NORTHWEST CREDIT SITUATION REVIEWED

(Associated Press Learned Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The Northwestern Credit situation occupied a large place in the attention of President Coolidge today.

Managing Director Meyer of the War Finance Corporation, just returned from the northwest as a member of the commission sent to determine what aid the federal government might render, had an engagement to deliver his report and discuss with the executive plans for recapitalization of northwestern banks.

Conferences also were arranged by Mr. Coolidge with Gray Silver, Washington representative of the American Farm Bureau federation; Representative Leavitt, republican, Montana, and a committee of Montana farm organizations and Representatives French, republican, Idaho, and representatives of the wheat growers association.

Plans for the conference to be held later this week with northwestern bankers meantime are moved forward by Secretaries Hoover and Wallace.

Meantime the first of the big farm measures introduced at this congress was approved by the senate agricultural committee. It is the Norbeck-Burness bill proposing an appropriation of \$75,000,000 for the aid of northwestern wheat growers in particular and agriculture generally.

As introduced the measure carried \$50,000,000 for the aid of wheat growers only, but a committee accepted a proposal by Senator Harrison, democrat, Mississippi that an additional \$25,000,000 be added for assisting producers of cotton and other agricultural products.

A sub-committee was appointed to work out details of the Harrison amendment.

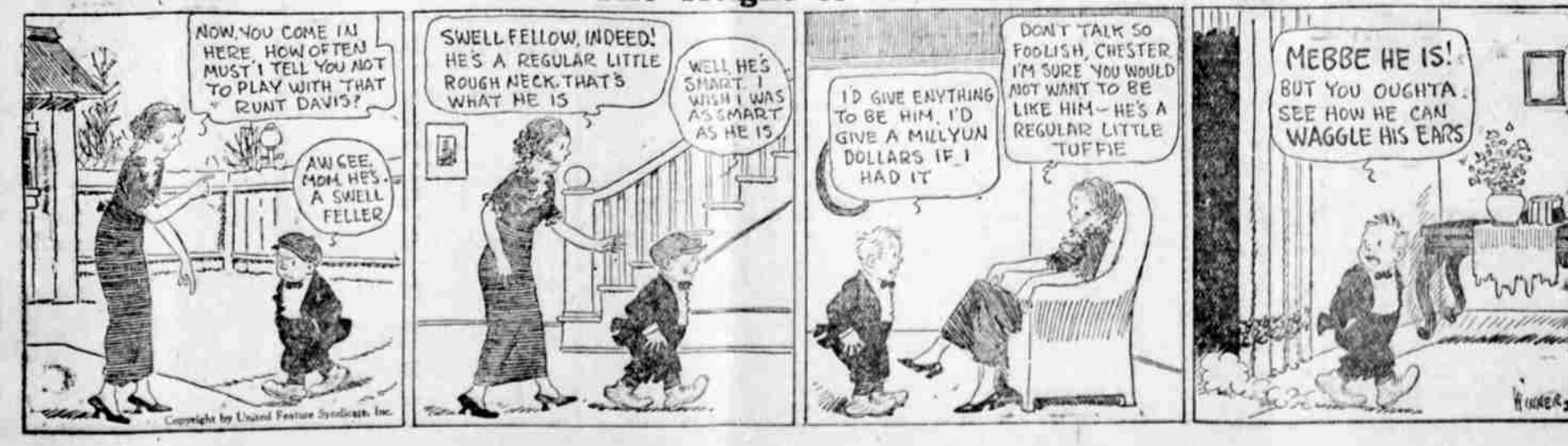
