

COOLIDGE'S FIRST LESSON IN ECONOMY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—President Coolidge received his first lesson in "sound political economy" and a striking lesson in domestic economy during the Garfield-Hancock campaign of 1900, when he was 42 years old.

Speaking informally at the annual meeting of the Ohio Society of Washington, last night, Mr. Coolidge told this story of an incident of the Garfield-Hancock campaign.

"It was during that campaign that I, a small boy, approached my father, who was a very good business man, with the proposition that he should furnish me with a penny to buy some candy. He told me that we were in the midst of a political campaign and that there was a probability, a possibility at least, that we were going to elect a democrat for president. Such an action, he said, would undoubtedly be followed by hard times, and therefore it was necessary to economize.

"That was good, sound doctrine, I think; anyhow it had to do for me. But I recall that the next morning after the election and as soon as the news reached our town that James A. Garfield had been chosen president, I went to my father and told him the result which indicated we were to continue a republican administration and with that prospect in view I was able to secure the advance of the sum I had asked."

ROSEBURG TO BE STAGE TERMINAL

(Continued from page one)

Roseburg. These buses will make stops at only a few of the larger points along the way, and will not do local work, which will be left to the buses operating between the other cities of the state.

It is expected that within the next few days an organization will be perfected with one head to direct all operation in the state. Cooperative schedules will be worked out so that there will be few delays encountered in the operation of the buses.

The union of the stage lines is expected to prove of a great deal of benefit to the traveling public, and will probably greatly facilitate the handling of passenger service during the coming summer months, when it is expected that travel by motorbus will set an altogether new record.

There will be at least three daily through stages between Portland and Roseburg, four between Roseburg and Eugene, four to Coos Bay and three to Ashland. The Roseburg-Ashland line has put a new bus in service and is planning on further additions. The new through buses between Roseburg and Portland will all be new and will make fast time with few stops.

George Bryant, manager of the Coast Auto Stage lines, has succeeded in purchasing the Marshfield-Crescent City lines, and will operate buses from Roseburg to Marshfield, and then down the coast to Crescent City and between Crescent City and Grants Pass.

Richard Shepard, secretary-treasurer of the Central Stage Terminal and Hotel company, spent the day in Roseburg today and states that arrangements are being made for a meeting of all of the officers of the various stage lines of the state to be held in Roseburg in the near future. All of the officers will come to Roseburg for a two-day session, at which time the plans will be perfected in detail and the state organization formed and named.

"Roseburg will be the center for all Southwestern Oregon," Mr. Shepard stated in discussing the proposed merger. "The city has been selected by the stage lines as their headquarters, and will be greatly developed and advertised in the future. It is the plan of the auto bus operators to spend large sums in advertising Southern Oregon. Douglas county will be broadcasted as a sportsman's paradise and as a scenic wonderland. The stage men hope to develop feeder lines which will handle traffic to the spots of interest in Douglas county, creating a system which will be of mutual benefit to the smaller operators and to the main lines. The Oregon Caves are to be highly advertised all over the United States, and all traffic to these points by autobus will be handled through Roseburg, Crater Lake and other points of interest, are to be brought to the attention of the public in a forceful manner, and particular attention will be given to the beauties to be found on the coast loop, from Roseburg to Coos Bay, then down the beach to Crescent City and back to Roseburg by way of the Oregon Caves and Grants Pass. The community will be greatly benefited and developed by this merger and we expect that it will greatly increase the auto stage business in Oregon."

HEFLIN CHALLENGED PRESS RESOLUTION

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Jan. 30.—Challenging Senator Hefflin, democrat, Alabama, to press his resolution introduced Monday, in which it was charged that an effort was made in 1921 "to stifle an inquiry into land frauds in Texas," R. B. Creager, republican national committeeman for Texas, in a statement here today declared Mr. Hefflin was actuated by the lowest of political motives.

"I challenge Senator Hefflin to press his resolution," said Mr. Creager. "I do not believe he introduced it with any intention of ever having an investigation as to whether any cabinet officer had been improperly influenced or that I had sought to improperly influence them. I denounce Senator Hefflin in taking advantage of his position in the United States senate to slander honorable men and in this, to do an injury to a great and rich section—the lower Rio Grande valley—with the lowest political motives."

LONE BANDIT GETS AWAY WITH \$2,000

GOVERNOR McCRAE DECLARED BANKRUPT

In the report Mr. Sheridan held that McCrae is not a farmer nor a laborer and therefore not exempt from the federal laws governing involuntary bankruptcy proceedings.

FILTER PLANT IS PLACED IN USE

DENVER, Jan. 30.—Denver's new filter plant constructed at a cost of approximately \$80,000, will be used for the first time today, according to plans announced by the engineer in charge. Water will be taken directly from the Deschutes river within the city limits.

The river will be tested several times each day to regulate the filtration and chlorination process.

NEWSPAPERS TO GO FIRST CLASS MAIL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Beginning Friday, newspapers will be accorded the same treatment in the mails as letters and other first class matter by an order made public today by Postmaster General New.

