OFFICERS ELECTED BY WOOL GROWERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALT LAKE, Jan. 25.—The fifty-ninth annual meeting of the National Wool Growers' Association closed yesterday with the re-election of Frank J. Hagenbarth, of Spencer, Idaho, as president. Hagenbarth has been president since 1912.

Resolutions adopted by the wool growers in the closing session included:

Declaration that the proposed forest service plan to increase the grazing fee was unjust and should be contested even in congress.

Declaration that congress should pass a law making a fee of more than administration costs impossible.

A request to the tariff commission, President Coolidge and congress that the tariff on raw materials be left as at present.

Endorsement of the McNary-Haugen bill which is designed to create an export corporation to take care of excess agricultural products.

Formation of districts to cooperate with railroads in securing transportation facilities for shipping lambs.

Recommendations that cooperative wool marketing associations be created by wool men of the various states. The convention city for next year will be chosen in August by the executive committee.

Pocatello, Idaho, and San Francisco have requested the convention.

F. A. Ellenwood of California, was re-elected first western vice-president. A. A. Johns, of Arizona, was made second western vice-president. A. W. Coffey of St. Paul was re-elected president.

D. N. SNYDER OF GLENDALE DEAD

David N. Snyder, prominent lumberman passed away yesterday afternoon shortly after one o'clock, at his home on Gilbertson avenue in this city, aged about 73 years, says the Glendale News.

Mr. Snyder came to Glendale about the year 1902, and organized the Glendale Lumber Co., of which concern he held the presidency. He has served the city as mayor and was active in community affairs and business circles. He was vice-president of the Glendale State bank for a number of years past. Lately his health had been failing and a short time ago he went to Portland and received treatment from specialists, returning home only a short time previous to his death. He leaves a widow and three children, Albert Snyder of this city, Mrs. Loretta Frazier of Lodi-Cal., and Mrs. Mildred Jacobson, of Los Angeles, Cal.

He was charter member of Glendale Lodge 179, I. O. O. F., and was one of the men instrumental in organizing the lodge here.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been made, owing to the absence of A. A. Snyder, who has been in California on business. He has been summoned home and will arrive here on the Shasta today.

U. S. AND MEXICO TO HOLD CONFERENCE

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 25.—Fourteen subjects have been listed for presentation at the Second United States-Mexico Trade Conference to be held in this city February 11-15, inclusive. Discussions will be initiated by a paper prepared by an expert in the matter from either the United States or this country. The subjects are:

1. Starting business in Mexico—Incorporation, partnerships and agencies.
2. Agencies and agents compared with branches carrying stocks.
3. Importing for wholesale—Distribution and selling methods.
4. Importing for retail and selling methods.
5. Exporting from Mexico.
6. Banking and finance—Conditions and Methods.
7. Transportation in Mexico.
8. Packing, shipping and invoicing merchandise for Mexico.
9. Mexico as a field for insurance of all kinds.
10. Advertising in Mexico—How to reach the customer.
11. Agricultural and Industrial Investments.
12. Oil and Mining development.
13. Patents, Trade-Marks and Copyrights in Mexico.
14. Commercial and Educational exchanges.

TREATY IS SIGNED IN FRANCE TODAY

PARIS, Jan. 25.—A treaty between France and Czechoslovakia was signed at the foreign office today by Premier Poincare and Dr. Edouard Benes, the Czechoslovakian foreign minister.

Although the treaty has been termed in some quarters a defensive pact, spokesmen for the Prague gov-

ernment have said it imposes no military obligations on either France or Czechoslovakia, providing only for "understandings" between the general staffs of the two nations. It is said that the treaty contains a statement of the two countries' decision not to allow the return of either the Hohenzollern dynasty in Germany or the Hapsburg in Hungary.

DRIVER IS HELD FOR WOMAN'S DEATH

PORTLAND, Jan. 25.—A coroner's jury last night held Frederick L. Miller, local jeweler, responsible for the death of Mrs. Alma Hall, who was struck down and killed Wednesday afternoon by an automobile alleged to belong to Miller. The jury charged Miller with criminal carelessness.

The grand jury today is continuing its investigation of the case.

A charge of involuntary manslaughter has been filed against Miller on complaint of Chief Deputy Sheriff Christofferson. Miller is out under \$3,000 bail.

STEPS TAKEN TO END BRITISH STRIKE

LONDON, Jan. 25.—Thomas Shaw, Labor minister, and Miss Margaret Bondfield, parliamentary secretary for the labor ministry, have taken steps toward ending the strike of the Associated Society of Engineers and Firemen, the Morning newspapers say.

There is some fear, that the strike will spread, for the Amalgamated Engineering Union has ordered its members not to repair locomotives manned by strike breakers.
