalty of those locomotive men who belong to the national union of railway men, among whose 320,000 members it is said, are about twenty or thirty thousand engineers. Neither this union nor the railway clerks' organization is supporting the strike, but there were signs that many engineers and firemen in the National Union of Railwaymen would cooperate with their striking fellows in the other organization.

The companies said the strike must be of short duration, but J. Bromley, secretary of the Associated Society of Firemen and Engineers expressed the conviction that the strike could hold up 80 per cent of the traffic of the country for a fortnight, which time, he said, would be long enough to prevent the companies from making profits, the average purpose of his union.

LANE PRISONERS TRY TO ESCAPE

EUGENE, Jan. 21.—An attempted jail break at the Lane county jail was frustrated at 12:30 o'clock Sunday morning when the watchman on guard outside the jail heard scratching on the bricks within the structure and roused the night patrolmen of the city.

GERMAN CAPITAL SOUGHT ABROAD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PARIS, Jan. 21.—The second committee of experts organized by the reparations commission for the purpose of finding German capital abroad and determining means for its return to the reich met for the first time today in the Hotel Astoria.

The session was confined to an exchange of addresses between Louis Barthou, president of the reparations commission, who presided, and Reginald McKenna, former chancellor of the British exchequer, who will preside over the committee.

M. Barthou especially thanked Henry M. Robinson of Los Angeles, the unofficial member of the committee, who he said, had traveled half way round the world to take part in the deliberations.

"The participation of America in the work of the allied experts is a significant fact upon the importance of which I must once more insist," M. Barthou continued. "It is impossible that so many men of good will, united with such disinterestedness, should arrive at a successful conclusion."

Mr. McKenna paid high tribute to the speech which Brigadier-General Charles G. Dawes delivered at the opening session of the first committee last Monday.

The Dawes committee is scheduled to hear explanations of German finances today from Dr. Schlaicht, president of the Reichsbank.

The session of the second committee also was attended by General Dawes, Owen D. Young and the other members of the first committee.

CORONER'S JURY SAYS MAN SLAIN

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 21.—The coroner's jury Saturday night found that J. E. Bratton, former deputy sheriff, was slain by a person or persons unknown. Mrs. Bratton claimed the slayer fired one shot at her before fleeing. The shot which killed her husband struck just behind the right ear. Dr. Frank Menne of Portland held on the stand that the death was due to suicide. According to the widow, she was awakened by the fatal shot and went to the door of her room. Her husband, sleeping in the next room, had been shot and the intruder then fired at her, she said.

It was stated at the investigations that the assailant pawed over some jewelry in the room, but took nothing. The shooting was done with Bratton's own 25-calibre automatic pistol.

Bratton's body will be shipped tomorrow to his former home at Linton, Indiana for burial. Bratton was a 32nd degree Mason and was a Shriner. He lived here seven years, coming from Pomona, California.

FARM MEETING BIG SUCCESS

Farm Bureau Gathering at Oakland on Saturday Was Well Attended Event.

GOVERNOR SPEAKS

Urges Development of Agriculture to Keep Pace With Development of Industrial Life.

The farm bureau meeting held at Oakland last Saturday was a decided success and was attended by farmers from all parts of the county. Although the bulk of the crowd was from Oakland, there were farmers present from nearly every section.

The meeting was opened by an address by Rev. J. K. Howard, of Oakland, who surprised his listeners by his knowledge of agricultural conditions and problems. Rev. Howard made an excellent talk, and those present received much valuable information and instruction.

County Agent B. W. Cooney followed with a discussion of cover crops, and the information given on the handling of legumes was of great benefit. The farmers found this message to be of more than ordinary value, and it is regrettable that more could not be present to obtain the advice given by the county agent.

A basket dinner was served at noon and proved to be one of the enjoyable features of the day. The Oakland ladies served hot coffee.

All business was suspended in Oakland in the afternoon, and all that could crowd into the L. O. O. F. hall were present for the afternoon session. C. L. Chenoweth presided and introduced Attorney George Neuner, who discussed the pruned situation. Mr. Neuner presented the market conditions and presented cooperative and organized marketing as the only solution for the present problems. Until 80 per cent of the growers of the Northwest are organized so that they may control the market, California prunes will be absorbed and Northwest prunes left, he stated. He outlined the plans for the organization of the Northwest Prune Exchange, of which he is one of the organizers, and showed how this organization expects to create a larger market for the Oregon fruit.

After a charming vocal solo by Gertrude Young of Oakland, Governor Walter M. Pierce, the chief speaker of the day, was introduced. Governor Pierce delivered another of his interesting addresses, showing that in spite of his executive position he is keeping a close touch on agricultural affairs.

He dwelt on the necessity for co-operation and told many humorous but pointed stories in illustrating his arguments, keeping his audience in a good humor.

The American people control the bulk of the world's gold, he stated, and this is serving to expand and increase the industrial life of the land, and aid the development of cities. Agriculture, however, has been losing ground the past few years, and unless the farmers of the nation follow the lead of the cities, they will soon lose their standing and will be reduced to the same state as the peasantry of Europe, far behind their city cousins in social standing. The rural schools and social life must be kept upon a high plane, and agriculture must keep pace with industrial development.

The governor took up state tax problems, dealing particularly with the operations of the state institutions, and the plans for the year. He discussed the principals of the proposed severance tax and showed by illustration how a similar tax is working out in other states.

Following the governor's talk, Frank Grubbe of Wilbur, gave a de-

lightful vocal solo, after which H. E. Kruger, president of the State Farm Bureau spoke briefly, dealing with state problems. He made a forceful and earnest address which was very interesting.

MANY WILL GO TO COTTAGE GROVE

The Legion caravan which will travel to Cottage Grove on next Saturday night to attend the Days of '49 festivities in that city sponsored by the Legion post, will be a large one, according to reports of the committees today. The legionnaires will take their wives and in all about fifty will attend. Jay Fulcher, at the Pullman cigar store, is in charge of the transportation and those who desire to make the trip and have no means of transportation should get in touch with him and those who have extra seats in their cars are also urged to notify him. The legion drum corps will accompany the caravan and provide the jazz for the occasion. The boys are practicing nightly and will be in trim for the Saturday night barage.
