KLAN LECTURE DRAWS GOOD CROWD

Rev. C. C. Curtis, Imperial lecturer for the Ku Klux Klan spoke to a large audience at the Armory last night, including in his discussion every phase of the organization which he represented. He first outlined the history of the Klan from its first organization following the Civil war and then gave the present workings and principles of the order. Mr. Curtis is a widely-known lecturer and is an excellent talker. He has travelled three times around the United States in the past two years, investigating the Klan from a personal view point and gave some first-hand information regarding its activities in the various states. The speaker took up in some length the recent Mer Rouge and Inglewood cases and brought to light some very interesting points, which he stated, never reached the papers. Several members of the local Klan were present in full regalia and just before the lecture placed a large fiery cross on the side of Mt. Nebo.

MANY SEE FILMS AND HEAR LECTURE

The Antlers theatre was crowded nearly to capacity last night to witness the motion picture films and slides of the scenic and outdoor life of Oregon, and to hear them explained by R. W. Price, Portland hotelman, and J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific. The pictures were shown just following the regular program of entertainment, and took the audience into an enchanted wonderland of Oregon parks, snow-capped peaks, highways, and mountains, and gave a most comprehensive picture of the delights that the Oregon out doors offers to the vacationist and tourist.

Mr. Ormandy lectured to some length on the resources of Douglas county, and their benefit financially. He likened Oregonians to the Persian in the fable who sold his farm, and searched the world over for a diamond mine which would make him immensely wealthy, only to come home old and in poverty to find that the man to whom he had sold his farm had discovered a diamond mine on that property. He urged Oregonians to get acquainted with their own estate, to investigate its resources, and see its wonders. Pictures of the profitable industries already carried on here were shown, during Mr. Ormandy's talk and figures given to show they were not yet developed to a third of their capacity. He recommended advertising as the great medium through which the tourist could be attracted and kept in Oregon.

NEW SCHOOL YEAR STARTS MONDAY

First Semester Ends Today
and Children Are Promoted to New Grades.

GRADES ARE CROWDED

Fifth and Sixth Grades at Rose and Benson Schools Are Badly Congested by Number of Pupils.

The first semester of the 1923-24 school year ended today and the new semester will start on Monday. The children attended school this afternoon and received their report cards, giving the results of the past year's work, together with the grades obtained in examinations just taken. Those promoted to new grades were enrolled with their new teachers and are ready to assume the work in the new classes next week.

The pupils completing the public school work are being enrolled in the high school today, and it is expected that the high school enrollment will be between 385 and 390 students. Parents having children between five and six years old who are physically strong, are being urged to start the children in the beginners classes in the Rose and Benson schools in the mid year. It is expected that there will be nearly fifty children start school at this time.

The fifth and sixth grades will be badly congested by the promotions being made. The fifth grade at the Rose school will be required to accommodate more than 54 pupils, while there will be more than 50 in the same grade in the Benson school. It is a recognized fact that efficiency is lowered when a teacher is required to instruct more than 30 pupils.

All of the grades are overcrowded and the residents of the city must be considering some plan to relieve the congestion, according to City Superintendent Hamm. At present all rooms are filled so that it is impossible to create new grades, and the only manner in which the condition can be remedied, it is believed, is to construct a new building, or else find quarters where classes may be held.

REEDSPORT BOOMING SAYS J. C. DIEHL

Warren P. Reed, founder of Reedsport, and J. C. Diehl, who is associated with Mr. Reed in advancing the city, were business visitors in Roseburg today. Mr. Diehl states that business at Reedport is booming and that the payroll is surpassing that of any other city in Douglas county, including Roseburg. With roadwork underway, and jetty and harbor improvements to start in the near future, the outlook is very bright. The Reedport harbor is becoming better known and the shipping records show a rapid increase in shipping. Two boats loaded out from the same dock this week, the San Jacinto and Birdie Hansen each taking on loads of lumber. The Bandon is due this week and will bring in a cargo of merchandise and take out lumber from the mills.

OSAGE INDIAN ATTORNEY HELD

J. A. Farris of Oklahoma Is Arrested by Government Agent Here Today.

POSED AS AN OFFICER

Government Claims Farris Impersonated Official Appointed to Collect Money From Indians.

J. A. Farris, an Indian attorney from Oklahoma, a member of the Osage tribe of Indians, was arrested here this morning by P. E. Marrinen, a special agent of the United States department of justice, and will be taken before U. S. Commissioner C. P. Hopkins on a charge of impersonating a federal officer. Farris was kept under guard last night by the sheriff's office, following instructions from the department of justice to hold the attorney.

Farris has been in Roseburg several days. He was interested, it is stated, in the procedure through which Oklahoma Indians received money from the government on a claim similar to that being put forward by Oregon Indians. It is believed that he came here for the purpose of endeavoring to persuade the Oregon Indians to retain him as one of their attorneys, and secure money in the form of fees and commissions. It is claimed that he secured various sums from Indians in Oklahoma by representing himself as a government agent appointed to make collections.

Sheriff Starmer last night received instructions from the department of justice to place a guard over Farris to prevent him from leaving the city. Farris was quite hostile when notified that a guard was to accompany him wherever he went, but when threatened by immediate arrest he consented to the arrangement.

This morning Special Agent Marrinen arrived with a warrant for the arrest of Farris and took him into custody. Farris will be given a preliminary hearing before U. S. Commissioner Hopkins tomorrow at which time it will be determined whether or not there are sufficient grounds to hold him for the federal court. U. S. Marshal Clarence Hotchkiss is scheduled to arrive in the morning from Portland to take charge of the case, and to appear for the government in the hearing before the U. S. Commissioner.

RAILWAY PLEA IS SHOWN OPPOSITION

PORTLAND, Jan. 25.—At the close of the hearing late yesterday before M. A. Pattison, examiner of the interstate commerce commission on the application of transcontinental railroads for permission to put in lower freight rates on numerous commodities from the Chicago territory to Pacific coast terminals without corresponding reductions to interior cities, testimony was offered by commercial interests of Portland and eastern Oregon in opposition to the railway plea.

Walter E. Meacham, secretary of the Baker county chamber of commerce; Earl E. Reynolds, secretary of the Union County chamber of commerce; and N. J. Daltner, a hardware dealer, offered testimony to show that unless interior cities were given proportionate rate reductions by reason of shorter haul their commercial interests would suffer.
