RELIEF FOR GERMAN CHILDREN SOUGHT

Work of Committee in Oregon
Directed By Hoover Cam-
paign Head.

Robert H. Strong, of the Portland firm of Strong & MacNaughton, who directed the campaign for funds for starving peoples of Europe for Herbert Hoover here in 1921, has accepted the chairmanship of the Oregon state committee for the relief of starving German children. This is affiliated with the American Committee for Relief of German Children, of which Major-General Henry T. Allen, who commanded the American forces on the Rhine during the occupation, is chairman for the United States. It is backed by Herbert Hoover, former Oregon boy, now secretary of commerce, and is endorsed by President Coolidge and was likewise endorsed by the late President Harding.

The Oregon committee is to launch soon a campaign to raise \$100,000 in this state, half in Portland and half in the outstate districts. Headquarters for the work have been opened in 715 Corbett building, Portland, with H. L. Eddy in charge as director. It has been endorsed locally by the Portland Council of Churches, the business interests of the city and by the Central Labor Council, all of which have declared that, whatever may have been done to bring about starvation conditions in Germany, certain it is that the little children there should not be blamed and that they must be fed and clothed.

SAVE GERMAN CHILDREN

Strong Oregon Committee Works For
Relief Fund.

For the purpose of raising \$100,000 in Oregon as a part of a fund of \$1,000,000 from the United States to save 2,000,000 little children in Germany who are facing starvation because of the terrible conditions there, a strong committee has been named in Portland to look generally after this work throughout the state and particularly in that city. In the other larger cities of the state committees will be named to take charge of the relief work. Portland is state headquarters, with offices in room 715 Corbett building, where H. L. Eddy is in charge as director.

Robert H. Strong, of the firm of Strong & MacNaughton, is state chairman. He had charge of the Hoover food relief campaign in Oregon in 1921, when that campaign was put on to relieve distress in Europe. The committee which has sponsored the relief work in Oregon consists of men prominent in various lines of business, as follows:

Every cent of the money subscribed for this fund will actually go to buy food.

Oregon people are asked this year to express their holiday and New Year spirit by giving something to relieve the suffering of more than two million starving German children. With unemployment common, the mark currency valueless, government disorganized, business at a standstill, a winter of famine, disease and terror confronts the German people. The scourge is falling heaviest on the children; the children with whom we have had no quarrel; the children who could not be blamed for any wrongs.

templated by the executive branch of the government.

Senator Curtis of Kansas, the republican whip, reached the executive offices before they had opened for the day and found the president still in the White House proper, hurried there to talk with him.

The republican floor leader, Senator Lodge of Mass., arrived at the White House soon afterward.

The conference was the first the president had with democratic senators since the oil lease inquiry assumed its present large proportions.

Silas H. Strawn, one of the special counsel selected by the president to conduct the government's investigation, arrived at the White House almost simultaneously with the two senators, but did not go into conference with the president with them.

Arrangements were made immediately for a conference between Mr. Strawn and J. Crawford Blagg of Raleigh, N. C., an attorney said to have been intimately acquainted with the oil land policies carried out by Secretary Daniels under the Wilson administration.

Before the house naval committee which is inquiring into the disposition of royalty oils under the Doherty and Sinclair leases, a debate developed over the Daniels' policies with republican members declaring that the door for the Fall contract originally was opened by the former democratic navy secretary.

The senate oil committee held no session, but three physicians selected by it went to the apartment where former Secretary Fall is confined to determine whether he is too ill to testify when the committee hearings are resumed tomorrow.

In the midst of these developments, rumors of cabinet changes involving the retirement of Secretary Denby and Attorney-General Daugherty continued to fly thick and fast, but Secretary Slamp denied flatly a story that the two cabinet members had placed their resignations before the president.

It was indicated that all features of the problem were talked over with the president by Senators Robinson and Walsh, but much of the conference was taken up with the question of the special counsel who will prosecute the annulment suit.

Mr. Coolidge has selected Thomas W. Gregory of Texas, a former democratic attorney-general, to act with Mr. Strawn and he is on his way to Washington.

There were evidence yesterday, however, that something might have gone amiss in the plans, and it was even more apparent today that the make-up of attention in administration circles.

It was to talk over that subject that Chairman Leisner of the oil committee and Senator Curtis of Kansas, the republican whip, made an early morning trip to the White House.

Later Senator Lodge, the republican floor leader, also called on the president before his conference with the democratic leaders.

All the senators declined to say what trend the discussion had taken or whether the qualifications of either of the two attorneys selected by Mr. Coolidge has been questioned. Judge Bliss, a democrat, would not comment on the question of whether he might become associated with the government's special counsel.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Congressional discussion and executive consideration of the oil land leasing question has served to fill Washington with more rumors and counter rumors than the capital has known before in many a day.

