GIBBONS DUE TO MAKE JACK STEP

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Because there may be some reasons to be suspicious over what happened in Shelby last summer and because Tom Gibbons never has been able to get the credit he deserves as a great fighter, there is a disposition in boxing circles to figure that Dempsey wants to give Gibbons a return battle merely to get into real fighting shape for Firpo or Wills.

It is not impossible that Gibbons will give Dempsey more trouble than Firpo will when they meet again and it is almost a conviction that Dempsey will beat Wills quicker and with more ease than he will take Gibbons the next time.

Gibbons certainly learned something in his first contest with the champion and he was not softened up by some of the hard punches he took in the body. It would be only logical to figure that Gibbons would do as well the second time in the ring as he did the first time.

Gibbons insists that he was not hurt by any body punches in the Shelby fight and that he was dazed once in the first round by a right hand punch to the head and once again in the last when Dempsey hit him in the groin.

Perhaps it would be safe to assume that Gibbons did have something taken out of him in that fight as every fighter who has gone against Dempsey came out of it with a few permanent injuries.

Granting this point, it must be assumed for the same reasons, that Dempsey might have been softened a little, or more, perhaps, in his last fight with Firpo. Dempsey stopped a lot of solid punches to the head and the body and everyone knows that the South American could hit.

Every since Dempsey and Gibbons fought fifteen rounds in Montana last summer it has been argued chiefly by those who did not see the fight, that it was a "carry" and that Dempsey has reasons to restrain him from knocking out Gibbons and gambling on a decision. It is quite silly to suggest that Dempsey at any time "gambled" on the decision, because he had one of his best friends in the ring as the referee and Gibbons would have been forced to floor Dempsey three or four times a round to get the title on a decision.

Dempsey ought to be ashamed of himself when he tells that he was afraid he would be shot if he knocked out Gibbons. If there were all the dangerous gat-loading cowboys there ready to drop him for hurting their idol, he would have been shot every time he fouled Gibbons and he did that a dozen times.

If he's the game fellow he seems to be and has given evidence of being, he would not have been intimidated by all the guns in the state, if there were any guns there. That's his part of the country. He should know that it isn't "bad country" out there and that there are no cases on record where a champion has been killed for knocking out a popular contender.

Down in his heart, Dempsey knows that he tried his best to bring Gibbons down and that he couldn't get to him with a solid punch. The champion looked invincible against Firpo but it must be remembered that every time he led, he landed on Firpo and Firpo went down. Gibbons would have gone down the same way and he would not have been physically able to get up off the floor as many times as the South American did. Dempsey, however, did not land on Gibbons with a good punch in the entire fifteen rounds and if Gibbons was fast enough then and clever enough to stay away from him then, there is no reason to believe that he has forgotten all his science in less than a year and has suffered a great physical decline.
