

TRACT TO BE SOLD

Best Service Offering Timber in Laying Creek District for Sale.

RAILROAD IS NEEDED

Purchaser of Timber Will Be Required to Build Railroad and Small Town Under Terms of Contract.

A local forest service office is offering for sale approximately 100,000 acres of timber comprising an area of about 5,800 acres on the west side of the Umpqua National Forest, located about four miles above the terminus of the O. P. E. railroad west of Cottage Grove. The timber to be sold consists of 248 million feet of Douglas fir, 909 feet of Western hemlock, 119 thousand feet of sugar pine and white pine. The average price per acre is about \$4,000 based on Forest Supervisor Neal states the Forest Service is receiving offers regarding the sale, particularly from the south, indicating that companies previously operating in the southern part of the forest are now anxious to start their activities in Oregon.

A tract now offered for sale is part of the 63,000-acre working forest of Laying Creek—Frank Brice tract, which is estimated to be capable of producing annually continuous about 40 million feet. This tract is now placed under a definite management by the Forest Service, which presupposes that an average maximum of 40 million feet be cut from National Forest land, thus assuring a continuous yield of this amount to logging operations in the vicinity.

Up this tract five miles of railroad will be required for the common carrier at Rujada Creek to the vicinity of the creek. From this main line it is assumed that the tract be opened up by inclines and into major subdivisions or the Rujada Creek canyon, a natural line of division. The tract offered for sale lies on the south side of Laying Creek, rising abruptly from an elevation of 2500 feet one half mile of the creek. From these the ground rises gradually to elevations along the divide from 3100 to 4200 feet. These benches are reached, and logging conditions are

on the basis of current wage scales, it is estimated that the early outlay in logging investment, including a tapline railroad, and temporary spurs, roll-over and logging equipment, improvements, to place the operation on a 40 million capacity for first year will be about \$240,000. A stumpage alone is offered for the title to the land being reaped by the Government. Following a period of advertisement, the tract will be awarded to the highest bidder showing sufficient financial ability to fulfill the terms of the contract.

Initial contract price will apply until December 1, 1928, at which time, and at three-year intervals thereafter, the Forest Service has the option of readjusting the stumpage values and prices being received for the timber. Timber will be paid in advance installments of \$9 to \$20,000 each as cutting proceeds and on the basis of the amount log sold. The contract was on November 30, 1925, in conformity with the plan of the Forest Service, which gives assurance of continual operation on a stable basis. It is the desire of the Forest Service to have all improvements, especially a central community for loggers and their families, made as permanent a plan as possible. The importance of this living conditions and opportunities for family life for woodworkers will appeal to all progressive operators for one reason on account of the stabilizing effect on the supply. well as all camps, will be subject to the approval of the Forest Service.

Since the intake for the Cottage Grove municipal water supply is now Laying Creek below the sale area, this will have to be moved to tributaries of the main creek, namely, Dinner Creek and Prather Creek, which are free from the likelihood of contamination. This is considered an incident to the sale of this timber, on account of the vested water right of the city. The contract will require that the purchaser build the requisite additional pipe lines and intakes; the estimated cost of which, however, is to be deducted from the appraised value of the stumpage. Hence the minimum rate acceptable for the first 45,285,000 feet of Douglas fir is 25 cents less than that for the remainder of the Douglas fir. As a guarantee of faithful performance of the contract, the purchaser is required to furnish bond of \$35,000.

TOKIO POLITICS ARE IN TURMOIL

Imperial Diet Was Dissolved Amid Scenes of Great Disorder and Riot.

FLASKS ARE HURLED

Police Are Maintaining Close Watch Over Proceedings—Water Containers Used as Missiles.

TOKIO, Jan. 31.—The Imperial diet was dissolved today following scenes of the greatest disorder in which water flasks were thrown and fists used. The disturbance resulted from attempts of the opposition to impeach the government regarding the attempted wrecking of a train at Nagoya carrying opposition leaders to Tokyo. The turbulent scenes which occurred in the lower house made further business impossible. The outburst came shortly after the representatives had taken their seats upon the resumption of a temporary adjournment, which was followed by dissolution of the diet.

Interpreting the government in connection with the train wreck in which three prominent opposition leaders escaped injury, although the locomotive of their train was damaged, the foes of Premier Kiyoura and his newly installed cabinet demanded that the premier reply personally. Kiyoura however refused to resign.

Great disorder ensued, amid which Kenjiro Komatsu minister of communications and a member of the house of peers attempted to reply to the interpellations. In the confusion an agitator, rushed to the platform and thrust Komatsu aside. A riot followed. The legislators used water containers as missiles and several engaged in fist combat.

Hostilities continued until the speaker of the house hastily declared a temporary adjournment, which was followed by dissolution of the diet.

Six rallies were held in Tokyo by the opposition this afternoon. The police were maintaining a close watch over proceedings.

PROHIS TO LAUNCH A BIG OFFENSIVE