Most persistent of the reports involves the possible retirement of Secretary Denby and Attorney-General Daugherty from the cabinet.

Reports that the two cabinet members had submitted their resignations to President Coolidge, several days ago and that the president had refused to accept them were disseminated widely today, but were at once branded as "absolutely untrue," by C. Bascom Stepp, secretary to Mr. Coolidge.

A suggestion in the senate yesterday by Senator Norris, that Secretary Hughes, a former member of the supreme court, should have called attention to the "plain illegality" of the oil leases when they were discussed by the cabinet, was followed today by the issuance of this statement by Mr. Hughes:

"The questions of the legality or propriety of the oil leases now under discussion in congress were never brought before the cabinet for its decision. My opinion upon these questions was never sought or expressed either in or out of the cabinet. If the oil leases were even referred to in cabinet meetings, and I do not recall that they were, it was certainly only by way of general reference and without requiring any responsible action, which, of course, I should not have been willing to take without examination of papers and statutes. Having plenty of work in the department of state, I had no occasion to consider these questions of law and fact involved, and I have not been called upon to take any responsibility in the matter."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Differences of opinion cropped out again today among members of the house naval committee as to whether Secretary Denby followed the policy recommended by his predecessor, Josephus Daniels, for the preservation of oil for the navy. As the committee renewed its inquiry into the Sinclair and Doherty naval oil reserve leases, representative Britten, republican, Illinois, declared he proposed to show that Denby "followed in Secretary Daniels' footsteps."

This statement brought the remark from Representative Vinson, Georgia, ranking democrat on the

"I'll prove it to you before we get through if you will be fair," Mr. Britten retorted.

The exchange came after Rear Admiral Latimer, judge advocate general of the navy had reviewed how Mr. Daniels in 1920 recommended legislation to permit the navy to negotiate for tank construction for the storage of naval oil. Authority then granted by congress, it was brought out, enabled Mr. Denby to arrange with the Doherty interests for tank construction at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii out of royalties for oil from the California naval reserve.

Mr. Walsh went to the White House on invitation of the executive and so far as is known it was the first time he had been consulted by Mr. Coolidge on the subject.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—A move to attach the Robinson resolution calling for the resignation of Secretary Denby to the Walsh oil lease annulment measure was made today immediately after the senate convened. The amendment was sponsored by Senator Trammell, democrat, Florida.

COAST DEFENSE IS INEFFICIENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—The coast defense of the northwest, particularly those of the Columbia River, Puget Sound, Grays Harbor and Willapa Bay "would be utterly unable to protect units of the American battle fleet before they could be able to take on battle formation," Brigadier-General, Henry T. Todd, commanding the nine coast artillery districts, announced here today. General Todd recently completed a survey of the northwest coast defenses.

"I found the armament to consist of guns designed in 1895 and unable to shoot at ranges beyond 17,000 yards," General Todd reported. "Today each ship of the British Royal Navy class carries 8 5-inch guns and 14 6-inch guns, the 15-inch guns being able to outrange our 12-inch guns by at least 10,000 yards. Each ship of the Japanese Narato class carries eight 16-inch guns and 12 5.4-inch guns. Consequently the coast defense of the northwest could not offer adequate protection."

"The armament with its accessories, power plants, etc., however, old-fashioned as they are, I found in excellent condition. While the work entailed on the depleted garrisons is enormous, the morale of both officers and enlisted men was high and everyone seemed to realize that made up for the shortage in personnel."

"We always considered that it took at least 1900 coast artillery officers and men to maintain the Puget Sound forts in a serviceable condition and be able to replace a surprise attack from a raiding force, yet in the Puget Sound forts today there are but 11 coast artillery officers and 241 enlisted men."

"Conditions are worse in the coast defenses of the Columbia. There the garrison is so small, two coast artillery officers and 24 enlisted men for the three forts at the mouth of the Columbia and for the batteries at Grays Harbor and Willapa Bay, that all that can be done is to keep the material in good condition."

RAILROAD MEN SEE BODY IN UMATILLA

PENDLETON, Jan. 31.—Railroad men at Rieth, three miles below Pendleton this morning saw a body in the waters of the Umatilla river which they believed to be that of Roy

Tobin of La Grande who disappeared here December 29. The men who saw the body followed it until they lost sight of it in the deep water at the Coe Dam. A posse is endeavoring to recover the body, the work, however, is hampered by the swiftness and muddiness of the river, which is greatly swollen by recent rains.
