PILING PRICE DISCUSSED

Editor News-Review:—Would you be so kind as to print this matter in your next issue, as I feel pretty sure it would be of some benefit to the pile makers along the line. In the first place, the Portland pile buyers have been offering 19 and 22 and even as high as 18 cents per foot for the same piling they are now loading for 7 and 8 cents. There is something wrong here. The fact is that there is a party or two on the line that are between the people and the Portland buyers and I might say are forcing the pile makers to put their production on the market at this low price, for which they absolutely cannot make a living. Now what I want to ask the people is, why not drop right out and not load another car at those low figures. Get orders direct from the Portland dealers. Get the market price and then they can only make a living at it. Under the present circumstances it is nothing more or less than a game of starve out and hard work.

PROSPERITY IN COAST SECTION

Twelfth Federal Reserve Report Today Says Conditions Are Good.

EMPLOYMENT INCREASE

Year 1923 Established Record for Building in This District—Value of Farm Products Increase.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—Agricultural production in the federal reserve district comprising the states of the Pacific slope increased in volume substantially during 1923. It was stated today in the report of Federal Reserve agent John Perrin to the federal reserve board.

The report says the year was marked by "steady employment of practically all kinds of workers, a lower rate of labor turnover and improved industrial relations."

"Employment in most of the major industries of the district increased as compared with 1922, and during the period of greatest industrial activity in the spring and early summer there was some shortage of workers, particularly in mining districts and in the building trades."

"Wages during the year have been relatively stable, though a slight upward trend in the building trades and in agriculture was noted."

Other excerpts from the statement follows:

"The year 1923 established a record for building in the twelfth federal reserve."

"In 1923, the previous record year, the number of permits issued was 122,295 and their value \$310,644,294."

"The total number of business failures in the district during 1923 was 7.2 per cent less than the number of failures during 1922 and liabilities involved were less by 19.2 per cent."

"The year 1923 was one of the record activity in the lumber industry of the district. Production proceeded at a high rate throughout the year, demand was substantial and steady and transportation facilities generally adequate."

"There was an increase of 29.5 per cent in the number of new automobile passenger cars registered in the states of the district during 1923, as compared with November 1922. During the first 11 months of 1923, as compared with the same period of 1922, increased registration amounting to 62.3 per cent for passenger cars and 31.9 per cent for trucks were noted."

The advance in volume of farm products, says the report, was "accompanied by an advance in farm value of all products except fruits."

"That the increase in value of farm products has resulted in an increase in actual purchasing power of farming communities appears probable from the fact that prices of farm products, as a group, have risen approximately 1.4 per cent during the past year, while the general level of prices has declined 3.2 per cent."

"The production index from fruits shows an increasing yearly volume and a steady decrease in farm values during the past five years, both in the twelfth district and in the United States."

"Total output of canned fruit in three principal producing states of this district during 1923 was 19.7 per cent less than the record production of 1922, but 1.5 per cent above the average of the past four years. Production in California, where approximately 75 per cent of

the total pack of the district is canned was 26.6 per cent less than in 1922. The pack in Oregon and Washington was 12 per cent greater than the combined output of these states during 1922, a relatively large increase in Washington more than offsetting a slight decrease in Oregon.

"The value of gold and silver produced in the states of this district during 1923 has been estimated by the director of the mint at \$69,344,553, an increase of 11.6 per cent over the \$62,121,862 in gold and silver produced in the same states during 1922."

OAKLAND TO HAVE NEW CAMP FOR AUTO TOURISTS

Oakland will have a new free auto camp ground ready for use before the usual tourist traffic of the summer sets in, says the Oakland Tribune. It will occupy the quarter of the block back of the Leas & Co. garage, just half a block off the highway.

The park will be established and maintained by Leas & Co., who recently purchased the Nat Evans property and already owned the adjoining lot. The old house and other buildings will be torn down and the lots cleaned up in preparation for their new use. Up to date accommodations for automobile tourists will be provided and an effort made to conduct the park in such a way as to be a credit to the city.

It is estimated that tourist parties spend from \$7 to \$20 a day while on the road and if a camp with proper facilities induces them to spend a day or so in the community it will mean a considerable increase in local business during the summer.
