Secretary Hughes for the United States and Sir Auckland Geddes, the retiring British ambassador, affixed their signatures to the agreement which provides for extension of the American right of search beyond the three mile limit, and permits British vessels to bring ship's stores into American ports under seal.

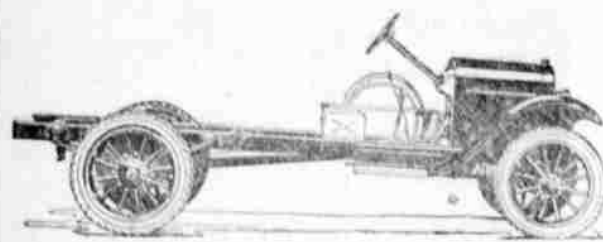

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—President Coolidge will call Chicago and Minneapolis bankers here for a conference on the banking situation in the Northwest unless they cooperate fully with the federal government in relieving credit conditions in that section.

Full cooperation, in the opinion of the president, must be given, or the government's efforts will be unavailing.

50-YEAR PAYMENT PERIOD RECOMMENDED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 23.—A forty or fifty year payment period, the proposition that the government stand any excess expense caused by errors of the reclamation service and the moderation of penalties for deferred payments were among the recommendations made yesterday by the delegates from the Salt River, Arizona, and the Hantley, Milk River and Sun River projects in Montana to the federal fact-finding commission.

Poor judgment by the reclamation service and lack of vision in placing certain parts of the improvements were recounted as partial reasons why the projects were not a success.

After the meeting is completed, it was announced yesterday, a session of a representative committee will be held and a comprehensive working plan will be called from the mass of recommendations made. This will be used later by the fact-finding commission in making its recommendations to the secretary of the interior. Judging from the testimony already given, members of the commission think a new plan for repayment of the sums spent on the projects will be necessary.

OREGON LEADERS HOLD CONFERENCE

The northwest realty board is to have a meeting today in connection with the agricultural conference.
