COOLIDGE WILL TALK IN NEW YORK

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—President Coolidge will leave Washington for the first time since he entered the White House last August, when he goes to New York on Lincoln's birthday to speak at the anniversary dinner of the National Republican club.

SAVE LIVES BY QUAKE WARNINGS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Belief that continued study of Seismological data will enable scientists to send out warnings of earthquakes and volcanic eruptions in time to save lives, and to some extent protect property, was expressed today by D. Thomas Jagger, Jr., director of the government's Hawaiian Volcano Observatory.

The effects of the auto-congestion in Yokohama and Tokio at the time of the earthquake, Dr. Jagger said in a statement today, "profoundly impressed him. The cars became so jammed in the narrow streets that fire apparatus could not get through."

"While it is true that on the Atlantic seaboard the likelihood of an earthquake and resulting fire is fairly remote, this is not true in Pacific cities, which are in a recognized earthquake district."

ARGENTINE FOLKS GREAT MEAT EATERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 24.—The people of the Argentine who have quite a reputation as meat eaters are the largest per capita consumers of mutton and the British come next, according to Charles J. Brand, consulting specialist in marketing, United States department of agriculture who addressed the annual convention of the National Wool Grower's Association here today.

In the Argentine every year, he said, each person eats 231 pounds of meat and of this 28 pounds is mutton.
