HEAD OF FOREST SERVICE SPEAKS

W. B. Greeley Addresses
Wool Growers Concerning
Range Fees, Etc.

FOREST SERVICE PLAN

Proposed Revision of Fees
Charged Sheep and Live-
stock Raisers is Meet-
ing Opposition.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 22.—Range fees and grazing administration of national forests was the subject of W. B. Greeley, chief of the United States Forest Service, in an address today before the annual convention of the National Wool Growers' Association.

The proposed revision of fees charged sheep and livestock raisers is meeting opposition and forester Greeley delved into all phases and discussed the matter at length.

"The high points of the revision are the issuance of range permits for periods of ten years, further emphasis upon ownership of ranch property or improvement, sufficient to afford a well balanced and efficient stock raising enterprise and the establishment of exceptionally good limits which will protect the livestock producer from future reductions below the point which represents an economic and profitable herd," he said.

"The new schedule of grazing fees had not yet been determined and will not be settled until we have heard all that the stockmen have to say about tentative proposals. It is apparent, however, that the charges for most of our allotments should be increased to some extent if they are to hold any parity with the value of corresponding private range lands.

"Notwithstanding the fact that the higher charges required by a majority of the livestock producers of the west, I believe that the government should put off whatever increases may be provided in our new schedule until the livestock industry is in better financial shape.

"The plan which the forest service has mapped out, in brief, is as follows:

"1.—The new grazing regulations will be put into effect in the season of 1924, with the exception that term permits will not be issued until the beginning of the season of 1925.

"2.—Where the new schedule shows that reduction below the present rates should be made, such reductions will be applied in full beginning with the season of 1925.

"3.—No increase in existing grazing fees, where the new schedule may call for them, will be made prior to the season of 1926.

"4.—The ten year permits issued in 1925 for range allotments in which the new schedule calls for higher fees will expire.

"5.—The present rates shall be continued without change during the year 1925.

"Second, that any increases called for by the new schedule will be put into effect on a gradual scale, one fourth in 1926, one half in 1927, three fourths in 1928, and the full increase in 1929. These graduated increases will be rounded off to the nearest cent per month for cattle and the nearest one quarter of a cent per month for sheep.

"Third, that the increase specified from 1926 to 1929 may be waived, in whole or in part, at the discretion of the secretary of agriculture.

"Should there be no substantial improvement in the business conditions affecting the livestock industry by 1926, the forest service will be prepared to consider either a full or a partial remission of the increased fees provided for that year. The term of the ten year permit will authorize such remissions at the discretion of the secretary of agriculture.

WEMME ESTATE CASE IS ENDED

Last Echo Heard Today When
Opinion Is Handed Down
By the Court.

MANDATE IS CONTINUED

Other Opinions Handed Down
by State Supreme Court—
Attorneys for Estate
Lose in Ruling.

SALEM, Jan. 22.—What is doubtless the last echo of the celebrated Wemme estate case in the Oregon supreme court was heard today when the court handed down an oral opinion denying a motion of attorneys N. Manly and Dan Powers of Portland for a "continuation of the mandate." The attorneys wanted the mandate changed to remove the limitation of the attorney's fees, leaving the fees to be fixed by the Judge of Probate Court.

Other opinions were: C. C. Sturtevant, vs. Geo. H. Dowson and C. D. Moyer, appellants; appeal from Lane county; opinion recalled for correction. Opinion by Chief Justice McBridge, Judge G. Skipworth, reversed and case remanded.

Eliza J. McDermid, appellant, vs. George B. Bonhill, executor of will of John McDermid, deceased, appeal from Sherman county; action for final accounting, modified.

Citizens National Bank of Baker City, appellant, vs. Baker county board of Equalization; appeal from Baker county; action for revocation of assessed valuation on shares on capital stock. Opinion by Justice McCourt, Judge Gustaf Anderson affirmed.

Grace M. Saylor, administratrix of estate of Carl Saylor, deceased, vs. Enterprise Electric company, appellant; action for damages, appeal from Walla Walla county. Opinion by Justice Brown, Judge W. Knowles affirmed.

S. P. Wilson, appellant, vs. Grace Gilliam, and other officials of Umatilla county; appeal from Umatilla county; action to recover property. Opinion by Justice Rand, Judge Gilbert W. Phelps reversed. By oral opinion the following:

State vs. Sullivan, petition for rehearing denied.

Grants Pass and Josephine County Bank vs. Gilmore, Motion to transfer to trial docket allowed.

McLaughlin vs. Ramsey, dismissed and affirmed.

Lichten vs. Clow, motion to relax cost denied.

Bora Holter vs. Geo. P. Bolter, et al. appellants dismissed with prejudice on stipulation of parties to appeal, each side to pay its own costs.

PROSPERITY FOR WOOL GROWERS

Year 1924 Holds Promise of
Continued Stabilization,
Says Speaker.

SPEAKS OF THE TARIFF

Says Financing Plans of Congress Were a Failure—
Cooperative Marketing
Major Problem.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 22.—The year 1924 holds a promise of continued stabilization and the beginning of progress and prosperity for the wool growing industry. President Frank J. Hagenbarth declared in an address before the annual convention of the national wool growers' association here today.

"With efficient and conservative management the wool grower will, in the next two or three years, be able to relieve himself of debt and begin the accumulation of a surplus with which to absorb the next shock to the industry," he said.

Dealing with tariff, Mr. Hagenbarth asserted "the usual threat of injury to the livestock industry from political influence and reduction or destruction of the tariff does not seem to be as imminent during the present presidential year as we have been accustomed to."

Mr. Hagenbarth said the National Wool Growers' Association had been active in promoting and assisting the wool grower in securing the tariff and urged continued support. The wool grower president declared financing plans of congress a failure and gave these two reasons:

"First, lack of education and understanding of the law by the grower and his financial advisers and second, the red tape and cumbersome and sometimes unreasonable restrictions that surround the administration of the law."

Cooperative marketing and organization were declared by Mr. Hagenbarth to be the two major problems which now face sheep raisers and he characterized as un-American the plan of the department of agriculture to commercialize the grading facilities of the national forests.

"These are good times to place economy in every direction and get out of debt," he urged in conclusion. "Too much debt in a broader sense means inflation and over expansion and these in turn mean overproduction and lower prices."

ART LONG, DRUGGED NOT DRUNK, WANTS HIS MONEY BACK

Arthur Long, who was recently fined \$25 for being intoxicated, last night petitioned the council for the return of the sum extracted from him, and claimed that he was not drunk, but merely stupefied by a double dose of a drug prescribed for him by a physician.

Long was arrested in the basement of the Perkins building where he appeared to be sleeping off a good "sac." He was taken before Recorder Whipple, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of intoxication, and paid a fine of \$25.

In his petition for the refunding of the payment, he claims that he was under the influence of a drug and did not know what he was doing when he appeared before the recorder.

He says that he has been suffering from a nervous disorder and that he went to a physician who gave him some nerve medicine. This medicine was a non-habit forming drug but an overdose brings on conditions resembling intoxication. The physician administered one dose, and Long claims that he took another shortly after and that he fell into a stupor which resulted in his arrest. His statements were substantiated by an affidavit of his physician.

The matter was referred to the committee on health and police.
