

Notice of School Meeting

SALEM BROCCOLI GROWERS ARE GAME

SALEM, Jan. 29.—Complete survey of the kale and broccoli situation has convinced E. H. Biehn, field man for the Oregon Growers association, that both of these crops in this vicinity are so completely wiped out by freezing that there will not be a head nor spear left for disposal this coming spring.

Yet in the face of constant disappointments the past few years with the broccoli crop, there are some doughty farmers who are willing and ready to go at it again believing that growers with less nerve will pass out of the game and that there is a gambler's chance for a killing to be made.

Sloper brothers of Independence, who for nine years have been putting in 20 acres of broccoli, will still stick and take one more chance, probably on as large an acreage as ever, although this is not definitely determined.

G. Richardson, McCoy grower, who has been cleaned out for three years hand running will put in a patch, although probably on a little smaller scale than before. He believes there will be a dearth of broccoli here and if he puts in his small patch he will find a good sale for it at top prices on the local market, if the winter leaves it alone.

James Collins, of Independence, who was cleaned out on 27 acres of broccoli this year and figures his loss at over \$3000 is also going to take a chance on a small acreage.

Wells brothers, who had 8 acres this year and have been pretty consistent raisers for several years, will back out and raise only enough for home consumption.

Probably no individual crop has been so hard hit here during the past few years as broccoli and in no year has it been so completely cleaned out as this year, it is stated.

PRIME MINISTER PROCEEDS SLOWER

(Associated Press Telegram Wire.) LONDON, Jan. 29.—Prime Minister MacDonald has met with circumstances which have compelled him to go slower regarding the recognition of Russia by Great Britain than he had intended when he took office, according to some political writers.

The political correspondent of the Daily Mail puts the premier's position as follows: "It is unlikely that Mr. MacDonald will take any precipitate action towards recognition, permanent officials of the foreign office and an examination of documents on file there having convinced him such a step would not be in the best interests of the country. He is anxious for recognition as soon as possible and is engaged in making the necessary preliminary inquiries."
