SENATE DEBATES OIL LEASE CASE

denied a statement issued last night by Senator Walsh saying that in view of the statement made by the president, obviously information had been transmitted to the executive about a confidential agreement of the senate investigating committee approving the principle. The Walsh sub-resolution. This measure would direct the president to bring court action and to employ special counsel to prosecute the cases.

The plain inference is that the president's action was actuated by what the committee did in executive session last Saturday. I visited the White House at 10:30 o'clock Saturday night at the request of the president. When I reached there the statement had been prepared substantially in the form in which it was issued. The president had no information from me and, I am advised, from no other person, before he prepared the statement.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—President Coolidge was talking by long distance telephone early today with several attorneys with a view to engage counsel to prosecute oil lease cases and White House officials said he expected to be able to announce selections sometime today.

Disregarding his earlier engage-

mente the president remained in his study in the white house past mid-forenoon, in communication with those he was considering as special counsel. Meantime, Senator Lodge of Mass., republican, leader in the senate; Senator Watson, of Indiana, and nearly a dozen other callers waited at the executive office for an opportunity to see him.

The president went to his office shortly before 11 o'clock and it was intimated that he was waiting only for a definite reply from some of those with whom he had talked. Meantime Senator Lodge had left the White House.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—President Coolidge and Attorney-General Daugherty were attacked in the house today by Representative Garrett of Tennessee, the democratic leader for their failure to act more promptly on the naval oil disclosures.

The Tennessee representative declared the president "has no confidence" in Mr. Daugherty and added: "When a government department is suspected throughout the land of being connected with fraud and corruption it is time for a general clean-up of all departments."

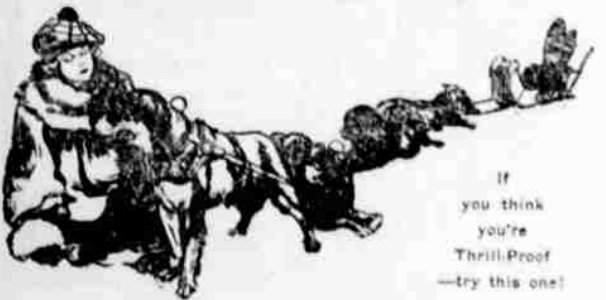
