Many Changes Made in the Existing Laws—Vets With Children Allowed Increase in Money.

ROSEBURG SCHOOLS SET NEW RECORD

More Pupils in Attendance This Semester Than Ever Before in the History of the City.

The school enrollment for the new semester which started Monday is the largest in the history of the Roseburg schools, according to City Superintendent M. S. Hamm...

FALL ON VERGE OF A BREAKDOWN

Today was the resolution of Senator Walsh, calling on the president to employ special counsel and institute proceedings for cancellation of both the Doherty and Sinclair leases.

A different situation, however, confronted the resolution presented by Senator Robinson, democrat, Arkansas, asking for the removal of Secretary Denby and any other officials of the navy department whose connection with the leases indicates "misfeasance or malfeasance."

The republican organization opposed the proposal, although they conceded that it might attract enough democratic and insurgent republican votes for adoption.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—President Coolidge, asked a direct question by callers to his office today relative to the Robinson resolution requiring the resignation of Secretary Denby, replied that it was a matter he did not care to discuss.

The president considers the whole oil leasing investigation as having resolved itself into two major problems for the executive branch of the government—first, to determine whether there was criminal liability, and second, to ascertain whether the leases are legal and to the best interests of the government.

All other matters are of lesser importance in his opinion. Selection of counsel to prosecute the oil lease cases, it was indicated today at the white house, is being held up to await action by the senate on the Walsh resolution.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—A resolution expressing the sense of the senate that the president request the immediate resignation of Attorney General Daugherty was prepared by Senator Wheeler, today, who said he would introduce at the first opportunity.

The resolution declares that the president has lost confidence in Mr. Daugherty, as exemplified by employment of outside counsel to prosecute the oil annulment suits. It also asserts that "Mr. Daugherty has lost the confidence of congress and of the American people and that the department of justice has fallen into disrepute."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Albert Fall, former secretary of the interior, was placed under surveillance of department of justice agents at New Orleans, January 20, Senator Willis, republican, Ohio, declared today in the senate. Orders were sent out to the agents from the department, the senator said, not to permit him to leave the country, "under any conditions."

Before the house naval committee, Rear-Admiral Gregory urged aviation bases at Camp Lewis and Sand Point in Washington, and General Henry T. Allen asked the foreign affairs committee to recommend funds for German relief.

In the house Representative Jones, democrat, Texas, made a speech for the farmers and representative Nelson in-surgent republican of Wisconsin, demanded another investigation; this one to be into the air service.

AIR SERVICE TO BE INVESTIGATED

Representative Nelson Says Aircraft Was Failure During the War.

PREFERS NO CHARGES Says Air Service Is Conducting Propaganda to Force Through Appropriations to Waste Money.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—A sweeping investigation of the air service was demanded in the house today by Representative Nelson, republican, Wisconsin, who declared he was informed that conditions which exist are a continuation of the same practices by the same parties "that wrote the blackest page in America's war history in the aircraft failure."

Introducing a resolution asking for the appointment of a special committee of inquiry, he said: "I am preferring no charges against anybody. I simply wish to end this unspeakable condition in the air service or set at rest these charges if found untrue."

Mr. Nelson said he had more than seven thousand documents which he added, "I am told will show the same conditions which existed during the darkest days of the black scandal in the air service now exists in that service, and that the same firms who participated in the loot of more than \$500,000,000 of the people's money are still getting the contracts under the same conditions and provisions they got those previous contracts."

He declared the air service is conducting a propaganda "over mountain and sea, desert and valley, in order to try to force congress through an aroused public sentiment, to appropriate more money than the officials of the air service seem to feel congress would be willing to appropriate under a proper presentation of the needs of the service," and he asked:

"Is this the purpose of the proposed flight of the dirigible to the north pole?" Mr. Nelson said that in his opinion the manufacturers' Airplane Inc., and its method of operation "were in absolute violation of the Sherman Anti-trust law," and that he was convinced that an investigation would show this "not only being the fact, but it's being a fact today."

LEGION ANNOUNCES PEACE ESSAY CONTEST

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—To arouse greater interest in the development of good citizenship, a state-wide essay contest is being conducted among the high school students of the state on the subject of "Peace—The Patriotism" by the American Legion, Department of Oregon.

Prizes of \$200 for the first, \$100 for the second and \$50 for the third best essay submitted are to be given by the Legion. The contest will be open for all students enrolled in the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades of the public schools of Oregon. Each essay is to be from 400 to 600 words in length. Preliminary contests will be held in each county under direction of legion county Americanism Chairmen. The best essay from each county will be submitted to state headquarters of the legion for judging by state judges. The state judges selected are Robert S. Bean, Federal Judge; J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction and W. B. Ayer, chairman of the Multnomah County Library Board. The contest closes in counties May 1st, and state contest, June 1st.

The purpose of the contest is to create a state-wide public sentiment in the duties of citizenship, said Mr. Cassius R. Peck, Chairman of the Americanism Commission of the Oregon Department of the American Legion in outlining the contest. "Each child knows that it is a patriotic duty to shoulder a gun in defense of country, but very few children ever get the angle that it is just as much a duty to arm themselves with an intelligent ballot in defense of their country."

JURY RECOMMENDS MOVING MAIL BOXES

Coroner's Jury Wants Mailboxes Moved Back from Highway So That Rural Carriers Will Not Stop on Road. The coroner's jury, investigating the death of Mrs. J. B. Embree of Wolf Creek, who was killed Saturday in an automobile accident near the Rice Hill schoolhouse, found that the accident was entirely unavoidable and that no person was responsible for the wreck which resulted in Mrs. Embree's death. The jury, however, recommended that the mail boxes along the highway be set back from the road so that mail carriers in delivering mail would be able to drive their machines entirely off the pavement before stopping. Although the mailman was not in any way responsible for the wreck, it was shown that if he had not been forced to stop on the road because of the position of the mail box, Embree would have been able to have seen ahead and would not have applied his brakes so suddenly.

This is said to be the second accident resulting from the same cause, that of mail boxes being too close to the road, and the jury makes its recommendation that all mailboxes along public roads be set back from the road and turnouts provided so that it will not be necessary for the mail-carriers to stop their cars on the pavement.

The jury was composed of C. L. Chenoweth, J. T. Hogan, F. Fortin, R. H. Easley, J. L. Morris, and R. H. Manning. Coroner Ritter took charge of the inquest and District Attorney Guy Cordon aided in the examination of witnesses.
