WILL CASE IS BEFORE COURT

Contest Over Hough Will
Taken Before Judge Hamilton on Appeal.

BRIEFS TO BE FILED

Attorneys for Each Side, After
Presenting Arguments,
Given Time to Prepare
and File Briefs.

The appeal of the Hough will case, which has attracted a great deal of attention throughout the county recently is now before Judge Hamilton in the circuit court, and briefs are to be prepared and filed with him during the next few days.

Alfred Hough was an old Civil War veteran at the Soldiers Home. He became ill and was placed in the hospital, and his clothes taken away from him to prevent him from leaving the building.

His nephew, Robert Hough, arrived here in the summer of 1922, in response to a message stating that his uncle was being held confined against his will, and he removed the old man from the state institution. At that time, on July 1, 1922, the veteran made a will in favor of his nephew. Later, on September 8, another will was drawn, the veteran dying on September 12. The latter will was also in favor of the nephew and Mrs. Leona Abraham was named as executrix.

Edward Hough, brother of the deceased and the father of Robert Hough, contested the will on the grounds that the old soldier was incompetent at the time the will was made and was not of a disposing mind. The question of the signature on the will was also discussed, and there was considerable argument as to whether or not the name as written on the second will was really signed by Mr. Hough.

The probate court, after considering the matter at great length and receiving a great deal of testimony from both sides, returned a verdict in favor of the contestant. An appeal was taken to the circuit court by the executrix and this is now being considered. The case was argued before Judge Hamilton by Attorney Albert Abraham representing the executrix, and R. B. Compton, appearing for the contestant. After going over the transcript of evidence quite thoroughly and presenting the arguments on both sides, the judge allowed further time in which to prepare and file briefs for the consideration of the court.

BAITING OF R. R. STILL SURVIVES

President Sproule of S. P. Says
Railroads Are on Defensive as a Result.

TAXATION IS DISCUSSED

In 1923 Official Says Roads
Had But Five Cents Left
Out of a Dollar After
Taxes, Interest Paid.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—Railroad baiting still survives despite the fact that baiting has long ago been stopped by penal laws and bear baiting is no longer allowed. William Sproule, president of the Southern Pacific company said today in an address at opening of the first mid-year western conference of the chamber of commerce of the United States here. Paul Shoup, vice-president of the Southern Pacific company, is presiding at the meeting.

"Like the bull and the bear, the railroads are on the defensive only because of their being baited," Mr. Sproule continued. "It is time that railroad baiting ceased to be a popular pastime."

"Do you know that in 1913, which was the year before the German war broke out and which was the year in which railroad rates were low, the class one railroads of the country paid their stock dividends amounting to \$222,000,000. In 1922, on the contrary, the stockholders received \$50,000,000 dividends in 1922 than in 1913, although in 1922 the railroads earned \$5,673,000,000 as against \$3,119,000,000 gross in 1913."

"The railroads should not be asked to sell transportation at a loss because some other industry is not prospering. The fact is that there is not

an industry in the country which could be made prosperous by a general reduction of railroad rates upon that industry, while the rate reductions themselves might at the same time total such amounts as to deprive the railroads of the means necessary to serve the public at large.

"In 1923, the railroads had but five cents left out of the dollar after paying their taxes and before they paid interest on money borrowed, generally known as fixed charges."

In calling the meeting to order, Chairman Shoup said: "Taxation is the most important question before the American people today. For those who have incomes above a few thousand dollars per annum, the war will never be over. Surely our country will appreciate the necessity of taking advantage of the opportunity strongly presented in a systematic and businesslike way, for reduction of these burdens."

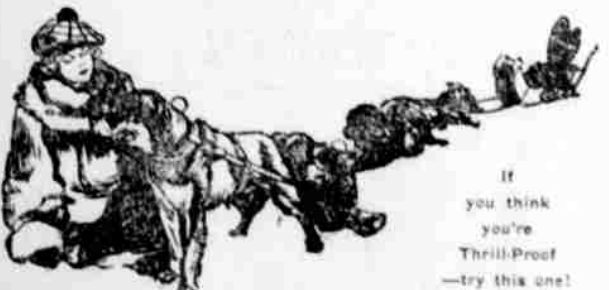