"The order," said Mr. New, "means much to the American public. It is one of the most important and far-reaching steps in postoffice history. It is for the benefit of those who desire to have their newspaper placed before them at as early a moment as possible. This should keep both the city and rural population in closer and quicker touch with their several fields of activities."

Under the new system newspapers will be made up in separate sacks plainly labeled with the word "newspapers." If there are only a few copies of newspapers at the point of destination, they will be placed in pouches with first class mail or in separate sacks, even though the sacks are only partly filled. The order stipulates that newspapers shall not be mixed with parcels at any point in their dispatch from the publishers' offices until their delivery to the addressee.

Postmasters are required by the order to notify publishers in each instance when deliveries do not catch the dispatch which they are advertised to catch; also to notify publishers when they are sending their publications to wrong addresses and to addresses of deceased persons. Publishers will be notified by postmasters when they are putting up their mail in an improper manner.

The order applies alike to daily and weekly newspapers. It stipulates that all sacks of newspapers when received in postoffices must be segregated promptly and the contents distributed to the proper station for delivery by carriers on the earliest possible trip.

Carefully worded and minute instructions have been issued to all postal employees so that there will be no possibility of misunderstanding the importance of getting newspapers to the reader with a minimum delay.

TRANSIENT DIES AT MERCY HOSPITAL

Mate Gayer, or Cragen, a transient, died at Mercy Hospital last night, after an illness lasting several days. The man came to Roseburg about 12 days ago in poor health. He remained at the Roseburg Hotel for a few days and then checked out. Three days ago he came back, apparently very ill, and stated that his funds were exhausted and that he was very sick. He was given a room and a physician called, and he was immediately ordered removed to the hospital. He was unable to walk, by the time he was taken to the hospital and was unable to give any information regarding himself or his relatives. He was registered at the hotel in one place as Mate Gayer and another place as M. Cragen. His papers have been searched but nothing could be found to aid in locating relatives. He will probably be buried by the county.

M'NARY-HAUGEN BILL IS DEBATED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Both senate and house agriculture committees today took up the McNary-Haugen bill which would provide an export corporation to take over and market surplus crops at a "pre-determined ratio price."

Chester C. Davis, Montana commissioner of agriculture, told the senate committee the McNary measure "strikes at the root of the trouble."

The farmers' condition, he said, could be traced directly to the reduction of price of major farm products with relation to the general level of prices and costs in the United States.

Secretary Wallace told the house committee the bill was the most specific agricultural relief measure before congress.

The farmers are at a disadvantage because of the loss of purchasing power of their products. Mr. Wallace said, and action is necessary. Sections of the bill providing for exports of the surplus crops. "Wallace said would stimulate foreign competition and enable American farmers to continue a hold on the world market."

Mr. Parkhurst was in poor health for a number of years, his condition being the result of an injury received when he was crushed between an auto truck and a building. He recently moved to California in a hope of bettering his health but no improvement followed and death finally resulted. He is survived by a wife and two small children, a son Herchel and daughter, May. He was a member of the Elks and Knights of Pythias lodges of Roseburg. No announcement has been received regarding the funeral plans.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Hannah Stone, who died yesterday at her home in Edenbower, was held this afternoon at the Undertaking parlors, Rev. Caldwell officiating. The services were attended by a large number of the friends and neighbors of the deceased.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Steps toward prosecution of the oil cases were begun today by Elias H. Strawn of Chicago, one of the special counsel selected by President Coolidge.

Mr. Strawn conferred with the president and announced he would proceed immediately with his work. Organization matters will await the arrival of Thomas W. Gregory, attorney, general in the Wilson cabinet, who will conduct the prosecution jointly with Mr. Strawn.

The only directions received from the president, Mr. Strawn said, were to proceed in accordance with the executive's statement of last Saturday midnight.

This statement declared counsel would be instructed to prosecute those cases in the courts so that if there is any guilt it will be punished; if there is any civil liability, it will be enforced; if there is any fraud it will be revealed and if there are any contracts which are illegal they will be cancelled.

Mr. Strawn also made appointments to confer today with members of the senate investigating committee and to secure from the department of justice evidence that it has collected since it was instructed by the president to observe the course of the inquiry.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Rear Admiral Latimer, Judge-advocate general of the navy, told the house navy committee today that in December 1921, he informed Secretary Denby it would be legal to enter into a contract with the Doherty interests for the construction of tankers at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, as a part of their lease to the California Naval Oil Reserve.

The Admiral said he based his opinion on authority granted the department by congress in June 1920, to exchange oil and provide storage facilities. This authority, it was brought out by committee members, was granted at the request of Joseph Daniels, then secretary of the navy.

Mr. Denby on December 5, 1921, the witness said, wrote on the margin of the opinion, opposite the section discussing exchange and storage of oil, "Do this. E. D."

She is survived by her aged husband, and by one daughter, Mrs. A. H. Cox. Mrs. Dore Lenox is a granddaughter. The funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 p. m. at the Undertaking parlors, Rev. Caldwell officiating. Interment will take place in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.
