

ROSEBURG WILL HAVE A FESTIVAL

**Umpqua Chiefs Will Sponsor
Strawberry Fete on June
12, 13 and 14.**

MEET WITH INDIANS

Festival Will Be Staged During Days Set for the Big Rendezvous of Oregon Indian Tribes

With a blood-curdling war whoop the Umpqua Chiefs, Roseburg's booster club, last night voted unanimously to stage the Strawberry Festival on June 12, 13 and 14, the dates already selected by the Oregon Indian tribes for their big rendezvous and pow wow in this city. With the Indians and the paleface chiefs cooperating, Roseburg will see one of the biggest and best celebrations ever staged here and the two events will undoubtedly attract tourists and visitors from all over the coast.

It was decided that the three dates selected by the Indians are just right for the dates of a Strawberry Festi-

The carnival committee of the Chiefs was instructed to get busy at once and the armory has already been secured for the three nights. The

In years past Roseburg's Strawberry Festival has attracted visitors from all parts of the state and it is thought that with the extra added attractions this year, the city will be crowded during the three days. Some time ago it was decided to hold

July 4th celebration but the Chief of last night decided to abandon those plans and broadcast to the state and the world at large that all efforts will be concentrated to put over the strawberry carnival. The coast sections are expected to send large delegations to Roseburg for the three days.

Motion picture concerns will be here to film the Indian festivities and as a result the city will obtain some real advertising.

Chef Umpqua Neuner is today making plans with G. W. Rapp, who represents the Indian tribes, and the fullest cooperation of the Umpqua will be extended to them.

The meeting of the Umpqua Chiefs last evening was a lively affair. The uniform committee reported and although the boosters have not determined the style of uniform they will wear, a selection will be made shortly and the cloth ordered.

Chief Neuner has issued a proclamation to the Cavemen of Grants Pass

and the Pirates of Coos Bay, inviting those desperadoes to visit Roseburg in the near future to initiate their Chiefs. The boosters of those places have signified their intentions of "branding" the Chiefs and will not doubt accept the invitation. The date of the grand pow wow has not been set but when it is announced the cit-

citizens of this city can be assured of a lively evening. It is planned to hold the initiation at the armory, at which time the general public will be cordially invited to attend and witness the burial of the mossback knocker.
