HENRY FORD CALLED TO WASHINGTON, D. C.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Henry Ford will be requested to appear early next week before the house military committee to discuss his offer for Muscle Shoals. The committee at an extensive session today instructed Chairman Kahn to telegraph to Mr. Ford that his presence here was desired Monday or Tuesday and that if he was unable to appear the committee wants to question one of his representatives as to his proposal.

JAPANESE ATTACK U. S. OPPONENTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) TOKIO, Jan. 26.—Anti-Japanese in America drew a second vigorous attack at the session of the house today, when Count Soyeyima, a liberal member, educated in England, interpolated the government, taking occasion to declare that the exclusion of Japanese proposed in the American immigration bill was a national insult to Japan, especially as Japan conscientiously had observed the "gentlemen's agreement."

WRITER'S COUSIN IS KILLED TODAY

The total cost of the ceremony, which was estimated at \$250,000,000 (about \$250,000,000) of this amount was said to be for the wedding and the purchase of gifts, and the third would be required for the honeymoon itself and the erection of buildings.
